Soldier's Application for Pension

I, Joel Head

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at New Castle in the County of Harrison

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear that I was a member of Co. A. Sixth Confederate Battalion

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Harrison County, Kentucky, was born in Harrison County, Kentucky, April 21st 1847

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer I enlisted in 1864 in Sixth Confederate Battalion under Col. Geo. M. Jesse. 1st Lieut. Tall Buzzard Major Luke Norman - Capt. J. W. McQuinn John Sgt. Ordway (Co. Saltzinger 14)

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer I surrendered at Mt. Sterling, Ky. in May 1865 under Gentry.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer Never in prison

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer Yes, at Mt. Sterling in May 1865

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

He has venereal ulcers of left leg and a deep seated ulcer on same. He is sixty five years old and totally unable to perform manual labor.
