in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of North Carolina, in the war between the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear that I was a member of Co. A. 64th North Carolina.....

Regiment Vol. Infantry.....

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:







In the matter of claim for pension under act of General Assembly of the state of Kentucky Approved March 11th. 1912, By Ezekiel Wardrup, of Bernstadt Ky. This day came Calvin J. Jones and Haynes Ray, Persons whom I certify to be credible and entitled to be believed, And after being duly sworn testified in open court as follows, Viz. That they were well acquainted with the claimant Ezekiel Wardrup. that he has been a resident of Bernstadt Laurel County Kentucky, for many years And lived in the state of Kentucky for 35 or 40 years, That he is a very poor man That he owns a little tract of land and a horse and cow But all together his estate is not worth \$300. That he has no income from any source, That his wife has no property of any kind. That his support is not secured by any contract or agreement with any person able to provide for him, That he is not a pensioner from any other state or the United States. That he is physically unable to labor and cannot earn a support by manual labor, That the said claimant is a man of good moral character and a good citizen, And they have no interest whatever in the prosecution of this claim. In consideration of the foregoing testimony, and other evidence in the case I am of opinion that this is a meritorious claim, And I recommend its allowance.

He was a good and true soldier and and he was captured at Cumberland Gap and was kept in prison after that until the surrender of the southern army. We know these facts to be true because we were with him and served in the same Company that he did. We have no interest in this claim directly or indirectly.

Dear Sir:

I am writing you in regard to Ezekial Wardrup who was a confederate soldier and who was pensioned by the state of Kentucky, and who died on the 12th, day of June, 1929. leaving a wife and some children and Mrs Laura Wardrup wants to know whether she is entitled to that part of his pension which was earned at the time of his death, and she would also like to be informed whether she could draw a widows pension.

I have advised her that unless she was married to Mr Wardrup prior to January, 1st, 1890, that she is not entitled to a wodows pension under our statutes, but she seems to think that there is some other law.

Mrs Wardrup's is Bernstadt, Ky, and you can write her or me whichever you choose.

My dear Sir:

Your letter informing us of the death, Ezekiel Wardrup has been received, there is due his estate, \$28.00 being accrued pension from May 1st to June, 12th 1929- inclusive, and I inclose information as to how this may be collected. If Mrs. Wardrup was married after January, 1st 1890- she is not entitled to a widow's pension, under the Confederate Pension law, as the law states this very plainly, and there has been no change in the law,
