Soldier's Application for Pension

I, *Alexander Campbell*

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at *Northville*

in the County of *Carroll*

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of *Kentucky*, in the war between the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear that I was a member of *Co. C. First Ky. Cav*

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldiers' home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer *Scott County, Ky June 24 1845*

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served.

Answer *Fall of 1862 in Company C, First Ky Cav - Capt John Will - Captain, Thos. A. Ireland - Lieutenant, Hasslet Sanford - Col. Butler*

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer *Company surrendered at Washington, Ga, and I with it in May 1865*

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer *No*

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer *Yes, at Washington, Ga, in May 1865*

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer *Yes,*

If so, when and under what circumstances?

Answer *Company surrendered at Washington, Ga, and all of them including myself took the oath of allegiance at Nashville, Tenn. May 1865. - The war was over*

In what business are you now engaged, if any, and what do you earn?

Answer *Day laborer, but not able to do much of anything or any kind of work - I earn practically nothing*

What estate have you in your own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer *None*

What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer *Have never been married*

State the net income of yourself and your wife from all sources for the past year. This must include all money received either from wages, rents or interest on loaned money, if any.

Answer *I have no income from any source*

Do you use intoxicants to any extent?

Answer *No*

How long and since when have you been an actual resident of the State of Kentucky?

Answer *All my life, continuously*

Have you an attorney to look after this application?

Answer *Yes*

If so, give his name and address?

Answer *J. W. Slaughter, Owenton, Ky*

The affiant J.A. Moss were comrades in said Confederate Army in Co. C First Ky Cav. having enlisted therein about the same time at Lexington, Ky in fall of 1862. Both ~~were in the same company and regiment from the time until the close of the~~ war. Both surrendered at Washington, Ga about May 1865, and they both later on took the oath of allegiance at Nashville, Tenn. Both of them were paroled at Washington, Ga. All the above facts are in the personal knowledge of the affiant J.A. Moss.

The affiant Jess Suter states that all of the above facts, except as to the war record of said Alexander Campbell, are within the personal knowledge of affiant. Affiant states that he has known the applicant for the last 35 years and knows the history of the applicant and his family, and it is the family history of said applicant that he was in the Confederate Army in Co. C First Ky Cav.

1. Service in army.
2. Present disability.
3. Indigency.
4. How you got out of the army.
5. Character as a soldier and citizen.
6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of doctor and County Judge are filled out.

1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.




Application of Alexander Campbell for Confederate Pension .

This application having been filed and docketed for the regular May term, 1925, of said Court and the same having lain over to the regular succeeding June term thereof, when the applicant, Alexander Campbell, offered and produced in open court the following witnesses, namely, Jess Suter aged 40 years, whose post office address is Werthville, Ky., and T. M. Minish aged 38 years, whose post office address is ~~Werthville~~ ^{Carrollton}, Ky., who, being duly sworn as required by law testified in relation to said claim as follows:

That they are both residents of Carrell County, Ky., and have known the applicant, Alexander Campbell, for the last _____ years and _____ years respectively; that they know of their own personal knowledge where said applicant resides, in what county and state he has his citizenship, and what means of support he has, and they say that said applicant has been, all his life, a resident and a citizen of the State of Kentucky, never having lived elsewhere during his life and that he is now a resident and a citizen of Carrell County, Ky.; that he has no means of support of any kind and is not able physically to earn a support by his labor, either manual or mental, and he is not able to earn a support by reason of his knowledge, art, or skill in any trade profession or craft; that he receives no pension from the United States or any state or foreign government, or from any other source known to either of said witnesses; that he has no property of any kind or character nor has any interest in or any income from any property or funds of any kind. He is able to do only a few light jobs or chores, which would amount to a mere pittance by way of his support. He lives at Werthville, Ky. with his nephew _____, who care for him without compensation, and there is no one who is legally bound for his support. His support is not provided for either in whole or in part by reason of any contract or agreement with any person to provide for his support.

The foregoing is the testimony of said witnesses taken in open court, and, at the taking and hearing thereof, Liter Donaldson, County Attorney for Carrell County, Ky., was present; all of which is hereby certified to the Commissioner of ~~###~~ Confederate Pensions for the State of Kentucky, at Frankfort, Ky.; and the court, by reason of the above findings and evidence, recommend that said claim be allowed.
