TO THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE KENTUCKY STATE PENITENTIARY AT EDDYVILLE, KENTUCKY, AND ALL SHERIFFS, MARSHALLS, CONSTABLES, AND ALL OTHER PEACE OFFICERS OF THIS COMMONWEALTH OF WHATSOEVER TITLE,

GREETING:

"WHEREAS, the undersigned Ruby Laffoon, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, by executive order dated the 28 day of March, 1935, and entered on the Executive Journal, did appoint a Prison Advisory Commission consisting of Hon. Charles Davidson, Berea, Kentucky, Hon. Roy Steinfeld, Covington, Kentucky, Hon. Gus Heiken, Louisville, Kentucky, Dr. John Lowe Fort, Louisville, Kentucky and Hon. Ben D. Ringo, Owensboro, Kentucky; and did by said executive order request, direct and empower said Prison Advisory Commission to make an investigation of the conditions now existing at the Kentucky State Penitentiary, Eddyville, Kentucky and at the Kentucky State Reformatory, Frankfort, Kentucky; and did by said executive order request, direct and empower said Prison Advisory Commission to investigate the general demeanor and conduct of all the present inhabitants now confined in said institutions, and also their past records, for the purpose of determining who of said inmates are proper subjects for executive clemency to be exercised by the Governor; and,

WHEREAS, the said Prison Advisory Commission has brought to the attention of the Governor the exemplary conduct and good demeanor of the present inhabitants of the State Penitentiary at Eddyville, Kentucky, who are now confined in said institutions from different sections of the State, most of them being married and having families to support, or young men and boys without families. The said Prison Advisory Commission has recommended that the imposed sentences of those herein named be commuted, or that executive clemency be extended to them which will allow them to be released by executive order, that they may return to their homes and remain out of said prison so long as their conduct is exemplary and they comply with all conditions imposed upon them by which they are released; and,

WHEREAS, the Kentucky State Penitentiary has now _____ inhabitants, which is almost double the population that it is designed to accommodate, which fact of itself is inimical to the health of its inmates. Those confined in this institution are practically without employment, as the contracts of employment heretofore existing have expired, and other contracts can not be entered into for the employment of convict labor,

WHEREAS, The General Assembly of Kentucky, not anticipating the intolerable conditions now existing at this institution, failed to make an appropriation for the erection of additional quarters to accommodate those confined in this institution, and failed to provide the necessary means to adequately support and care for those now confined therein; consequently the Board of Public Welfare is without authority and has not sufficient public funds to meet the exigencies of the situation now prevailing at this and other public institutions of the State; and,

WHEREAS, the said Prison Advisory Commission, after a full and careful investigation, has recommended to the undersigned Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky that there should be at once conditionally released from the Said State Penitentiary at Eddyville, Kentucky, the following named inmates, to wit:

CORDIS ADAMS, No. 9401, a white man, 24 years of age when received, sentenced in the Hopkins Circuit Court, February term, 1933, to serve seven years in the Kentucky State Penitentiary upon charge of robbery. He was received in the institution February 26, 1933, and his term will expire February 26, 1940.

JOHNNIE BERRY, No. 11270, a white man, 25 years of age when received, sentenced in the Trigg Circuit Court, May term, 1935, to serve one year in the Kentucky State Penitentiary upon charge of false swearing. He was received in the institution May 31, 1935, and his term will expire May 31, 1936. (Paroled.)

He was received in the institution March 2, 1932, and his term will expire March 2, 1942.

ROBERT SHEWMAKER, No. 8844, a white man, 18 years of age when received, sentenced in the Jefferson Circuit Court, May term, 1932, to serve ten years in the Kentucky State Penitentiary upon charge of robbery. He was received in the institution June 22, 1932, and his term will expire June 22, 1942.

He was received in the institution November 24, 1934, and his term will expire November 24, 1936. Paroled 11-26-35

The Penitentiary at Eddyville has about twice as many inhabitants as it was built to accommodate and due to the crowded conditions there, it becomes imperative that the number of those confined in this institution be diminished so as to make room for those that will be sent there.

There was no appropriation made by the General Assembly to enlarge the accommodations at this Penitentiary and no money available for such purposes, this necessitating some action upon the part of the Governor to relieve the crowded condition. The Prison Advisory Commission, heretofore, appointed by the Governor, has recommended that executive clemency be extended to those hereinabove named, after having made a careful investigation of their previous criminal records and their conduct since they were confined in this institution.

The granting of the conditional pardon, will in a measure, relieve the congestion of this institution and will result in the saving of thousands of dollars of the tax payers of the State. Besides those to whom this favor is extended will be given the opportunity to reinstate themselves as citizens of the State.

NOW, THEREFORE, in order that the above named persons may be given an opportunity to establish themselves as peaceful and law-abiding citizens, and by the recommendations of the Prison Advisory Commission, and by virtue of the power vested in me as Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, I do hereby and now pardon the persons above named, upon the following conditions, to-wit:

FIRST, that the said named persons, and each of them, will, until the expiration dates of the sentences which they are now serving, conduct themselves as useful, upright, and law-abiding citizens of the Commonwealth of Kentucky; and provided that if any of them shall fail to so conduct themselves for said period, those so failing may, by executive order made and entered upon the Executive Journal, be re-arrested and re-confined in either of the two named penal institutions of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, and be required to serve out the full unexpired terms of their respective sentences.

SECOND, that if any person granted executive clemency herein by this executive order shall, before the date on which his sentence would have expired, be convicted of a felony in any of the courts of this Commonwealth, the pardon hereby granted said person shall be null and void and of no effect, and said person shall be subject to arrest and shall be required to serve the unexpired portion of the sentence for which he is now incarcerated.

THIRD, that if the persons hereinabove named conduct themselves as law-abiding citizens and violate none of the conditions of this executive order and of this conditional pardon, then they, and each of them, shall on the dates shown herein as the dates when their respective terms would have expired had they remained in prison, be granted a full and free pardon and restored to full citizenship, and all the rights and privileges thereof; and they and each of them shall be privileged thereafter to exercise and enjoy citizenship as other citizens, provided of course, they do not violate any of the conditions of this conditional pardon, and that they do not violate any of the conditions upon which this conditional pardon is granted.

TO THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE KENTUCKY STATE REFORMATORY AT FRANKFORT, KENTUCKY, AND TO ALL SHERIFFS, MARSHALS, CONSTABLES, and ALL OTHER PEACE OFFICERS OF THIS COMMONWEALTH OF WHATEVER TITLE,

GREETING:

"WHEREAS, the undersigned Ruby Laffoon, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, by executive order date the 28 day of March, 1935, and entered on the Executive Journal, did appoint a Prison Advisory Commission consisting of Hon. Charles Davidson, Berea, Kentucky, Hon. Roy Steinfeld, Covington, Kentucky, Hon. Gus Helcken, Louisville, Kentucky, Dr. John Lowe Fort, Louisville, Kentucky, and Hon. Ben D. Ringo, Owensboro, Kentucky; and did by said executive order request, direct and empower said Prison Advisory Commission to make an investigation of the conditions now existing at the Kentucky State Penitentiary, Eddyville, Kentucky and at the Kentucky State Reformatory, Frankfort, Kentucky; and did by said executive order request, direct and empower said Prison Advisory Commission to investigate the general demeanor and conduct of all the present inhabitants now confined in said institutions, and also their past records, for the purpose of determining who of said inmates are proper subjects for executive clemency to be exercised by the Governor; and,

WHEREAS, the said Prison Advisory Commission has brought to the attention of the Governor the exemplary conduct and good demeanor of the present inhabitants of the State Reformatory at Frankfort, Kentucky, who are now confined in said institution from different sections of the State, most of them being married and having families to support, or young men and boys without families. The said Prison Advisory Commission has recommended that the imposed sentences of those herein named be commuted, or that executive clemency be extended to them which will allow them to be released by executive order, that they may return to their homes and remain out of said prison so long as their conduct is exemplary and they comply with all conditions imposed upon them by which they are released; and,

WHEREAS, the Kentucky State Reformatory has now 2569 inhabitants, which is almost double the population that it is designed to accommodate, which fact of itself is inimical to the health of its inmates. Those confined in this institution are practically without employment, as the contracts of employment heretofore existing have expired, and other contracts can not be entered into for the employment of convict labor, owing to certain existing laws, rules, and regulations now in force, under which such employment is regulated; and,

WHEREAS, The General Assembly of Kentucky, not anticipating the intolerable conditions now existing at this institution, failed to make an appropriation for the erection of additional quarters to accommodate those confined in this institution, and failed to provide the necessary means to adequately support and care for those now confined therein; consequently the Board of Public Welfare is without authority and has not sufficient public funds to meet the exigencies of the situation now prevailing at this and other public institutions of the State; and,

WHEREAS, the said Prison Advisory Commission, after a full and careful investigation, has recommended to the undersigned Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky that there should be at once conditionally released from the said State Reformatory at Frankfort, Kentucky, the following named inmates, to-wit:

LIGE ASHER, No. 23068, a white man, 39 years of age when received, sentenced in the Leslie Circuit Court, March term, 1934, to serve six years in the Kentucky State Reformatory upon charge of manslaughter. He was received in the institution April 6, 1934, and his term will expire April 6, 1940.

The Reformatory at Frankfort has now about twice as many inhabitants as it was built to accommodate and as the institution is so crowded, it becomes imperative that the number of those confined in this institution be diminished so as to make room for those that will be sent there.

There was no appropriation made by the General Assembly to enlarge the accommodations at this Reformatory and no money available for such purposes, this necessitating some action upon the part of the Governor to relieve the crowded condition. The Prison Advisory Commission, heretofore appointed by the Governor, has recommended that executive clemency be extended to those hereinabove named, after having made a careful investigation of their previous criminal records and their conduct since they were confined in this institution.

The granting of the conditional pardon, will in a measure, relieve the congestion in this institution and will result in the saving of thousands of dollars of the taxpayers of the State. Besides those to whom this favor is extended will be given the opportunity to reinstate themselves as citizens of the State.

NOW, THEREFORE, in order that the above named persons may be given an opportunity to establish themselves as peaceful and law-abiding citizens, and be the recommendations of the Prison Advisory Commission, and by virtue of the power vested in me as Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, I do hereby and now pardon the persons above named, upon the following conditions, to wit:

FIRST, that the said named persons, and each of them, will, until the expiration dates of the sentences which they are now serving, conduct themselves as useful, upright and law-abiding citizens of the Commonwealth of Kentucky; and provided that if any of them shall fail to so conduct themselves for said period, those failing may, by executive order made and entered upon the Executive Journal, be re-arrested and re-confined in either of the two named penal institutions of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, and be required to serve out the full unexpired terms of their respective sentences.

SECOND, that if any person granted executive clemency herein by this executive order shall, before the date on which his sentence would have expired, be convicted of a felony in any of the courts of this Commonwealth, the pardon hereby granted said person shall be null and void and of no effect, and said person shall be subject to arrest and shall be required to serve the unexpired portion of the sentence for which he is now incarcerated.

THIRD, that if the persons hereinabove named conduct themselves as law-abiding citizens and violate none of the conditions of this executive order and of this conditional pardon, then they, and each of them, shall on the dates shown herein as the dates when their respective terms would have expired had they remained in prison, be granted a full and free pardon and restored to full citizenship, and all the rights and privileges thereof; and they and each of them shall be privileged thereafter to exercise and enjoy citizenship as other citizens, provided, of course, they do not violate any of the conditions of this conditional pardon, and that they do not violate any of the conditions upon which this conditional pardon is granted.

DONE AT FRANKFORT, this the 4 day of December, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-five, and in the year of the Commonwealth, the one hundred and forty-fourth.

LIQUOR REPEAL & OLD AGE PENSION AMENDMENTS.

"EXECUTIVE ORDER"

"MISS SARA W. MAHAN,
"SECTY. OF STATE OF KY."
"FRANKFORT, KY."

"DEC. 4/35."

"WHEREAS, the 1934 General Assembly, at its regular session, proposed two amendments to the Constitution of Kentucky, which amendments were submitted to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection at the regular November election of 1935, the said first amendment being in words and figures as follows:

"That the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky be amended by repealing and striking therefrom Section 226a, which reads as follows:

"After June 30, 1920, the manufacture, sale or transportation of spirituous, vinous, malt or other intoxicating liquors, except for sacramental, medicinal, scientific or mechanical purposes, in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, is hereby prohibited. All sections or parts thereof of the Constitution, insofar as they may be inconsistent with this section, are hereby repealed and nullified. The General Assembly shall enforce this Section by appropriate legislation."

"And by re-enacting Section 61 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky as adopted by the Constitutional Convention of 1890, and which reads:

"The general assembly shall, by general law, provide a means whereby the sense of the people of any county, city, town, district or precinct may be taken, as to whether or not spirituous, vinous or malt liquors shall be sold, bartered or loaned therein, or the sale thereof regulated. But nothing herein shall be construed to interfere with or to repeal any law in force relating to the sale or gift of such liquors. All elections on this question may be held on a day other than the regular election days.";

and the said second amendment being in words and figures as follows:

"The General Assembly shall prescribe such laws as may be necessary for the granting and paying of old persons an annuity or pension."

and

WHEREAS, the State Board of Election Commissioners has duly certified to the Secretary of State that each of said amendments was duly ratified and adopted by a majority of the votes cast thereon,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Ruby Laffoon, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, do hereby proclaim and declare each of said amendments to now be a part of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

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PARDON OF INDICTMENT

Governor Ruby Laffoon this day filed an Executive Order relating to the application of R. L. ARNOLD for a pardon in advance of trial, under an Indictment filed against him in Boyle Circuit Court, wherein said Arnold is charged with the crime of unlawfully, willfully and maliciously cutting and striking another person with a knife.

It being represented to the Governor that said Arnold is a law-abiding citizen and that he has never had any trouble before, is in delicate health and is sixty years of age.

Executive clemency being recommended by J B Nichols, County Court Clerk, J H Robinson, Cashier Farmers Bank, Jno. S Baughman, Circuit Court Clerk, and many other leading citizens of Boyle County. In view of the facts, as presented herein, the Governor remits the penalty and pardons the offense, as alleged in the indictment, and forever acquits, releases and discharges said Arnold from the charges presented against him in said case; and the Governor states in this order that this is the last pardon granted by him as Governor.

PARDON OF INDICTMENT.

The Governor this day granted unto J O E U N D E R W O O D remission of the penalty and a pardon of the offense as alleged in an indictment pending in the Circuit Court of Calloway County, Kentucky, for the crime of murder in killing a young man by the name of Jones, and which case has not been tried, although the defendant announced ready and insisted upon a trial at the last term of said Court.

And the Governor forever acquits, releases and discharges the said Underwood from the offense alleged in said indictment.

The Governor granted unto BRYAN DUKE a pardon of the unserved portion of the six months jail sentence imposed on him by the Christian Circuit Court at its September term, for "knowingly receiving stolen property".

Clemency is granted in this case by reason of same having been recommended by a number of citizens of Christian County, and from the personal knowledge of the Governor who knows the defendant to be honest, industrious and law-abiding, and that his wife and three small children, and aged Mother and Father, needing his attention. This order was made on Dec. 7, but is now filed with the Secretary of State, and entered on this date, on the Journal.

FULL AND FREE PARDON

The Governor on Dec. 9, made the following order, but same is now filed with Secretary of State, on this day, and entered of record on the Journal:

The Governor granted unto WILEY PELFREY a full and free pardon of the judgment of the Lee Circuit Court, November term, 1935, for Manslaughter, and sentencing him to a term of three years confinement in the State Reformatory.

Executive Clemency being recommended by a petition signed by several hundred citizens of Breathitt County; by ten of the trial jurors, the Circuit Judge, Commonwealth's Attorney, practically all of the County officials of both Breathitt and Powell Counties.

It is stated in the record that at the time W D Cundiff was killed, Morgan Pelfrey, brother of the defendant herein, was also killed, and that Wiley Pelfrey was attempting to protect his brother Morgan at time he killed W D Cundiff.
