..... of said State and County, desiring to avail herself of the pension allowed to Indigent Widows of Soldiers, General Assembly, approved March 11, 1912, hereby submits her proofs, and after being duly sworn true answers to make to the following questions, deposes and answers as follows:

1. What is your full name and where do you reside? (Give State, County and Postoffice.) .....

*Sally Anna Hull, Williamstown, Grant County Ky*

2. How long and since when have you been a resident of this State? .....

*All of my life*

3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name? .....

*I was borned as I remember about 1847 in Owen County Ky, was Sally Anna Bates my Maiden name*

4. When and where was your husband born—state his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony. (If possible, attach certified copy marriage license in every case.) .....

*He was borned in Owen Co. Ky. I do not know but he was older than myself as to the time of his birth I do not know but his name is A. J. Hull. Married in Owen County Ky on the 2nd day of March 1859 J. L. Ballard performed the marriage ceremony and the certificate will be filled with the original*

5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States? .....

*He enlisted in Owen Co. Ky. in 1861 Company 6 First Regiment He served about 2 years and was killed by being forced off a boat*

6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? .....

*2 years*

7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender? .....

*Chattanooga Tenn*

8. Was your husband present at the time and place when his Company and Regiment surrendered? .....

*No Sir*

9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority? .....

*Drowned*

10. When and where did your husband die? .....

*I do not know when he died but it was in the later part of 1863 or in 1864 He died on the Mississippi River*

11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? .....

*Yes Sir*

12. Have you married since the death of your soldier husband? .....

*No Sir*

13. What property, real or personal, or income do you have or possess, and its gross value? .....

*None Wash for living*

14. Have you a family? If so, who compose such family? .....

*No*

# Questions for Witnesses

STATE OF KENTUCKY,

....., of said State and County, having been presented as a witness in support of the application of Mrs. Sally Anna Hull for a pension under Confederate Pension Law, approved March 11, 1912, after being duly sworn, true answers to make to the following questions, deposes and answers as follows:

1. What is your name and what is your postoffice address? P. T. Hale, Corinth Kentucky
2. Are you acquainted with the applicant, Mrs. Sally Anna Hull  
If so, how long have you known her? Yes Sir I have known her about 30 years
3. Where does she reside, and how long and since when has she been a resident of this State? all of my life
4. Were you ever acquainted with her husband? Yes
5. Were either or both of you present at the marriage? No Sir
6. How long did you know him? I have known him since 1840
7. When and where did he enlist in the war between the States, and in what Company and Regiment did he enlist, and how do you know this? he enlisted in Owen County, Ky. later part of 1861 in Company, 6. First Kentucky Calvary I was with him.
8. Were you a member of the same Company and Regiment at the close of the war? Yes
9. How long did he perform regular military duty? 2 years
10. When and where was his Company and Regiment surrendered? at the close of the war when General Lee surrendered, Chattanooga Tenn.
11. Were you with the command when it surrendered? Yes Sir
12. Was A. J. Hull, the husband of applicant, present?  
No Sir
13. If not present, where was he? He was drowned
14. When and where did he leave his command? On the Mississippi River  
For what cause? By death by the reason of drowning  
By whose authority did he leave? By cause of death by drowning  
How do you know all this? (State fully and clearly.) I knew him all of my life and knew him when he drowned and know this fact by reason of personal observation to be true and correct
15. When and where did he die?  
on the Mississippi River by drowning, drowning in later part of 1863 or 1864
16. Where did he reside at his death, and how long had he been a resident of Kentucky at his death? all of his life
17. Do you know of your own knowledge that applicant is the lawful widow of A. J. Hull  
Yes I know she is

18. Has she remained unmarried since her soldier husband's death, and is she now his widow? *Yes*  
..... *she has remained a widow as now a widow* .....

19. What property, effects or income has the applicant, if any, and how do you know this of your own knowledge?  
*She has none, she has no property, effects or income only..*  
*what she washes for by reason of my personal observation*

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
- 2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
- 3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
- 4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
- 5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
- 6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

**NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.**

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.

Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.



The only muster roll on file for Company C, 3d Kentucky Cavalry (later 1st Butler's Kentucky Cavalry), Confederate States Army, covering the period from November 1, 1862, to February 28, 1863, shows one A. J. Hull transferred to the 4th Kentucky Regiment January 12, 1863.

The records also show that one Andrew J. Hull, private, Company E, 4th Kentucky Infantry (Mounted), Confederate States Army, enlisted September 10, 1862. His name is last borne on the company roll for March and April, 1864, with remark: "Died of disease at Stone Mountain, Ga., April 11, 1864." No other record found.





The application of Mrs. Sallie Anna Hull  
for Confederate pension having been  
filed before the <sup>request</sup> July term of the Grant County  
Court and continued to a subsequent  
term, Mrs Sallie A. Hull, Martin Stampfer  
and Ed. Landreus of W<sup>est</sup>town Ky  
who are personally known by me to  
be worthy of belief were sworn &  
testified in open Court as follows:

Mrs. Sallie A. Hull: My husband was John Hull  
I am 67 or 68 years old, I have been  
a citizen of Ky. all the time since  
his death <sup>at least part of</sup> 1863 or in 1864, I have  
no property and no income except  
what I can earn by washing & other  
work and I am not able to do a day's  
work more than half the time, and compelled  
to call on the County Judge for help at in-  
tervals.

Martin Stampfer: Have known applicant all my  
life, she has been citizen of Ky. all the time.  
She has no property and washes clothes for  
living, does not seem able to work all the  
time.

Ed. Landreus: Have known applicant to be a citizen  
of Ky. for twenty five years, she has no  
property and washes for support, she  
is not able to earn much on account  
of not being able to work regularly, be-

cause of her old age & feebleness,  
from the above testimony and  
my personal knowledge of applicant  
I find that she is the widow of A. J. Hull  
that she is a citizen of Ky. and has  
been a citizen continuously since  
1864, that she is 68 years old and  
is the owner of no property and  
is not able to earn her support, that  
she does all the work she is able to do  
and more, that she is forced at times  
to apply to the County Court for assistance  
I therefore recommend that a pen-  
sion be granted to her.
