I, John T. Drew  
am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Moscow in the County of Adickman  
in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of North Carolina, in the war between  
the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of  
Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear  
that I was a member of Co. G. 20 Regt. N.C. State Troops, enlisted in Co.  
G. 30 Regt. N.C. Regt. Confederate Service Sept. 26<sup>th</sup> 1861  
in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the  
benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,  
and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-  
ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:



The application of John T. Drew for a pension, under the Act of the Legislature, approved March, 11th, 1912, having on the 5 day of August, 1912, been filed in open court and laid over until this regular term for hearing and now coming on to be heard, the county attorney J.D. Via, being present and representing the Commonwealth and both sides announcing ready; the judge after hearing the testimony in open court finds therefrom the following state of facts, viz:- That said applicant, John T. Drew is a citizen of the United States and now resides and has been an actual, bona fide resident of Kentucky, since the      day of 1870 19  , and has not been absent therefrom since said date for as long a period as one year; that he is not able to earn a support by manual labor; does not receive a pension from any source and he is the owner of property of the value of \$ 1300<sup>00</sup>; that his support is not provided for by any agreement or contract in any way or manner whatsoever and his means of support is limited to and income of \$ 80<sup>00</sup> per year and his wife has no property or income.

I, hereby certify that the witnesses, Geo. B. Mahan,  
T. J. Roberts & D. W. Campbell, whose signatures are attached to this application for a pension, are each and all reputable and entitled to credit. A brief memorandum of the testimony of each of the witnesses heard on this trial, with name and P.O. Drew, for a pension, he was introduced and sworn as a witness upon his own behalf and testified that, he was an actual bona fide resident of Hickman County, Kentucky, with P.O. Address at Moscow; that he is not able to earn a support by manual labor; nor able to earn a support by reason of any knowledge, art or skill in any profession, trade or craft; that he does not receive a pension from the United States or any State or foreign government; that he has not removed from this State or been absent therefrom for as long a period as one year within the last past 42 years; that he does not possess a net income to the amount of \$300.00 per year; that he does not own property of the value of \$2500.00; that his maintenance support is not provided for by any kind or character of contract or agreement; that he is not, by reason of his combined partial ability to earn a support and income or property, or any or all of these combined, able to obtain an income equivalent to \$500.00 per year; that he is the owner of land of the value of \$1000<sup>00</sup> and personal property of the value of \$300<sup>00</sup> and the income from both will not exceed \$80<sup>00</sup> per year, and he has no income from any other source.

That his wife has no property of value or income from any source.

Drew for at least 40 years and he now resides in Hickman County Kentucky, and has been a continuous bona fide resident of this State for the last past 40 years at least; that he owns land of the value of \$800<sup>00</sup> and personal property of the value of \$300<sup>00</sup>, and the income from both would not exceed \$80<sup>00</sup> per year and this is all the income, known to him, that he has and he is not able to earn a support by manual labor.

Dear Sir & Friend:-

I am in receipt of yours of the 23rd, and I assure you that it would greatly gratify me to be able to tell you that the proof on file brought you within the provisions of the pension law, but as I have heretofore written you, there is no proof of your service after August, 1863, and that is shown by the records.

And J. H. Dasher and Isaac Millikin, who testified for you, only say that they know you served as a soldier in the Civil War, and that you enlisted September 26, 1861. To bring you within the provisions of the pension law, the proof must show any service you rendered after August, 1863, and when, where, and how you got out of the army, and ofcourse as there is no record of your service after August, 1863, the proof would have to be made by men who served with you and know the facts.

I know how hard it is to complete the proof in many cases, but the law is absolutely plain and positive and must be complied with.

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

Dear Sir:-

I am in receipt of yours of the 26th. enclosing a statement certified to by A. T. McKellban, who signed himself as Clerk of the Superior Court of Brunswick County, North Carolina.

This statement purports to have been made by G. F. Drew, J. W. Wescott, and John Wescott, and they state that they know you were in the war and was discharged at Raleigh, N.C. after Gen'l. Lee's surrender.

This statement is not signed by either one of the persons named, nor do they state how they know what they testify to, that is, they do not state whether they were your comrades and know the facts or not.

I am not calling your attention to this to criticise this paper, but to show you wherein it is deficient. If these men were your comrades and know that you served throughout the war, and was surrendered at Raleigh, N.C. after Lee surrendered, and will make a statement of those things, and sign it and swear to it before an officer authorized to administer oaths, I will deem the proof thus made complete.

If the proof were now complete in your case, nothing could be paid you before the 15th of August, and on that account you have ample time to get the affidavits from these men in proper shape.
