Conditional Commutation of Sentence

This day the Governor commuted the sentence imposed on William Elliott from death to confinement in the Kentucky State Penitentiary for the period of his natural life upon condition that neither the said William Elliott, nor anyone for him by his authority or consent, or in his behalf, shall apply for, seek or petition the Department of Welfare, or any parole or pardon agency or authority, for a pardon, parole or probation, and upon the condition further that said William Elliott shall not for himself or through any agent or representative seek in any form to obtain a pardon, parole or commutation of the life sentence; and, provided further that if either of these conditions be violated, then this commutation shall immediately be and become null and void, and the Governor shall order execution of the original judgment.

William Elliott was indicted on the 14th day of January, 1941, by the Grand Jury of Whitley County, Kentucky, for the crime of murder and on the 28th day of January, 1941, a sentence of death was imposed. An appeal was taken from the judgment of conviction to the Court of Appeals of Kentucky and the judgment was affirmed on December 19, 1941. A stay of execution was granted by Hon. Keen Johnson, then Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, pending further legal proceedings, which have now been fully completed and application was made for conditional commutation of the sentence to life imprisonment without the privilege of parole.

Proclamations

This day the Governor issued the following proclamations:

Proclaiming Section 230 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky to read as amended, i.e., "Money Not to be Drawn from Treasury Unless Appropriated: Publication: Highway Funds. No money shall be drawn from the state treasury, except in pursuance of appropriations made by law; and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published annually.

No money derived from excise or license taxation relating to gasoline and other motor fuels, and no monies derived from fees, excise or license taxation relating to registration, operation, or use of vehicles on public highways shall be expended for other than the cost of administration, statutory refunds and adjustments, payment of highway obligations, costs for construction, reconstruction rights-of-way, maintenance and repair of public highways and bridges and expense of enforcing state traffic and motor vehicle laws."

Proclaiming Section 147 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky be amended and revised so as to read as follows: "The General Assembly shall provide by law for the registration of all persons entitled to vote in cities and towns having a population of five thousand or more; and may provide
