THEODORE R. MIDDLETON, SHERIFF OF HARLAN COUNTY,  
CHARGES FOR REMOVAL OF, BY GOVERNOR RUBY LAFFOON.

"FRANKFORT, KENTUCKY, JULY 2nd., 1935."

"I, Ruby Laffoon, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, upon affidavits filed with me, hereby charge one Theodore R. Middleton, Sheriff of Harlan County, Kentucky, with neglect of official duty committed in manner and form as follows; to-wit:

1. That as Sheriff of Harlan County, since he qualified and entered upon the duties of said office on or about the first Monday in January, 1934, he has, at the request and solicitation of the various coal operators at Lynch, Benham, and many other mining camps and operations in Harlan County, appointed deputy sheriffs of Harlan County, many of whom at the time of their said appointment were known by the said sheriff to be and to have been men with criminal records, and who had been convicted of felonies in Harlan County and other counties, and were men whom he knew at said time to be and to have been dangerous and violent men, and men whose reputations were that of being dangerous, vicious, and violent men, and that these said deputy sheriffs were appointed for the purpose that they might be employed by the various coal operators in Harlan County, and for the express purpose of harassing, intimidating and preventing members and field representatives of the United Mine Workers of America from coming into Harlan County and among the miners of Harlan County for the purpose of soliciting said miners to become members of the labor organization known as the United Mine Workers of America, and that among the said deputy sheriffs appointed for said purpose are and were: Ben Unthank, Frank White, George Lee, Merle Middleton, Milt Middleton, Guy Rogers, Bob Eldridge, L. E. Ball, Lee Hardin, Joseph Manifee, Victor L. Creech, L. F. Ball, J. G. Metcalf, Dan Russell, Bill Lewis, Otis Noe, Ike Young, Henry Stepp, Asa Cusick, Lewis Middleton, Wash Irving, Willy Mason, John Hickey, Bryan Middleton, Clarence Middleton, James T. Middleton, Lee Fleenor, Bige Gross, Palmer Howard, Smith Ball and others.

2. That the said Theodore R. Middleton, on or about the 9th day of February, 1935, both by himself and his deputy sheriffs who were acting at said time under him and his immediate authority and directions in the town of Cumberland, Harlan County, Kentucky, wrongfully, unlawfully and without legal right or authority arrested: Milton Hall, Doc Roninette, Roy Beggs, Murrell Sturgill, C. D. Hall, James Westmoreland, Ted Clark, Frank Hall, J. R. Stines, James D. Moore, Joe E. Richardson, Robert Sanders, Ed Dobbins, Theodore Dezarne, Lee Adams, Walter Heck, Roy Elliott, Joe Norris, Arthur Ketts, Mike Ollie, Joe Davis, John Lucas, and Albert Timmons; and at the time of the making of said arrests by the said T. R. Middleton, and his said deputies under his orders and directions as aforesaid, none of the said officers including the said Middleton had warrants of any kind for the said parties so arrested, or any of them, and none of the said parties so arrested had committed any offense in the presence of the said T. R. Middleton, or any of the said deputy sheriffs, and none of the said parties so arrested had committed a felony of any character and neither the said Middleton nor any of the said deputy sheriffs so acting under his authority and directions in making said arrests, or any of them had any reasons to believe that any of the said parties so arrested had committed a felony.

He further charges that at the time of the making of said arrests above mentioned, the parties so arrested demanded of the said T. R. Middleton and his deputies acting in connection with him in making said arrests to know on what charges they were being arrested and neither did the said Middleton nor any of his deputy sheriffs present or show any warrants or authority for the making of said arrests; and he further charges that neither the said T. R. Middleton nor any of his deputy sheriffs so arresting said parties took them or any of them, before any court, and without doing so they placed the said parties whom they so arrested in a jail at Cumberland, Kentucky, without any commitment papers of any character, and after keeping them in said jail at Cumberland for some hours the said Middleton and his deputies carried all of said parties so arrested to the jail at Harlan County, Kentucky, a distance of twenty miles or more, and without taking the said parties so arrested before any Court, placed all of said parties in the jail at Harlan, Kentucky, without any commitment papers of any character.

He further charges that the parties so arrested by the said Middleton and his deputy sheriffs requested and demanded of the said parties so making said arrests to permit them to execute a bond, and that the said Middleton and his deputy sheriffs failed and refused to permit the said parties so arrested by them to execute any bond, and he further charges that the said Middleton and his deputy so making said arrests kept the parties so arrested by them in the jail at Harlan until the 11th day of February, 1935, at which time they were brought before Morris Saylor, County Judge of Harlan County, and it was then for the first time that they learned what they were charged with or accused of, and at that time they found that the said Judge had issued warrants against each of the said parties so arrested, charging them with the offense of a public nuisance, and the said warrants showed that they were sworn out by the said T. R. Middleton, Sheriff of Harlan County. He further charges that the said Middleton had no personal knowledge of any of the offenses charged against the parties in said warrants, and did not have any of said warrants in his possession, nor were any of the said warrants in the possession of any of the said deputy sheriffs so assisting him in the making of the said arrests, at the time said arrests were made.

He further charges that all of said parties so arrested by the said T. R. Middleton, and his deputies under his authority and direction were discharged on said charges and the said cases against them were dismissed on motion of the County Attorney of Harlan County, Elmon Middleton, and by order of Morris Saylor, County Judge of Harlan County before whom said charges were preferred.

He further charges that it was the duty of the said T. R. Middleton and his deputy sheriffs acting under his authority and direction not to arrest anyone who

had committed an offense, without a warrant unless the offense was committed; or in their presence, whom they had no reason to believe had committed a felony, and that it was his further duty to notify the parties whom they arrested of the charges upon which they were being arrested, and it was their further duty upon making said arrests to take said parties before some Court, and not to place them in jail until they were ordered to do so by some Court having authority to make said order, and it was their further duty to permit the said parties so arrested to execute bond in a reasonable sum for their appearance before some Court to answer any charges that were made against them and it is further charged that neither the said Middleton nor any of his deputies performed any of these above named duties, and that in failing and refusing to do so they were guilty of neglect of official duty.

3. It is further charged that sometime in the months of October, November, or December, 1934, one John Smith, who was a member of the United Mine Workers of America and a coal checkweighman at the Cornet-Lewis Coal Company at Lewallen in Harlan County, Kentucky was wrongfully and unlawfully assaulted by a deputy sheriff by the name of Ball and also by another deputy sheriff by the name of Jones, and after so arresting said John Smith without any warrant and at a time when said Smith had committed no offense in their presence, and when they had no reason to believe he had committed a felony, and said parties turned the said Smith over to Frank White and George Lee, each and all of whom were deputy sheriffs of Harlan County under the said T. R. Middleton, and each and all of them were acting under the special directions of the said Middleton in doing the said acts herein complained of. He says that the said John Smith was wrongfully and unlawfully beat, bruised and assaulted by the said White and Lee, and many severe wounds were inflicted on him by said parties by striking him with pistols and clubs, and that the said deputy sheriffs threatened to kill said John Smith, and the said deputy sheriffs told the said Smith that he nor no Goddam anybody else could have the Union Hall in Harlan County, and that they intended to kill him. It is further charged that the said Smith reported these acts and abuses of the said deputy sheriffs to the said T. R. Middleton both in person and through others in his presence and requested the said Middleton to give him protection against these unlawful acts and assaults of his said deputy sheriffs and to arrest said parties for said offenses, and the said Middleton failed and refused to give to the said Smith any protection or any assistance and failed and refused to arrest any of the said parties against whom the said Smith had complained and it is further charged that the said Middleton told the party who appealed to him for the said Smith, "You take him out of Harlan. He is an undesirable citizen. We do not want him here and will not give him any protection."

4. It is further charged that one William Clontz on or about the last of June 1934, was a member of the United Mine Workers of America, and at said time was a field representative of said organization whose business and duty it was to take up grievances and settle disputes between the miners and coal operators of Harlan County, and that on said date, he, Clontz, was attending a board meeting of the Harlan County Coal Operators Association and the United Mine Workers of America in Knoxville, Tennessee, of which meeting the said T. R. Middleton, Sheriff of Harlan County, at said time well knew, and that while the said Clontz was attending said meeting, and in the absence of the said Clontz at about 1:20 A. M. the home of the said Clontz was shot into by parties, and several shots were fired through the window of his house, and some of them struck around and near the bed in which Clontz's son was sleeping and that said house was shot into and procured to be shot into by B. F. Unthank, George Lee, and Frank White, and that this was done with the knowledge and under the directions of the said T. R. Middleton, Sheriff of Harlan County.

It is further charged that when the said Clontz returned to his home he called the said T. R. Middleton, and advised him of the fact that his home had been shot into and of what had occurred to his home and requested the said Middleton to come to his home, and investigate the said matter and give him and his home and his family protection as it was his duty as sheriff to do so, and it is further charged that the said Middleton failed and refused and neglected to go to the home of the said Clontz and investigate the said matter, and that the said Middleton told the said Clontz at said time that he could not come or send his deputy sheriffs down there, and the said Middleton told Clontz the only thing for him to do was to leave the county.

5. It is further charged that on or about December 1, 1934, and while the said T. R. Middleton was the Sheriff of Harlan County, one Carl Williams, a member of the United Mine Workers of America, and who was at the time employed by William Turnblazer, President of District No. 19 of said organization to assist in organizing the unorganized portion of Harlan County and to solicit the coal miners in this section to become members of the United Mine Workers of America, and while the said Williams was engaged in the said work, he, Williams was sitting in the New Harlan Hotel in the town of Harlan, Kentucky, perfectly sober, unarmed, peaceful and quiet, and doing nothing to anyone, and creating no disturbance of any kind, and while he was so doing he was wrongfully, wilfully and forcibly assaulted, beat and bruised on his head, arms and different parts of his body by George Lee, Ben Unthank, and Bill Brook, each of whom at the time were deputies under T. R. Middleton, Sheriff of Harlan County, and the said Lee, Unthank and Brock after assaulting, beating and bruising the said Williams as above stated, arrested and took the said Williams to the jail of Harlan County and incarcerated him therein, and this incarceration in said jail was done by said parties without the said parties bringing the said Williams before any Court and without any commitment papers, and at the time of said arrest and incarceration he inquired of the said parties so making said arrest of the nature of the charge against him and for the reason for his being placed in jail, and they failed and refused to notify him of any charge or to give him any reason for his having been placed in jail.

It is further charged that the said Lee, Unthank and Brock at said time searched the said Williams in the presence of a large crowd and found no weapons of any kind on him, or about his person, and in fact, he had no weapons of any character concealed on or about his person, and on the next morning after he was so incarcerated in jail the said deputy sheriffs so arresting him preferred charges against him of carrying concealed weapons, but the said Williams was never tried and no witness ever appeared against him.

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It is further charged that the said Lee, Unthank, and Brock in making of said assault upon the said Williams, and in making his arrest and placing him in jail as above stated, did same with the knowledge, consent, and procurement of the said T. R. Middleton, Sheriff of Harlan County, and under his direction, and neither at the time of said arrest nor prior thereto had the said Williams committed any offense of any character in the presence of said deputies making said arrest nor did the parties making that said arrest have any reasonable grounds to believe, and they did not believe that the said Williams had committed any felony of any character, and neither of said officers at said time had any warrant for the arrest of the said Williams.

It is further charged that after the assault, beating, and bruising, and the wrongful arrest of the said Carl Williams, and his incarceration in the Harlan County jail, he procured warrants against the said Lee, Unthank and Brock for these trespasses, assaults and injuries committed on and against him by the said parties, and placed said warrants for execution in the hands of the said T. R. Middleton, Sheriff of Harlan County, and the said Middleton wrongfully, wilfully and corruptly failed and refused to discharge his official duty, and to arrest said parties on said warrants, and the said parties were never arrested on said warrant and were never brought to trial on said charges, and the said Williams was never summoned as a witness to appear against the said Lee, Unthank, and Brock, or either of them, on any of the said charges.

6. It is further charged that one M. A. Musick, a resident of Evarts, Harlan County, Kentucky, and at the time hereinbefore mentioned was a member of the United Mine Workers of America, and was at said times a field representative of that organization in district No. 19, presided over by William Turnblazer of Jellico, Tennessee, was on or about May 19, 1934, arrested by George Lee, Frank White, Ben Unthank, Charlie Blair, and others, six in number, all of whom at said time were duly appointed and acting deputy sheriffs under T. R. Middleton, Sheriff of Harlan County, and all of whom were at the said time in the making of said arrests and other acts committed by them as hereinafter stated, acting under the authority and directions and procurement of the said T. R. Middleton, and all of the said acts herein specified were done by the consent of the said T. R. Middleton, and was done for the purpose of preventing the said M. A. Musick from performing his duties as an organizer for the United Mine Workers of America, and from exercising his legal rights as a citizen of Harlan County, and the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

It is further charged that at the said time and immediately after his arrest which occurred at his home, he was carried by said officers to the jail of Harlan County, and incarcerated therein. It is further charged that neither at the time of said arrest nor at any time prior thereto had the said Musick committed any offense in the presence of any of said officers making arrest nor did said officers have any reason to believe, neither did they believe, that he had committed any felony, and neither of said officers had any warrant for the arrest of the said Musick; and the said Musick was so carried to the jail of Harlan County and so incarcerated without being brought before any Court and without any commitment papers, and the said Musick demanded of the said officers making said arrests and incarceration to know upon what charge he was being arrested and they failed and refused to notify him of any charge whatever that they were making against him. It is further charged that these said officers were armed with high powered rifles, pistols and other weapons. It is further charged that he was finally released from jail on a five hundred dollar (\$500) bond which was finally allowed him by the County Judge and County Attorney of Harlan County but he never tried on any charge and he was released from custody, and the case dismissed against him with the advise that he had better leave the state for his safety.

It is further charged that on or about May 26, 1934, the said M. A. Musick and other United Mine Workers of America, who at said time were on their way to Shields, Kentucky, for the purpose of attending a meeting of the United Mine Workers of America, which was scheduled to be addressed by Governor Edwin P. Morrow, the said Musick and those in company with him, all of whom were members of the United Mine Workers of America, were met by George Lee, Frank White, Ben Unthank, Merle Middleton, and others who were at said time deputy sheriffs of Harlan County under the said T. R. Middleton, sheriff, and who were at said time acting under the advise, directions and authority of the said T. R. Middleton, to do and perform the acts hereinafter stated which at the said time they did do, and that there were armed with machine guns, pistols, high powered rifles and other firearms and weapons of death, and that at said time the said gang of deputy sheriffs above mentioned wrongfully, and unlawfully assaulted, beat and bruised and jabbed the said M. A. Musick and a man by the name of Brock, and another by the name of Turner and forced them to turn back and not to attend the said meeting of the United Mine Workers of America. It is further charged that at said times and immediately after the said Musick, and the other parties named were so assaulted, beat and bruised, intimidated and carried to jail the said Musick appealed to the sheriff of Harlan County for protection and advised him of the conduct of his said deputy sheriffs as above mentioned, and the said sheriff said to Musick, "I have always known you and heard of you as an upright man and mine worker, but you fellows have got into this Goddam racketeering and I am getting tired of it. I have got to protect the coal operators." And the said Middleton at said time told the said Musick that regardless of what might happen to him it would be useless to call at his office for protection and further said, "You and that long nosed Clontz are on the spot and you might as well get out of the county while you are alive."

It is further charged that the said Musick went before the Grand Jury of Harlan County and testified with reference to these offenses and assaults that had been committed on and against him by the said Sheriff of Harlan County, T. R. Middleton, and his said deputies aforesaid or that at least he testified before the Grand Jury as to these actions, and none of said parties were ever arrested or tried on any of said charges and he was never summoned as a witness to testify against them, and that the said T. R. Middleton, as sheriff aforesaid was guilty of neglect of official duty in failing and refusing to protect said Musick, and in procuring the said deputy sheriffs aforesaid mentioned to commit the trespasses and assaults upon the said Musick, and to the other parties referred to herein.

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It is further charged that during the years 1933, 1934, and 1935, one Lawrence Dwyer during this time was a citizen and resident of Pineville, Bell County, Kentucky, and was during that time an International representative of the United Mine Workers of America, and that as such his duties required him to go into Harlan County doing work in connection with the coal mining business in said county and that during all of said times one Robert Childers who was also a resident of said Pineville, Bell County, Kentucky was a member of the United Mine Workers of America, and was Secretary-Treasurer of district 19 of said organization presided over by William Turnblazer, President of said district. It is further charged that on several occasions during said period of time and especially during the years 1934 and 1935 the said Lawrence Dwyer and Robert Childers went into the town of Harlan as the representatives of the United Mine Workers of America to settle disputes and differences arising between and among the coal operators.

It is further charged that the said Lawrence Dwyer and Robert Childers procured warrants against the said George Lee, Frank White, Ben Unthank, and other deputy sheriffs of Harlan County who were acting as said deputy sheriffs under the said T. R. Middleton, charging them with various attacks and assaults upon the said Lawrence Dwyer, Robert Childers and others, and said warrants were placed in the hands of the said T. R. Middleton as sheriff of Harlan County for execution and the said Middleton wrongfully, wilfully and corruptly failed and refused to execute any of said warrants, and to serve any papers against the said defendants named therein.

It is further charged that one William Turnblazer who at the times hereinafter set out was a resident of Jellico, Tennessee, and a member of the United Mine Workers of America, and President of District No. 19 of that organization comprising five counties of Kentucky including Harlan County, and all of Tennessee.

It is further charged that on or about December 8, 1934, and at a time when T. R. Middleton was sheriff of Harlan County, Kentucky, the said Turnblazer, in attending to duties connected with his position as a member of the United Mine Workers of America and as President of the said district No. 19 had occasion to go to and did go to the town of Harlan County, Kentucky, and that on his way from Pineville, Kentucky to Harlan, Kentucky and near the Harlan-Bell County line, the car in which he was driving was flagged down by a gang of men, one of whom he recognized as Merle Middleton, a brother of the said T. R. Middleton, who was at said time a deputy sheriff under the said T. R. Middleton, and that he failed and refused to stop his car and proceeded on as rapidly as he could into the said town of Harlan and registered at the Lewallen Hotel in said town, and that as soon as he registered at said hotel of said town, the lobby and corridor of the hotel in which he procured a room was filled with armed deputy sheriffs of Harlan County, fifty or more in number all of said deputy sheriffs were acting at the time under the authority and directions, and by the consent and approval of the said T. R. Middleton, sheriff of Harlan County, and this armed gang of deputy sheriffs were making threats against and cursing the said William Turnblazer and other members of the United Mine Workers of America who were in the room of the said Turnblazer at said time, among whom were Dale Stapleton, Carl Williams, and others; and it is further charged that at said time the said Turnblazer and those hemmed in his room and those associated with him appealed to T. R. Middleton, Sheriff of Harlan County who was in his office and in said town of Harlan at said time, for protection against said armed mob and the said Middleton failed and refused to give to the said Turnblazer and those associated with him any protection against said armed deputy sheriffs, and the said Turnblazer and those associated with him, in order to be relieved of the said situation in which they were placed and to be protected against the danger with which they were surrounded at the hands of said deputy sheriffs, were forced to appeal to the Governor and Adjt. General of the State of Kentucky, late in the night of December 8, and on the morning of December 9, the said Governor and adjutant General furnished them protection and gave to them a detachment of State troops and State militia to escort them safely out of Harlan County. It is further charged that the said Sheriff Middleton well knew of the danger in which the said Turnblazer and those associated with him were placed, and that he wilfully and corruptly failed and refused to discharge his duty as sheriff aforesaid, and failed and refused to give to the said Turnblazer the protection and relief which the said sheriff knew he needed, and were entitled to under the law.

9. It is further charged that one Robert Hart, who was at the times hereinafter set out about fifty years old and resided in Letcher County, Kentucky, and was a member of the United Mine Workers of America and that on January 6, 1935, he was regularly appointed and qualified deputy sheriff of Letcher County, Kentucky, and that on said date which was Sunday, the said Hart learned of a meeting which was advertised to be held at Lynch, Kentucky, and that at said time the said Hart had a warrant in his possession for the arrest of a man by the name of Silas Cole, which warrant had been sent to him from Morgan County, Kentucky and charged the said Cole with the crime of murder, and that he had been informed that the said Cole might be found at Lynch, Kentucky and that on the said date, January 6, 1935, he drove in his car to Lynch for the purpose of trying to locate and arrest the said Cole. It is further charged that the said Hart, at the said time, under the authority and supervision and with the knowledge and consent of T. R. Middleton, Sheriff of Harlan County, was wrongfully, unlawfully and corruptly assaulted and arrested by the said T. R. Middleton and his deputy sheriffs acting under him and by his authority, and was disarmed and abused and threatened, and after being held by the said Middleton and his deputies in custody for several hours he was finally released and discharged and his pistol that had been taken off of him was thrown on the concrete pavement by the said T. R. Middleton, and under the immediate direction of the said Middleton, his pistol was broken up and destroyed with a large sledge hammer which the said deputy sheriff was directed to do by the said T. R. Middleton and at the time the said Middleton said to the officer, "Officer, break that gun," and the said officer, who was named Lee, did pound the pistol with the hammer and broke it up and then said T. R. Middleton handed the pistol back to the said Hart and said to him "Take this back to Letcher County with you and show it to them Goddam so-of-bitches, and tell them we haven't any use for them over here."

It is further charged that the said acts were done by the said T. R. Middleton as sheriff in direct violation of his duties as Sheriff of Harlan County, and

pursuant to a previous conspiracy, arrangement and agreement on his part with the coal operators of Harlan County, and especially at Lynch and Benham to keep out all organizers of the United Mine Workers of America from Harlan County, and to prevent the organization of the said miners of said county.

It is further charged that prior to the time and commission of any and all of the acts and conduct of the said T. R. Middleton and his various deputy sheriffs mentioned in the nine foregoing charges and specifications, the said T. R. Middleton formed and entered into a conspiracy, arrangement, and agreement with the various coal operators of Harlan County, including the operators operating at Lynch and Benham in said county, that in consideration the said operators should assist him in making and executing his official bonds required of him as Sheriff of Harlan County during his term of office, that he, the said Middleton, would appoint deputies to be named and selected by the said coal operators from time to time, and that said deputy sheriffs so appointed should be paid by the said coal operators, and that they should be authorized by the said T. R. Middleton to do and perform such acts as in the opinion of the said coal operators were necessary to keep all members of the United Mine Workers of America and especially those members who were employed as organizers to organize the miners of Harlan County and to have them become members of the United Mine Workers of America, out of Harlan County, and to use such means and force as was necessary to accomplish that purpose and pursuant to said agreement, arrangement and conspiracy and the said Middleton did appoint such deputy sheriffs as were suggested by the various coal operators and did give to them the directions and advice to do and perform such things and acts as they were requested to do by the said coal companies, and the number of deputy sheriffs so appointed amounted to almost three hundred, some of whom, from time to time, were disqualified by reason of having been arrested of felonies and confined in the State penitentiary, and it is further charged that all of the acts and conduct of said various deputy sheriffs so appointed by the said T. R. Middleton as set out in the foregoing nine paragraphs hereof were done under and pursuant to, and in furtherance of, said arrangement, agreement and conspiracy, and all of said actions and conduct under the law and under Section 3766a-6 of Carroll's Kentucky Statutes, 1930 Edition, constituted and constitutes neglect of official duty, and all of said acts were fraudulently, wilfully and intentionally performed and done by the said T. R. Middleton.

The affidavits upon which the foregoing charges are made are filed herewith as part hereof the same as if copied in full herein.

EXECUTIVE ORDER

NATIONAL GUARD OF KENTUCKY TO HARLAN COUNTY

Governor Ruby Laffoon this day filed with the Secretary of State an Executive Order signed by him on August 1st., 1935, and which Order is ordered to be recorded, and is in words and figures as follows, viz:

"EXECUTIVE ORDER."

"Whereas, it has been repeatedly represented to me, the undersigned as Governor of Kentucky, that a condition of unrest now exists in Harlan County and has so existed for a long period of time, that numerous men have been beaten, bruised, knocked down and seriously wounded by men acting as Deputy Sheriffs of the County. That the right of free speech is denied citizens of the Commonwealth and others; that the right of peaceful assemblage is not permitted unless the assemblage is to the liking of Theodore Middleton, the Sheriff of the County; that houses have been dynamited-homes shot into and that, in fact, a reign of terror now exists in said County, and has so existed for some months.

It further appearing that the Sheriff of said County in collusion with other officials and by the use of numerous deputies is intimidating brow beating and terrorizing the citizens of the County and seeking by force to impress his will upon the people in defiance of law, right and justice; and it appearing that the partisans of the said Sheriff's political faction are contemplating committing wholesale election frauds in Harlan County in the forthcoming primary election to be held Saturday, August 3, 1935, some 15,400 Democratic ballots having been printed for said primary when never but once in the history of primary elections in said County were there ever more than one or two thousand ballots cast in a Democratic primary.

It having been further represented to me by officials of the County and other good citizens that already a large number of said ballots have been stolen from the Courthouse for unlawful purposes; that by reason of threats of violence and other acts of intimidation many of the voters of the County are afraid and do not feel free to cast their votes on election day.

In further appearing from reports received from officials and other good citizens of Harlan County that Theodore Middleton is very partisan in his attitude and has had appointed as election officers many of his own deputies and members of his family who are his partisans and who belong to his political faction, and has also had appointed as election officers many others, in fact a great majority of the election officers who are his partisans and who will do his bidding while acting as election officers, that none but the partisans of his faction have any real representation at the polls.

It further appearing from absolutely reliable authority that conditions of lawlessness exist in Harlan County under the protection of some of the officials, that citizens of the County and visitors therein are being bodily assaulted, beaten and wounded either by Deputy Sheriffs or under their protection, and people visiting the County on legal business have been and are being forced to leave the County by reason of threats made by those in authority, and it having been made to appear to me that these outrageous conditions will continue to exist and the lives and property of the people of the County have been and are in a constant state of peril and that the officials of said County are either unwilling or unable to afford protection to the citizens and are unwilling or unable to properly enforce the laws of the Commonwealth; and that conditions are such that especially on election day irreparable harm may be done to citizens and others and that property rights will be endangered unless outside protection be given.

Now, therefore, in order that the lives, constitutional rights and property of the people of Harlan County may be properly safeguarded and protected and that the right of free speech and peaceful assemblage may be maintained and that a fair, honest and peaceful election may be held on Saturday, August 3rd; and that the votes cast on said election day may be legally and honestly counted as cast, the Adjutant General of Kentucky, Henry H. Denhardt, and all of the National Guard of Kentucky or so much thereof as the said Adjutant General may by military order or orders direct are hereby ordered on active duty,

That he said Denhardt will cause all or such part of the National Guard as he may deem necessary to be assembled and they will proceed in to Harlan County for the purpose of preserving peace and order in said County for the further purpose or guaranteeing to the people of said County the right of free speech and of peaceful, lawful assemblage, and for the further purpose of guaranteeing to the people of said

County the right to have a fair, honest, free and legal election. He is further ordered and authorized to use such force as may, to him, seem reasonably necessary to attain these ends.

The said Adjutant General is further ordered and directed to keep a sufficient number of the National Guard on duty in Harlan County as he may deem necessary so long as the conditions hereinbefore described may continue, and until the withdrawal of said troops shall be ordered by the Governor.

\*- "TO THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE KENTUCKY STATE PENITENTIARY AT EDDYVILLE, KENTUCKY, AND TO ALL SHERIFFS, MARSHALS, CONSTABLES, AND ALL OTHER PEACE OFFICERS OF THIS COMMONWEALTH OF WHATSOEVER TITLE,"

"GREETING."

"WHEREAS, the undersigned Ruby Laffoon, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky by executive order dated the 14th day of August, 1935, and entered on the Executive Journal, did appoint a Prison Advisory Commission consisting of Hon. Charles Davidson, Berea, Kentucky, Hon. Roy Steinfert, Covington, Kentucky, Hon. Gus Heicken, Louisville, Kentucky, Dr. John Lowe Fort, Louisville, Kentucky and Hon. Ben D. Ringo, Owensboro, Kentucky; and did by said executive order request, direct and empower said Prison Advisory Commission to make an investigation of the conditions now existing at the Kentucky State Penitentiary, Eddyville, Kentucky and at the Kentucky State Reformatory, Frankfort, Kentucky; and did by said executive order request, direct, and empower said Prison Advisory Commission to investigate the general demeanor and conduct of all the present inhabitants now confined in said institutions, and also their past records, for the purpose of determining who of said inmates are proper subjects for executive clemency to be exercised by the Governor; and,

"WHEREAS, the said Prison Advisory Commission has brought to the attention of the Governor the exemplary conduct and good demeanor of the present inhabitants of the State Penitentiary at Eddyville, Kentucky, who are now confined in said institution from different section of the State, most of them being married and having families to support, or young men and boys without families. The said Prison Advisory Commission has recommended that the imposed sentences of those herein named be commuted, or that executive clemency be extended to them which will allow them to be released by executive order, that they may return to their homes and remain out of said prison so long as their conduct is exemplary and they comply with all conditions imposed upon them by which they are released; and,

WHEREAS, the Kentucky State Penitentiary has now inhabitants, which is almost double the population that it is designed to accommodate, which fact of itself is inimical to the health of its inmates. Those confined in this institution are practically without employment, as the contracts of employment heretofore existing have expired, and other contracts can not be entered into for the employment of convict labor, owing to certain existing laws, rules, and regulations now in force, under which such employment is regulated; and,

WHEREAS, The General Assembly of Kentucky, not anticipating the intolerable conditions now existing at this institution, failed to make an appropriation for the erection of additional quarters to accommodate those confined in this institution, and failed to provide the necessary means to adequately support and care of those now confined therein; consequently the Board of Public Welfare is without authority and has not sufficient public funds to meet the exigencies of the situation now prevailing at

this and other public institutions of the State; and,

WHEREAS, the said Prison Advisory Commission, after a full and careful investigation, has recommended to the undersigned Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky that there should be at once conditionally released from the said State Penitentiary at Eddyville, Kentucky, the following named inmates, to wit:

ALLSBROOK, ATHEL, No. 10509, a white man, 18 years of age when received, sentenced in the Hopkins Circuit Court, September term, 1934, to serve two years on charge No. 2 in the Kentucky State Penitentiary upon the charge of operating a motor vehicle without owner's consent. He was received on charge No. 2 in the institution June 3, 1934, and his term will expire June 3, 1936.

ANDERSON, ELMORE, No. 10834, a negro man, 28 years of age when received, sentenced in the Simpson Circuit Court, November term, 1934, to serve two years in the Kentucky State Penitentiary upon the charge of dwelling house breaking. He was received in the institution November 23, 1934, and his term will expire November 23, 1936.

WOOLRIDGE, BILL, No. 10118, a white man, 23 years of age when received, sentenced in the Warren Circuit Court, January term, 1934, to serve six years in the Kentucky State Penitentiary upon the charge of robbery and malicious shooting at another without wounding. He was received in the institution January 16, 1934, and his term will expire January 16, 1940.

YEISER, GEORGE R., No. 9371, a negro man, 24 years of age when received, sentenced in the Jefferson Circuit Court, February term, 1933, to serve five years in the Kentucky State Penitentiary upon the charge of robbery. He was received in the institution February 21, 1933, and his term will expire February 21, 1938.

The Penitentiary at Eddyville has now about twice as many inhabitants as it was built to accommodate and as the Fall term of Court in the various judicial districts wherein those convicted are sent to Eddyville are now in session, it becomes imperative that the number of those confined in this institution be diminished so as to make room for those that will be sent there.

There was no appropriation made by the General Assembly to enlarge the accommodations at this Penitentiary and no money available for such purposes, this necessitating some action on the part of the Governor to relieve the crowded condition. The Prison Advisory Commission, heretofore appointed by the Governor, has recommended that executive clemency be extended to those hereinbefore named, after having made a careful investigation of their previous criminal records and their conduct since they were confined in this institution.

The granting of the conditional pardon, will in a measure, relieve the congestion in this institution and will result in the saving of thousands of dollars of the taxpayers of the State. Besides those to whom this favor is extended will be given the opportunity to reinstate themselves as citizens of the State.

NOW, THEREFORE, in order that the above named persons may be given an opportunity to establish themselves as peaceful and law-abiding citizens, and by the recommendations of the Prison Advisory Commission, and by virtue of the power vested in me as Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, I do hereby and now pardon the persons above named, upon the following conditions, to wit:

FIRST: that the said named persons, and each of them, will, until the expiration dates of the sentences which they are now serving, conduct themselves as useful, upright, and law-abiding citizens of the Commonwealth of Kentucky; and provided that if any of them shall fail to so conduct themselves for said period, those so failing may, by executive order made and entered upon the Executive Journal, be re-arrested and re-confined in either of the two named penal institutions of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, and be required to serve out the full unexpired terms of their respective sentences.

SECOND: that if any person granted executive clemency herein by this executive order shall, before the date on which his sentence would have expired, be convicted of a felony in any of the Courts of this Commonwealth, the pardon hereby granted said person shall be null and void and of no effect, and said person shall be subject to arrest and shall be required to serve the unexpired portion of the sentence for which he is now incarcerated.

THIRD: that if the persons hereinabove named conduct themselves as law-abiding citizens and violate none of the conditions of this executive order and of this conditional pardon, then they, and each of them shall on the dates shown herein as the dates when their respective terms would have expired had they remained in prison, be granted a full and free pardon and restored to full citizenship, and all the rights and privileges thereof; and they and each of them shall be privileged thereafter to exercise and enjoy citizenship as other citizens, provided, of course, they do not violate any of the conditions of this conditional pardon, and that they do not violate any of the conditions upon which this conditional pardon is granted.
