Soldier's Application for Pension

I, L. W. Jackson, whose full name is George Washington Jackson,
am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Breck..... in the County of Owen.....

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky....., in the war between
the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of
Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Company A. Fifth Kentucky Regiment of Cavalry,

.....
in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the
benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,
and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-
ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer I was born in Dal. Co. Ky, on the 18th day of March, 1837.

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer Enlisted in Company A. 5th Kentucky Regiment of Cavalry
on or about the 28th day of Jan, 1864.

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer By order of Gen. Basil Duke, at Christiansburg, Va. I was
turned over to Col. Siltner, came with him to Kentucky, at Mt. Sterling and surrendered
with my command about
May, 1865, after the surrender.

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer Yes; at Mt. Sterling, Ky, about May 2nd, 1865.

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Jackson, joined the regiment of which he was a member some time during the latter part of the winter or early spring of 1864, and remained with it until the close of the war; that, while Jackson had the appearance of a mere boy, he made a good soldier, and was a nice, well-behaved young fellow. Jasper N. Roland concurs in the above statements.

The material facts to be proven in the pension claim, under the laws of the State of Kentucky, are as follows:

- 1. Service in army.
- 2. Present Disability.
- 3. Indigency.
- 4. How you got out of the Army.
- 5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
- 6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filed out.

- 1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
- 2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
- 3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
- 4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
- 5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

The application of G. W. Jackson for pension under an act of the
General Assembly of Kentucky approved March 11th, 1912, granting pensions to indigent Confederate
Soldiers or their widows, having been filed in this Court on or before the regular April, 1912, term and
lain over until this, a subsequent regular term thereof; the following is a brief memorandum of the sub-
stance of the testimony of each witness heard by me touching said claim:-

Witnesses; - J. P. Sidebottom and R. M. Keimor,
P. O., Owenton Ky, each testify that the
applicant G. W. Jackson is, and has been
a resident of Owen County Ky, for more than
20 years; that he owns no property of any
kind; income nothing; by reason of old
age and bodily infirmity is unable to
earn living by manual labor; that
his wife owns no property of any kind;
that he draws no pension from any
State or the Government of the
United States,

And I find from all the evidence adduced the following facts proven:-

That he enlisted in the Confederate States Army in Jan'y, 1864; that he served con-
tinuously in said army until the close of the war; that he is a citizen of Owen County,
Kentucky, and has been such citizen continuously for more than 20 years last
past; that he is unable to earn a support by manual labor; that neither he nor
his wife owns any property whatever; that he is not an inmate of any soldier's
home; that neither he nor his wife has any source of income whatever; that he
does not draw any pension from any source whatever; that he is now and
has at all times been a good citizen, and that during said war he was a good sol-
dier. I further certify that all the witnesses who have testified herein are rep-
utable and entitled to credit.

Wherefore upon the merits of the claim I recommend that the pension applied for by



The widow Caroline Jackson wishes to have the pension of her deceased husband transferred to her..




