# Questions for Applicant

..... of said State and County, desiring to avail herself of the pension allowed to Indigent Widows of Soldiers, General Assembly, approved March 11, 1912, hereby submits her proofs, and after being duly sworn true answers to make to the following questions, deposes and answers as follows:

*This application was filed this 16th day of May 1912. John T. Brown C. R. C. C.*

1. What is your full name and where do you reside? (Give State, County and Postoffice.) *Mary Catharine Brumagen, at Piqua, Roberts County, Kentucky.*
2. How long and since when have you been a resident of this State? *All my life.*
3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name? *was born December 11, 1845, in Bath County, Ky. - maiden name was Mary C. Moreland.*
4. When and where was your husband born—state his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony. (If possible, attach certified copy marriage license in every case.) *Husband was born in Bath County, Ky. - Full name, Marshall Brumagen - married at Patten, Robertson County, Ky., Rev. - Bell.*
5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States? *Enlisted October 21, 1861, at Prestonsburg, Ky., in Co. H, 5th Ky, mounted Inf.*
6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? *1.2 yrs & 1 day.*
7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender? *Did not surrender was mustered out at Salersville, Ky, October 22, 1862.*
8. Was your husband present at the time and place when his Company and Regiment surrendered? .....
9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority? *Left command at Salersville, Ky, October 22, 1862, being mustered out.*
10. When and where did your husband die? *At Lexington, Ky, in Feb. 1907.*
11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? *Yes - except a short time before his death he was confined in the asylum where he died.*
12. Have you married since the death of your soldier husband? *No.*
13. What property, real or personal, or income do you have or possess, and its gross value? *Some horse hold furniture and one cow, and no income of any kind, and am living with married daughter.*
14. Have you a family? If so, who compose such family? *No.*
15. Name some friend, giving his name and postoffice address, who will be willing to have us write to him about your case if necessary. *O. P. Overby, Piqua, Roberts County, Ky.*

# Questions for Witnesses

*O. P. Overby*, of said State and County, having been presented as a witness in support of the application of Mrs. *Wm. C. Brumage* for a pension under Confederate Pension Law, approved March 11, 1912, after being duly sworn, true answers to make to the following questions, deposes and answers as follows:

1. What is your name and what is your postoffice address? *O. P. Overby, Piqua, Robertson County, Kentucky.*
2. Are you acquainted with the applicant, Mrs. *Wm. C. Brumage*?  
If so, how long have you known her? *Yes - Have known her for 30 years.*
3. Where does she reside, and how long and since when has she been a resident of this State? *at Piqua, Robertson County, Ky. Has been a resident of the state ever since I know her.*
4. Were you ever acquainted with her husband? *Yes.*
5. Were either or both of you present at the marriage? *No.*
6. How long did you know him? *About 50 years.*
7. When and where did *Mar. Shall Brumage* enlist in the war between the States, and in what Company and Regiment did he enlist, and how do you know this? *Enlisted at Prestonsburg, Ky. Oct. 21, 1861, in Co. H. 5th Ky. mounted Dept. - Know this from an examination of his War Record.*
8. Were you a member of the same Company and Regiment at the close of the war? *No.*
9. How long did he perform regular military duty? *12 mos. & 1 day as shown by his War Record.*
10. When and where was his Company and Regiment surrendered? *was not surrendered at the time he was mustered out.*
11. Were you with the command when it surrendered? *No.*
12. Was *Mar. Shall Brumage*, the husband of applicant, present? *No.*
13. If not present, where was he? *Had been mustered out before.*
14. When and where did he leave his command? *Oct. 22, 1862, at Salysville, Ky.*  
For what cause? *was mustered out.*  
By whose authority did he leave?
- How do you know all this? (State fully and clearly.) *Mrs. Brumage has a copy of his War Record from Washington City, and I have examined it, and was present at Salysville, Ky. when he was mustered out.*
15. When and where did *Mar. Shall Brumage* die? *at Lexington, Ky., in the Asylum, in Feb. 1897.*
16. Where did he reside at his death, and how long had he been a resident of Kentucky at his death? *His home at the time of his death was Piqua, Robertson County, Ky. Had been a resident of Ky. all his life.*
17. Do you know of your own knowledge that applicant is the lawful widow of *Mar. Shall Brumage*? *Yes.*

18. Has she remained unmarried since her soldier husband's death, and is she now his widow? *Yes. She is...*  
*was his widow*

19. What property, effects or income has the applicant, if any, and how do you know this of your own knowledge?  
*She has no property, except a little household and kitchen furniture and one cow. I know because I have been living a neighbor to her for a good many years, and know what she has*  
Has applicant conveyed any property, in the last two years or given away, if so, what was it, and to whom?  
*None*

*James A. Duncan states that he concurs in all of the testimony of the foregoing witness, O. P. Overby, except that he was not present with Marshall Brumagin at Seelysville, Ky., where he was summoned out, and did not know him for only about 20 yrs.*

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."  
2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.  
3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.  
4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.  
5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.  
6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

**NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.**

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent. Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.



Olivet, Kentucky, who, on behalf of Mrs. Marshal Brumagem, desires to obtain the record of her husband, Marshal Brumagem, who is said to have served in Colonel Thomas Johnson's Regiment, General Humphrey Marshal's command, Confederate States Army, I have the honor to advise you as follows:

The records show that Marshall Brumagem, private, Company H, 5th Kentucky Mounted Infantry (which regiment was commanded by Colonel Thomas Johnson), Confederate States Army, was enlisted October 21, 1861, at Prestonsburg, Kentucky, to serve 12 months, and that he was mustered out of the service with his company October 22, 1862, at Salyersville, Kentucky.
