5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States?

6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment?

7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender? I can't remember

9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority? Unknown

10. When and where did your husband die? Aug. 10, 1923; Nebo Hopkins Co. Ky.

11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? Yes

12. Have you married since the death of your soldier husband? No.

13. What property, real or personal, or income do you have or possess, and its gross value? None

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
- 2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
- 3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
- 4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
- 5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
- 6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.

Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.

I was born in Hopkins County, Kentucky and lived there all my
life until about five years of ago. Since that time I have been
a resident of the Confederate's Soldiers Home. I enlisted in the
10th Kentucky Regiment, Company D and served for one year before
the close of the war. While I never served in the war with
George A. Eudaley I know he was a Confederate Soldier and have dis-
cussed many detailed/^{war}experiences with him, but do not know what
Company or Regiment he served in.

George A. Eudaley was a member of Camp 528 Confederate
Relief Association of Madisonville, Kentucky, of which I served
as Adjutant for a number of years. He and I were friends but
I had not seen him for a year or so before his death in
1923.

I knew the wife of George Eudaley quite well before
and since her marriage to George Eudaley and have reason to
believe that any statement she makes should be given full faith
and credit.

Dear Colonel George:-

Senator Glenn was in to see you Saturday in regard to an application for confederate pension for my mother. He said you told him to have me furnish you with the names of the Company and Regiment that my father joined when he entered the confederate service.

I am going to quote you a paragraph from a letter written by my father in 1920, in which, I believe, he fully covers this point:-

"I joined the First Tennessee Cavalry Company D Captain Neff our commander. That was in 1862. That winter there was a call made in the Brigade for volunteers to make up an artillery company. I left the Cavalry Company and went into the Artillery which was called the Brownsboro Artillery. The first captain was M. R. Marshall with Andrew M. Sea Lieutenant. Then Marshall was succeeded by Andrew M. Sea, now of Louisville."

I think this is the information that you want to enable you take the matter up with the War Department to obtain his complete record. In the meantime I will have my mother fill out the application blank and get it to you as soon as possible.

My name is T. J. Adams and I am 96 years of age. I have lived in Madisonville, Kentucky, for 52 years. I was born in Robinsen County, Tennessee, in 1828. I enlisted in the Confederate Army, Company F, 50th Tennessee Infantry, in 1861 and served for two years when I was discharged on account of physical disability. I now draw a pension under the law allowing compensation to indigent confederate soldiers.

I came to Madisonville, Hopkins County, Kentucky, in 1871 and met George A. Eudaley shortly thereafter. I was intimately acquainted with him during the last 50 years up until his death in 1923 and have talked over with him many many times the incidents of the War between the States and discussed details of his military service in the War. While I don't remember the Company and Regiment in Mr. Eudaley served nor the dates of his enlistment and discharge, I do know that he served in the Company commanded by Captain Andrew See, who died a few years ago in Louisville. Mr. Eudaley often spoke of Captain See and I was told personally by Captain See that there occurred a vacancy in the rank of Lieutenant in their Company and that George A. Eudaley nominated him (See) to fill that vacancy, and he was voted to that place by the Company. Captain See often spoke highly of Mr. Eudaley and thought a great deal of him. I believe that Capt. See's son, an attorney at law in the City of Louisville may be able to give some details regarding Mr. Eudaley's military service from the records of his father.

I never met the wife of George A. Eudaley and know nothing regarding her.
