

# Soldier's Application for Pension

I, Enoch Dye

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Clay in the County of Webster

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Company A 13<sup>th</sup> Ky. Cavalry

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the

benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,

and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-

ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

Dear Sir:-

I am in receipt of yours of the 23rd. The war records show that William H. White enlisted Oct. 18, 1862, in Company H, 10th Kentucky Infantry, and the records shows his service to December 31, 1863, and he states in his application that he took the oath of allegiance to the United States Government at Louisville, Ky. in the winter of 1864, and the application of Enoch Dye there is no record proof of his enlistment or service in the Confederate army. Two witnesses testify that he was in the army in August, 1864. Of this fact I notified him on the 4th day of April, 1913, and some additional proof has been filed with it but it has been impossible to reach it and I don't think now it can be done before the next day provided in the law for paying pensions, which is in May, but it shall have the earliest possible consideration.
