

COMMUTATION OF SENTENCE

The Governor granted unto CECIL WILSON a commutation of the sentence of the Warren Circuit Court, April term, 1932, for "robbery", from five years, as fixed by the jury, to three years, in the State Penitentiary. It appears from the record in this case that said Wilson is a young man of good family and that this was his first offense, and that clemency is recommended by County Judge Joe S Gorman and Hon. Theron M Johnson, and not opposed by Co. Atty., Charles R Bell.

RESTORATIONS TO CITIZENSHIP

The Governor granted unto the following named persons restoration of citizenship of which they had been deprived by the several judgments recited. Their names, Courts and terms thereof in which convicted, crimes alleged and terms of sentence being as follows, to wit:

JAKE CLINE, - - - - Boyd Circuit Court, January term, 1931, "Breaking and entering", and sentenced to one year in the State Reformatory.

ROY DICKERSON, - - - Lee Circuit Court, May term, 1932, "Storehouse breaking", and sentenced to one year in the State Reformatory.

LUTHER EDWARDS, - - Owsley Circuit Court, March term, 1928, "Malicious striking" and sentenced to one year in the State Reformatory.

GROVER MORGAN, - - - Mason Circuit Court, April term, 1928, "Housebreaking", and sentenced to two years in the State Reformatory.

ISAAC PERKINS, - - - Morgan Circuit Court, September term, 1929, "Manslaughter", and sentenced to five years in the State Reformatory.

HERBERT YOUNG, - - - Washington Circuit Court, March term, 1927, "Housebreaking" and sentenced to one year in the State Reformatory.

Reasons for extension of executive clemency in each of the above cases are fully set forth in the executive order filed therein.

JAIL SENTENCE PARDON

The Governor granted unto WALTER WEBB a pardon of the 30 day jail sentence imposed upon him, and remitted the State's portion of the \$100.00 fine, both of which were imposed upon him by the Letcher Circuit Court, at August term, 1933, for violating the Kentucky liquor laws. Clemency was recommended by County officials; and it appears that said Webb is unable to pay said fine, and that he is a law-abiding citizen, this being his first offense.

COMMUTATION OF SENTENCE

The Governor granted unto MCKINLEY SIMPSON a commutation of the sentence of the Garrard Circuit Court, Dec. term, 1932, for "Housebreaking", from two years, as given him by the jury, to a term of one and one-half years in the State Reformatory.

It appears that said Simpson has served nine months of said term, and will be eligible for parole next Dec., has been a good prisoner, and that clemency is asked

for him by Davie Gabbard, chief prosecuting witness, J H Jennings, County Clerk, G.T. Ballard, Sheriff, J M Craig, Ex-Sheriff, Tom Ward, Tax Commissioner, J C Cox, Jailer and more than 30 well known citizens of Garrard County.

#### GOVERNOR ABSENT FROM THE STATE

Hon. H. H. Holeman, Secretary to the Governor, was this day informed by the Governor that he had passed out of the State of Kentucky at between NINE and TEN O'CLOCK P. M., on October 2nd., 1933.

In the absence from the State of Governor Ruby Laffoon, Hon. Albert B. Chandler, Lieutenant Governor, became the Acting-Governor of Kentucky, and caused the following orders to be entered, viz:

#### COMMUTATION OF SENTENCE

Acting Governor A. B. Chandler granted unto SAM OTIS a commutation of the sentence of the Montgomery Circuit Court, May term, 1931, "Assault with intent to rob", from five years, as fixed by the jury, to two years and eleven months in the Reformatory. Executive clemency is recommended by the following: A petition signed by J.C. Tipton, Chief Police, F B Hadden, D. S., William Cravens, Sheriff, A N Crook, D. S., H R Sullivan, Police, Neal Guilfoile, Police, J K Whitt, Jailer, County Judge Earl W. Senff; eleven of the trial jurors; W C Hamilton, Commth's. Atty., Reid Prewitt, County Attorney. And Hon. JAIL SENTENCE PARDON.

COMMUTATION OF SENTENCE.

The Governor commuted the sentence imposed upon THELMA JEFFRIES by Fayette Circuit Court, for "Manslaughter", Oct. term, 1930, from 10 years in the State Reformatory to 5 years. Clemency is recommended in this case by letter from Hon. James Park, Commth's Atty., Miss Ella Lewis, of the Welfare Board, and by other outstand-

ing women of Lexington, Ky., that she has served about 3 years of her term, with a good prison record, with no previous criminal record; and it also appears from a statement made by Dr. L. D. Adams, Prison Medical Director, that said Thelma Jeffries has an acute case of tuberculosis, and is not responding to treatment.

In order to give the defendant ALLEN GRAY an opportunity to procure necessary data to be filed with the Governor in support of the said Gray's application for clemency, as requested by the defendant's Attorney E Paul De-nunzio, and by Hon. Charles W. Logan, Assistant Commonwealth's Atty. of Jefferson Co., the Governor enters the following order, directed to the Warden of the Penitentiary at Eddyville, Kentucky, viz: "Therefore the Warden of the Kentucky State Penitentiary at Eddyville, Kentucky, will take due notice of this order and be governed accordingly, and he will not execute the said Allen Gray, as by order directed and entered in the Executive Journal on the nineteenth day of October, 1933, or at all unless ordered so to do by the Governor of the Commonwealth by subsequent order duly made and entered, and of which the said Warden shall have due and timely notice."

RESTORATION OF CITIZENSHIP

The Governor granted unto OSCAR ARNOLD restoration of citizenship, of which he was deprived by judgment of the Clark Circuit Court, April term, 1931, for "house-breaking", and sentencing him to two years in the State Reformatory. #### COMMUTATION OF SENTENCE.

BOONE BOWLING. #### COMMUTATION OF SENTENCE.

ALLEN GRAY. The Governor commuted the sentence of Allen Gray, in Jefferson Circuit Court, Nov. 30, 1932, for "wilful murder", from the death penalty inflicted by said judgment, to that of Life imprisonment in one of the State Penitentiaries of Kentucky, and that said Gray shall not be electrocuted pursuant to said judgment. Numerous good citizens of Henry Co., the former home of said Gray, and of Louisville, Ky., Jefferson Co., where the crime was committed, have petitioned the Governor for clemency herein. It appears that said Gray did not have means with which to employ counsel to defend him; that he was convicted for killing a negro woman who was his common-law wife; that she had deserted him and gone with another man, and had taken away with her his household goods; that the deceased woman was of

disreputable character; that the said Gray had great provocation; that he had previously been a law-abiding and respectful negro.
