


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Acknowledgments

For the women who are engaged in the process and now considering public office, what advice would you give them?

Well, there are two real challenges for women who have decided themselves to get involved in a political career. One is there is a perception that women cannot raise money as successfully as men can, and that's just not the case. You have to be committed to carrying a very substantive message and have confidence in yourself and go out aggressively and ask people to support you financially. Women have to have the confidence to compete in that fundraising arena and go out and make it happen by convincing them to believe in them by giving them contributions. Other women will support women financially and we have to get more men who are traditionally the ones who write bigger checks and support women financially, to believe that they can succeed and have a strong agenda.

Secondly, women have the challenge of balance because women are typically not only balancing a career, but they are also taking care of children as well as aging parents. They are typically the care givers of the family who are expected to step forward when there is an illness or a problem with children or with relatives who need support or help. They are the nurturers. They are expected not only to balance a career but also the busy household that many women have with children.

Many women my age have aging parents with health problems and that takes a lot of time. You have to find ways to balance the demands of public life with the demands of your family and that's not easy. But it can be done. I've always said to women's groups when I talk to them, the reason women can do this is because we know how to do more than one thing at a time. We've had to do that for a long time. Women know that it takes establishing of priorities and bal-

ancing to be sure that you can take on a public life and balance that with a private life, but it can be done. It's a matter of setting your priorities and deciding what's really important to you.

Do you have any words or special quotes that guide you?

Every decision that I have ever had to face, I come back to the simple words, "Do the right thing." That's my mantra for any decision. I believe that if you think about leadership, and you think about public involvement, it's really your personal values that have to be the framework for how you approach every decision and every job you have. That's really something that can't be taught. You have to have your own values that have become part of how you've been raised, by your family, by your activities or your involvement in your

church, what your parents believed or taught you as a child. Your basic human values have to stay intact. If you think about any leader that has ever gotten in trouble, who has ever gotten involved in legal problems, political scandal, or sex scandal, it is typically been because there has been a departure from that real firm commitment to core personal value. If you stay true to your values, and you do the right thing, then you will continue to contribute in a positive way. ■

WOMEN IN STATE LEGISLATURES

No African American, Asian American, or Hispanic women currently serve in Kentucky's General Assembly.

Currently, there are 11 female State Representatives and 6 female State Senators, which comprise about 12% of Kentucky's General Assembly.

In the United States Congress, there are currently 14 female Senators and 67 female Representatives. Females represent 15% of Congress.



Given the position you hold today, what is the biggest challenge for women in politics?

I think one of the greatest things about being in Washington in more recent years is that a growing number of Republican women who share my perspective on a lot of issues are being elected. I ask their advice, and I can get insightful, helpful information from them. Most of them are conservative to moderate. When we all share the same basic belief, it is easier for me to say, "What do you think about this issue?" "What do you think your committee would think about this?" and get really good insights in return.

Of course, the fact is that women in general are still a minority in the political arena, because for years and years, it really was a man's world. Politics at its best involves a lot of consensus building, especially if you are in a legislative arena. That can be harder to accomplish if you are part of a smaller

group. But like I said before, our numbers are growing. I think it is also challenging when certain groups with very specific political agendas try to speak for all women. For example, when I first got into politics, the primary spokespeople for women were liberal women. That left those out who believed that women should have a different agenda. The truth is that no one would ever think to say to men, "Now, since you're a man, you need to think a certain way." I think women should be outraged at any women's group that says it is necessary to fit into an exact mold. If we really want to be supportive of women, we should like seeing women articulating the pro-business agenda AND the pro-union agenda; the pro-liberal agenda AND the pro-conservative agenda, and so forth. We should want to see women come from a variety of perspectives, who then can become role models for our daughters and our sisters.

What steps should a woman take to begin her involvement in politics?

The best preparation that I had was volunteering in campaigns. I volunteered for some very small campaigns that gave me great insight into how a local race might be run.

I also volunteered in presidential races. When President Reagan ran for the first time in 1980, Kentucky was a toss-up state until Election Day. His local campaign involved a lot of activity, and a lot of professional organization. As I gave more time over the course of that summer and fall, I was given

more and more responsibility. I got an understanding of how decisions are made and how campaigns are organized. That gave me a great foundation to later run my own campaigns.

If you want to run for public office some day, it's a good idea to find a candidate who you really like, who you really wouldn't mind giving some time to, and who tends to run a very organized, active campaign. Walk in the door and ask to volunteer. I guarantee you that the candidate will appreciate your involvement. ■

Guidelines to get involved in your community

The role Kentucky women can play in improving their communities is limitless. Small towns and larger cities across the Commonwealth are always in need of good public servants to assist them in conquering issues such as homelessness, drug abuse, and domestic violence. However, despite the prevalent need of public servants, some women are still leery of beginning their community service involvement.

The following are guidelines to follow if you are interested in community involvement:

- Do a personal inventory to find out how much time you can devote to the community, where your interests lie, what skills you possess, and to determine your passions.
- Search the web for volunteer opportunities in your community that fit your situation and personality. Try websites such as www.serviceleader.org and www.e-volunteering.org.
- Contact common community volunteer locations such as hospitals, food banks, homeless shelters, animal shelters, and nature parks. Also contact common volunteer organizations like the Red Cross, United Way, Habitat for Humanity, and Special Olympics.
- Join a board, club, or committee that specializes in community development such as Girl Scouts, Business and Professional Women, or your local Women’s Club. Try to take on leadership roles in the organizations with which you become involved.

Perhaps some of the best recommendations for getting involved in your community may come from current community leaders such as our First Lady, Glenna Fletcher. Here are some of her personal tips:

- Research the causes or issues important to you and look for a group that works with the issues about which you feel strongly.
- Consider the skills you have to offer. If you enjoy outdoor work, have a knack for teaching, or just enjoy interacting with people, you may want to look for volunteer work that would incorporate these aspects of your personality.
- When starting, do not over-commit your schedule...better to start out slowly and enjoy the experience.
- Volunteer or get involved as a family.

Overview of Leadership Kentucky

Leadership Kentucky, created in 1984 as a non-profit educational organization, brings together a selected group of people that possess a broad variety of leadership abilities, career accomplishments, and volunteer activities to gain insight into complex issues facing the state. Their goal is to prepare participants to take an active role in advancing the state for the common good. By fostering understanding of how the state's issues are interconnected, and by forging new relationships among community and regional leaders, Leadership Kentucky graduates bring a fresh and informed perspective to their communities and companies, serving as important participants in the unified effort to shape Kentucky's future.


Through a series of seven monthly, two-day sessions, held in various locations in the state, participants are educated about the state of Kentucky and its challenges. They meet and talk with Kentucky's current leaders and through a systematic educational program, explore the state's opportunities, needs and resources. Kentucky's rich cultural heritage and its unique diversity are woven throughout the curriculum that features the state's economy, education, health and human services, law and justice, and environment. In addition, Leadership Kentucky provides a thought-provoking experience focusing on the attributes of leadership and what it means to be a leader. By visiting various regions of the Commonwealth, the participants develop an enhanced view and a new meaning to the word community that spans the entire state.

"The particular challenge that I find that is gender-specific is the tremendous demand on time. While time is a precious commodity to everyone regardless of gender, I believe that it is particularly difficult for women to find enough extra time to do all the things that we are expected to do and, of course, that we want to do for our families and friends.

Everything from baking cookies to entertaining to gardening to buying Christmas gifts must be tucked away in between the demands of a rigorous schedule. I believe that women are more conscious of clinging to these 'extras' than perhaps men might be. As a result, I believe that many of us sleep less and work more.

General Guidelines for Starting a New Business in Kentucky

1. Talk with an attorney, a CPA, or a consultant who specializes in small business creation in Kentucky. Also, there are many small business development groups throughout Kentucky that can offer assistance. These professionals can help you sort out what type of registration will be best for your business.
2. Select a business entity type (sole proprietor, partnership, corporation, or LLC), and register your business with the Kentucky Secretary of State. If you are a sole proprietorship, contact your local county clerk for registration information. You will need to register your sole proprietorship with the county clerk in each county that you do business. The Kentucky Secretary of State website is: <http://sos.ky.gov>.
3. Secure a local zoning license or certificate of occupancy from your local planning and zoning entity. This includes permits for any remodeling or construction of facilities as well as for any signs displaying your company name.
4. Obtain an Employer Identification Number (EIN) from the IRS. (Form SS-4) The IRS website is www.irs.gov/smallbiz. IRS/Kentucky information can be found at <http://www.irs.gov/businesses/small/article/0,,id=100736,00.html>.
5. Obtain city and/or county occupational business licenses. Contact your local revenue commission or county clerk. Be sure to check with all of the municipal entities where your primary place of business will be...especially if you live in a small city within a larger metropolitan area.
6. Contact the Kentucky Department of Revenue to determine which forms your business needs to file (especially if your business collects sales or use tax or has employees).
7. Contact and register with the Kentucky Department of Employment and Training if your business has employees. The Kentucky Department of Employment and Training website is: www.oet.ky.gov.
9. Determine if your business needs to acquire any special licenses. The Business Information Clearinghouse at the Kentucky Cabinet for Economic Development is a good place to start, or check the One-Stop Business Licensing index at the Kentucky Secretary of State website. Kentucky Secretary of State One-Stop Business Licensing website is: <http://sos.ky.gov>. The Business Information Clearinghouse website is: <http://www.thinkkentucky.com/kyedc/ebpermits.asp>.
10. Talk with a banking institution and an insurance carrier to determine your banking and liability insurance needs for your business.

Why did you decide to volunteer in other's campaigns?

There's always been that kind of interest, and I guess it just evolved. I keep encouraging women to get involved in other campaigns if they want to get into politics and into public service. They really need to get in on the ground floor and see how it works, how it happens, and how you make things happen. Sometimes women want to get higher up in the ranks immediately, but that isn't always the best thing.

I took pride in helping in other people's campaigns. I would get sandwiches and make coffee, and I knew exactly how many bumper stickers went to each county. I knew all the nitty gritty and that really helps you when you're running a campaign.

Do you think it is easy to balance your private life with your public life?

I think it was hard. It may have been harder on my family than it was for me. You've got to understand that you are going to be in a fish bowl. It's there for everybody. My kids and husband made greater sacrifices than I did. It is a challenge as far as time is concerned, and that is why you depend so much on the people that help you. For example, you are elected in November, sworn in in December, and have a session of the Legislature in January.

If you start planning too far ahead, you run the risk of losing focus and publicly it could appear as if you are taking the election for granted. You can't worry about what you are going to do at the mansion, or your inauguration, and as a wife and mother, the family is always on your mind - especially preparing for the holiday season. Then you

are elected, which is exciting, but the campaign has been very tiring. You need a few days to come down from all of the excitement and the demands. In the mean time, to get ready to be sworn in in December, you must decide on your Cabinet, you must select your staff at the mansion and the Governor's office, and prepare for a session of the Legislature. So, it's a real challenge, but you find that you can do it!

What do you feel has been your greatest accomplishment?

I think my greatest and most exciting accomplishment was when I heard that we had landed Toyota for Kentucky. I knew it was going to be good for the state. The tobacco sales were going down, the horse industry is cyclical, and coal mining had the

acid rain problem. So, we focused on economic development, and we targeted automotive. We needed manufacturing because manufacturing paid more money for jobs per capita than some of the other jobs that we had. We were competing with 20 other states for Toyota in a tough competition. When you have competed with that many other states and when you get the call and they say, "You did it!" That's pretty exciting! I'm sure that will be part of my legacy, and I hope it will be accompanied by education. I started the education reform because the key to more economic development, more jobs, more opportunities for our people for a better quality of life, is education. You must have a trained workforce for these companies. The key for the future of Kentucky is education. ■

The Kentucky Women Veterans Program

Research has shown that women veterans are more likely to be unemployed, less likely to be enrolled in VA healthcare, and less likely to receive compensation for their service-connected disabilities than male veterans. In March 2005, the Kentucky General Assembly, under the influence of such staggering evidence, passed legislation that created The Women Veteran's Program within the Kentucky Department of Veterans Affairs. This program's mission is aimed at helping Kentucky's women veterans obtain access to federal and state veteran's services. The primary components of the program fall under six (6) major categories: Advocacy and Public Awareness, Collaboration, Research and Information Dissemination, Education, Honor and Recognition, and Facilities. All women who served in the United States Armed Forces or in forces incorporated as part of the United States Armed Forces and who were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable are eligible to receive assistance.

The Commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Veterans' Affairs has designated First Sergeant Pamela Luce, US Army Retired, as the Women Veterans Coordinator for the Commonwealth. She can be reached toll free at (888) 724-7683 or via email at pamela.luce@ky.gov.

The Women Veterans Coordinator will collaborate with federal, state, and local agencies on issues related to women veterans. These issues include items such as performing outreach to improve women veterans' awareness of eligibility for federal and state veterans' services and benefits, assessing the needs of women veterans with respect to benefits and services, reviewing initiatives designed to address the needs of Kentucky's women veterans, making recommendations to the Commissioner to improve benefits and services, and incorporating women veterans' issues in strategic planning.

Kentucky's connection with the real-life Korean War MASH unit, nicknamed the Eight-O-Double Nickel, was Lelia Jeanette Jones Busler, then a young Army Nurse Corps captain. Busler served in the 8055th from July 1951 to January 1952. By the time of her retirement from the military in 1973, Colonel Busler's military career had spanned nearly three decades, the Korean War being a small, but memorable part of her illustrious career.

Lelia Jeanette Jones was born on November 6, 1921, in Irvine, Estill County, Kentucky. She graduated from Irvine City High School on May 18, 1939. Lelia graduated from the 36-month program at Middletown Hospital School for Nurses in Middletown, Ohio, on February 28, 1943, and became a registered nurse on April 2.

Lelia applied for admission into the Army Nurse Corps on April 20. Initially rejected, she attained the Corps' minimum weight requirement by eating bananas. She also applied for enrollment in the Red Cross Nursing Service and was appointed on November 24. She was accepted into the ANC on March 10, 1945, and left for Fort Knox on April 8. Second Lieutenant Lelia J. Jones completed her Basic Training Course at Fort Knox on May 3, 1945, and became a general duty nurse at the post hospital. She moved up the ranks quickly, being promoted to the rank of first lieutenant on April 8, 1948, and in February 1949, began her first overseas tour of duty.

Lelia's new assignment was with the 14th U.S. Army Field Hospital. While serving with the 14th Field

Hospital, Jones became ill and, on February 24, 1951, was evacuated to the Medical Holding Detachment of the 361st Station Hospital in Tokyo for hospitalization and treatment. During her recovery, Lelia was promoted to captain. Shortly thereafter, she was ordered to report as a general duty nurse to the 8055th Mobile Army Surgical Hospital (MASH), nicknamed the "Double Nickel," at Uijongbu, Korea.

Captain Lelia Jones' tour of duty included stints at the 8168th U.S. Army Hospital at Yokohama, Japan, U.S. Army Hospital at Fort Campbell, at Fort Clayton in Panama, Rodriguez Army Hospital, Fort Brooke, Puerto Rico, Army Hospital at Fort Riley, Kansas, and the 2nd MASH located at Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

She attended the Advanced Nursing Administration Course at Fort Sam Houston, Texas during September 1957. Also throughout her military career, Lelia took college courses while assigned at various Army posts, including Kansas State College, University of North Carolina, North Carolina State College of Agriculture and Engineering, and the University of Maryland. She completed her associate's degree on November 18, 1958.

On April 8, 1959, Captain Jones was promoted to the rank of major and was assigned to the 97th General Hospital in Frankfurt, Germany and served as Head Nurse of the Female Surgical Ward and the Male Medical Ward. She then went on to serve at the 345th Surgical Hospital at Fort Rucker, Alabama and Weed Army Hospital at Fort Irwin, Cali-

fornia, where she served as chief of Nursing Services at the hospital and was promoted to lieutenant colonel on August 26, 1968. Following another stint at Rodriguez Army Hospital at Fort Brooke, Puerto Rico in 1969, Lelia was assigned to the Army Hospital at Fort Polk, Louisiana, as the assistant chief nurse of Nursing Services.

Lelia was later assigned to the Army Hospital at Fort Campbell, Kentucky as the assistant chief nurse. While at Fort Campbell, she was once again sent to Brooke Army Hospital at Fort Sam Houston, this time to attend the chief orientation course

and upon completion of the course was appointed acting chief nurse of Nursing Services. Later, while assigned to Reynolds Army Hospital at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, Lelia was promoted to the rank of Colonel. She seemed to be on the fast track in the military; however, due to her on-going battle with Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), which had started while she was serving in Korea during the war, she made the decision to retire from the military. On June 30, 1973, after 28 years of honorable service, Colonel Lelia J. Busler retired from the U.S. Army Nurse Corps. ■

Anna Mac Clarke

Anna Mac Clarke was born Anna Mack Mitchel on June 20, 1919, in Lawrenceburg, Kentucky. On May 28, 1937, she was awarded a diploma from Lawrenceburg High School, indicating she had completed the course of study for the Colored High School. Anna was one of only three black children to graduate that year.

Anna entered Kentucky State College in the latter part of 1937. She quickly became the assistant to Betty “Ma” White, the housemother of Chandler Hall. She did administrative work in the office of the Dean of Women, Ann Heartwell Hunter, and The Kentucky Thorobred, the school’s newspaper, brought her on as a staff member. In December 1939, she became a member of the Alpha Pi Chapter of the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority. She made several strong connections at Kentucky State while participating in sorority activities as well as intramural athletics. Some of her closest friends and

classmates at Kentucky State would go on to achieve prominence in the fight for civil rights and high level government positions. These individuals included Whitney Young Jr., social worker, educator and executive director of the National Urban League, and Ersal Hines Poston, president of the New York State Civil Service Commission.

On June 10, 1941, Anna received her diploma from Kentucky State College, where she received her bachelor’s degree in sociology and economics along with a certificate of Sunday training school. With her newly earned degree in hand, Anna returned to Lawrenceburg and was disappointed by not being able to find a good job. In Kentucky during the 1940’s, as well as other parts of the country, racism, legal and de facto, was a way of life. Anna moved to Cincinnati, Ohio, with the hopes of finding a better paying and more rewarding career. In Cincinnati, Anna got a job at the Nash House Com-

munity Center as the recreation director, but she was still unsatisfied.

War came to the United States on December 7, 1941, when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor. It would be another ten months before Anna would become a member of the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps (WAACs). Early in 1942, Anna received training from the US Army Fifth Service Command's Signal Corps School, which was located in Cincinnati. Anna decided on October 3, 1942 to answer the call of Mary McLeod Bethune for "One Black WAAC" and joined the All-Volunteer Women's Army Auxiliary Corps. She was sent to the auxiliary training program at the First Women's Army Auxiliary Corps Training Center at Fort Des Moines, Iowa. At Fort Des Moines, she completed her four week Basic Training course just prior to Christmas.

During this period, the WAAC was looking desperately for officers, and Anna was ideally suited to enter into the WAAC Officer Candidate School (OCS) because of her educational and athletic background. The OCS program was desegregated at Fort Des Moines in November, 1942, and in December, Anna became a candidate in the 15th Officer Class. At OCS, she was one of only three black students and was the only one to finish the course. On February 16, 1943, WAC OCS Class 15 graduated, and Third Officer Clarke was assigned to Company 8 at Fort Des Moines.

During the latter part of 1943, Anna was reassigned to the Fourth Company, Third Regiment, as a Platoon Leader. Third Officer Anna M. Clarke would go down in history as the first black WAAC as-

signed to command an all-white unit. On May 22, 1943, when First Officer Sarah E. Murphy and Third Officer Anna Clarke were in command of 144 enlisted WAACs, they were the first black unit assigned to the Fifth Service Command at Camp Atterbury, Indiana.

In June, 1943, Anna proceeded to WAAC Headquarters in Washington, D.C., where she served in the classification and assignment department. In the first of August, she entered the Adjutant General's School at Camp Meade, Maryland. Following the completion of training, she was once again on the move, this time a stop over in Chicago, Illinois, to assist in black WAAC recruiting efforts with fellow Kentuckian, Mary A. Bordeaux. Following her stint in Chicago, Anna made her way back to Fort Des Moines. While there, the WAAC was converted to the Women's Army Corps (WAC) as part of the Regular Army. Anna participated in ceremonies where she was appointed a First Lieutenant in the Women's Army Corps. During this time, she joined other black WAC officers in their fight to stop the army in the establishment of an all-black regiment at Fort Des Moines. The officers felt that this plan to place all blacks on post under the command of a sort of South African-style black "homeland" ran counter to the very things the United States was fighting for in the war. The officers finally convinced the headquarters to rescind the reorganization plan before it was implemented. After leaving Fort Des Moines, Anna was moved to Douglas Army Air Field.

Anna would not be in command of her unit at Douglas long before she became ill. In mid-March 1944, Anna was admitted to the post hospital, complaining of pains in her side. She was diagnosed with appendicitis, and to further complicate things it was ruptured and gangrene had started to set in. An

appendectomy was performed and initially it looked as though she would make a full recovery. However, the poison of the gangrene had entered her body. Anna Mac died on April 19, 1944 of complications associated with the gangrene. ■



Mary Willie Arvin

Mary Willie Arvin was born on April 21, 1879, in Henderson County, Kentucky. In 1904, she graduated from the School of Nursing at the Owensboro City Hospital in Owensboro, Kentucky. As time passed, Mary became a general practice nurse in Memphis, Tennessee. Her stay as a general practice nurse was ended in 1917 while on a visit to Richmond, Virginia.

Mary decided to join an American hospital unit on June 11, 1917, that was preparing to go overseas. By mid-July, Nurse Arvin had joined the Harvard Unit, Base Hospital No. 5 at Dannes-Camiers, France. Base Hospital No. 5 was bombed on September 4, 1917, only a couple months after Nurse Arvin's arrival. This was the first time Mary had been under enemy fire.

The bombing of Base Hospital 5 did not stop in September 1917. On June 30, 1918, the hospital was bombed by German airplanes at Boulogne-sur-Mer. For her actions during and after the air raid, Nurse Arvin received official recognition by the three major allied nations. She received a congratulatory

letter from General John J. "Black Jack" Pershing on August 28, 1918 for her deeds during the air raid. General Pershing pointed out her extraordinary skills in handling the care of her patients throughout the ordeal. General Pershing's letter was a true sign that Nurse Arvin was a dedicated member of the United States Armed Forces, but the praises did not stop there. She received the French Croix de Guerre and a certificate of commendation from the United States, which she would turn in and receive the first Purple Heart Medal ever awarded to a woman.

On March 23, 1919, Nurse Arvin returned to the United States aboard the S.S. Noordam. She decided to return to Henderson County, Kentucky a few days later. In October, Nurse Arvin was assigned as a Red Cross welfare worker in Hopkinsville, Kentucky, and on November 13, 1919, she was decorated with the Royal Red Cross, 2nd Class (Associate), by Prince Edward at the home of Perry Belmont in Washington, D.C. These commendations combined made her the most decorated

Kentucky female veteran in WWI combat. Mary Arvin later moved to Orlando, Florida, where she took a job with a local hospital. While in Orlando, she married William H. Tiller, a WWI veteran. Following his death, she remarried another WWI veteran by the name of Robert H. Sissons. On September 9, 1947, she died in the home of her sister in Henderson, Kentucky. ■

What things did you consider before running for office?

First I considered the possible effect on my family and business. Would I be able to juggle being an effective legislator along with being a good mom and business owner? Fortunately, I have found the right balance between family, business and work, doing much of my legislative work from home. Thank goodness for cell phones and e-mail! This is all made easier by having a wonderful and supportive husband who gives our children plenty of love and attention when I am in Frankfort. It is an advantage to live close to Frankfort, which allows me to commute to the Capitol each day, something many legislators are unable to do.

Has it ever been a problem for you that you have become more emotionally attached to issues than your male counterparts?

I think most people who run for office do so because they care deeply about certain issues, whether they are Republican or Democrat, male or female. The common denominator in all this is that we are people who care deeply about the future of our children and state. Most recently I sponsored a bill to

increase the number of disorders that babies are screened for at birth, as well as to provide funding to purchase the needed technology for the state lab. I became very emotionally attached to this issue because I knew babies were being harmed and dying. My legislation is a major advance for babies and their parents, and will end needless suffering and deaths.

As Senate Health and Welfare chair, my committee is responsible for making major decisions that impact health care and people's lives. We often hear stories of suffering and it is impossible to sit there without being emotionally moved. Being chair of this committee is a tremendous responsibility, one that I take very seriously. There is no better feeling of accomplishment than when you have helped someone and made their life better because of legislation you helped pass.

How are things when you are in session?

Since the Kentucky legislature meets only a few months a year, it is very hectic and a whirlwind of activity. Every minute in Frankfort is spent meeting with constituents, working on legislation, convening in the Senate chamber or in committee meet-

ings. There is always more work to be done, but it is extremely gratifying to help people and make Kentucky a better place to live. During session my husband holds down the home front and I speak with him and the children numerous times throughout the day until I arrive home each evening.

Organizations

The following are descriptions of some of the positions, both elected and non-elected, of the women who are featured in our directory.

Congressman/Congresswoman

Members of Congress serve in the highest form of legislative power in the United States government. Members debate issues, correlate ideas, and determine the best possible solutions to the nation's problems. They pass legislation, which directly shapes the actions of each citizen, and they possess several Constitutional rights. Members' responsibilities include assisting constituents with governmental problems, regulating taxes, and many other important facets of our lives.

Auditor of Public Accounts

The Auditor of Public Accounts must be at least 30 years old and have been a resident of Kentucky for at least 2 years prior to the election. The Auditor ensures that public resources are protected, accurately valued, properly accounted for, and effectively employed to raise the quality of life of Kentuckians.

State Senators

State Senators must be at least 30 years old, be a citizen of Kentucky, and have resided in the state at least 6 years and in the district at least 1 year prior to the election. Senators are elected for four year terms, with half the Senate elected every two years. They pass legislation, debate issues, and help allocate the proper assistance across Kentucky.

State Representatives

State Representatives must be at least 24 years old, be a citizen of Kentucky, and have resided in the state at least 2 years and in the district at least 1 year prior to election. Representatives are elected for two year terms in November following the regular session of the General Assembly. The entire House is elected at the same time. The House is the other chamber of the Kentucky General Assembly. They more or less serve the same role as the State Senators except for a few different Constitutional variances.

Court of Appeals

The Court of Appeals hears cases that involve appeals of decisions from lower courts, such as the Circuit and District Courts. Fourteen judges, two elected from seven appellate court districts, serve on the Court of Appeals. The judges are divided into panels of three to review and decide cases, with

the majority determining the decision. The panels do not sit permanently in one location, but travel about the state to hear cases. Cases are not retried in the Court of Appeals. Only the record of the original court trial is reviewed, with attorneys presenting the legal issues to the court for a decision.

Circuit Court Judges

The Circuit Court is the court of general jurisdiction and hears civil matters involving more than \$4,000.00. Circuit courts have jurisdiction over cases involving capital offenses and felonies, divorces, adoptions, terminations of parental rights, land dispute title problems, and contested probates of will. Circuit courts have the power to issue injunctions, writs of prohibition, writs of mandamus, and hear appeals from district courts and administrative agencies. One judge may serve more than one county within a circuit. Some circuits contain only one county but have several judges, depending on population and caseload. Circuit judges serve eight-year terms.

District Court Judges

The District Court has limited jurisdiction, which means it hears only certain types of cases. Ninety percent of all Kentuckians involved in court proceedings appear in District Court. Juvenile matters, city and county ordinances, misdemeanors, traffic offenses, probate of wills, felony preliminary hearings, and civil cases involving \$4,000 or less are heard in District Court. Guardianship and conservatorship for disabled persons are in District Court, as well as voluntary and involuntary mental commitments and cases relating to domestic violence and abuse. If a district has a high population and a heavy caseload, it may consist of only one county but have several judges. In less populated areas, a district may encompass more than one county, but have only one judge who travels between the counties to hear cases.

Circuit Clerks

The Circuit Clerks serve both the circuit and district courts. One clerk is elected from each county. They are the administrative and clerical officers of the judicial system. They are prohibited from practicing law. Responsibilities of the circuit court clerks are: preparing bonds and approving

sureties thereon; administering oaths and affidavits; maintaining records, files and dockets; collecting fees, fines, and bond money; and paying jurors, commissioners and witnesses. They also issue drivers licenses, summon jurors, and operate tape recording equipment. In the absence of all judicial officers, the circuit clerk may issue warrants prepared by the Commonwealth or County Attorney.

Commonwealth Attorney

Commonwealth Attorney's are the legal counsel and prosecutors for the Commonwealth of Kentucky. They represent the state in legal matters and serve as prosecutors in matters involving felonies.

County Attorney

The County Attorney is part of the unified and integrated prosecutorial system under the Attorney General. The duties of the office can be classified as the prosecutorial function, county legal adviser, and miscellaneous duties for the state and county. The attorney must attend the district court in the county and prosecute all violations of criminal and penal law within the court's jurisdiction.

County Clerks

The County Clerk office has several duties that are varied in nature, such as issuing, registering, recording and keeping records of various legal instruments, voter registration and purgation, election duties, and tax duties. The clerk possesses the power of notary public in the exercise of the official functions of the office of clerk within the county and acts as a licensing agent for the government.

County Commissioners/Magistrates

County Commissioners and Magistrates serve similar roles in various facets, but are different in others. County Commissioners hold no other powers or duties outside of those held as a member of the fiscal court; however, they may perform marriages, if authorized. Magistrates also serve on the county's fiscal court and can perform marriage if authorized. The position of magistrate is a constitutional position that must be filled, but County Commissioners exist depending on the form of county government.

County Coroners

County Coroners have the full power and authority of peace officers, including the power of arrest, the power to bear arms, and to administer oaths. While performing investigations, the coroner may enter onto public or private property, seize evidence, interrogate persons, and require the production of medical records, documents, or evidence. In addition to these duties, the coroner may employ special investigators and photographers in making an investigation.

County Jailer

The County Jailer has custody, rule, and charge of the county jail and all persons in the jail. The jailer must maintain the upkeep of the jail and serve as the prisoners' means of transportation. The jailer must develop a monthly report to be delivered to the Department of Corrections and has the statutory responsibility of preparing the jail budget.

County Judge/Executive

The County Judge Executive serves as the chief executive of the individual county and operates as the presiding officer of the fiscal court, the county legislative body. The Judge Executive is assigned the primary responsibility for the administration of the county government, including the financial administration.

County PVA

The County PVA must make the assessment of all property in the county, prepare property assessment records, and perform such duties relating to assessment as may be prescribed by law or by the Revenue Cabinet. The PVA is subject to the direction, instruction, and supervision of the Revenue Cabinet.

County Sheriff

The County Sheriff serves a four year term and must be of at least 24 years of age. The official duties of the position fall into four categories: tax collection, election duties, services to courts, and law enforcement. The sheriff is one of four peace officers in the county government and has the authority to make arrests.

County Surveyor

The County Surveyor must perform any business in the civil engineering profession that he/she is lawfully ordered to do by any court in the county and may select any necessary assistants to aid in carrying out the orders of the court. The surveyor must make out and return a true plat and certificate of survey, accompanied by explanatory notes.

School Board Members/Superintendents

School board members serve as key policy makers for school districts and tailor their policies to work within national and state guidelines. These members are key components to the community because they serve as advocates for children and proper education. Superintendents are the chief official of the educational system within a given district. These individuals have the authority to create policy and supervise the district's actions. Combined with the school board, superintendents work towards allocating money appropriately and establishing guidelines, both educationally and socially, for students to follow. School board members and superintendents work towards establishing a structured environment to assist children in reaching their maximum potential.

Mayor

The Mayor serves as the official head of government within a city. The mayoral tasks include formulating policy, delivering city services, and establishing priorities for the entire city. Mayors must coordinate and monitor policies to ensure they meet the goals of the community. Generally, mayors work with city councils or city commissioners and preside over city council meetings.

Councilmembers/Commissioners

Councilmembers/Commissioners hold a part time position under a Council/Manager form of government. They compose the legislative body of the City. The members adopt the laws and policies for their local government. They are usually responsible for appropriating funds to operate City government, adopting a budget to guide expenditures and revenue, and defining the powers and duties of appointed officers and employees.

Education Cabinet

The Education Cabinet is charged with the mission of preserving Kentucky's heritage, preparing for its future, and promoting a statewide culture of lifelong learning. The agencies of the Cabinet provide or oversee services that contribute to an enhanced quality of life for all Kentuckians; excellence in public education, quality libraries, the preservation of historical materials and landmarks, and cultural enrichment through the arts.

Environmental & Public Protection Cabinet

The Environmental and Public Protection Cabinet combines Public Protection and Regulation, Labor, and Natural Resources and Environmental Protection into a single cabinet. It is an efficient, one-stop shop for the protective, regulative functions of the state government.

Gubernatorial Appointees to Boards and Commissions

Service as a gubernatorial appointee is an honor the Governor can bestow upon citizens of the Commonwealth. These individuals selected to serve on the various boards and commissions in our Commonwealth aid the Governor by assisting in the development of ideas for certain policy areas. The boards and commissions delve into an array of thoughts, policies, programs, and other important facets of the lives of Kentuckians.

College Presidents

College Presidents serve as the chief executive officer of one of Kentucky's institutions of higher education. Responsibilities vary among institutions.

Leadership Kentucky

Through a series of seven monthly, two-day sessions, held in various locations in the state, participants are educated about the state of Kentucky and its challenges. They meet and talk with Kentucky's current leaders and through a systematic educational program, explore the state's opportunities, needs, and resources.


