that I was a member of Company D, 1st Kentucky Cav.

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the  
benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,  
and that I am not an inmate of any soldiers' home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-



- 1. Service in army.
- 2. Present disability.
- 3. Indigency.
- 4. How you got out of the army.
- 5. Character as a soldier and citizen.
- 6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of doctor and County Judge are filled out.

- 1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
- 2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
- 3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
- 4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
- 5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

Your favor of December 17th received. Would say in reply; that I have very carefully looked over the records of Kentucky troops that served in the Kentucky regiments in the Confederate States army, and I find that E. B. Heady is reported as missing, which means that he left his company without any permission and, there is no record to show how or when he got out of the Confederate army. The Pension law plainly says; that he must have served from the date of his enlistment until the close of the war, or, until he was honorably discharged to come within the provisions of the Confederate Pension law. There is no proof of record or otherwise that he ever re-enlisted or returned to the service. J. P. Garr and A. M. Heady both have good records but they say nothing whatever about how or when R. B. Heady got out of the army, therefore, their affidavits are worthless in the matter, as the records show that R. B. Heady left the Confederate army without permission and never returned and, under the law, I am compelled to reject his claim for pension;

Heady for pension had been rejected I have submitted to Mr. Heady and he advises me that he was in the service up until the end of the Civil War and that the record showing that he was missen he dose not understand although he was not with his outfit at the time of the end of the war but was in the service, doing special duty for a commanding officer.

I have suggested that he come to see you in person as we are informed that you was a vetron of this same war doing service for the States. He tells me that he intends to come as soon as the weather will permit him to do so.

Mr. Heady is one of my neasest neighbors and is a Southerner from start to finish and I feel that if there is any way you can help him that you will do so he is getting old and needs a little lift if he can get it.

My dear Sir:

I have been going over the records of Kentucky troops that served in Kentucky regiments in the Confederate States army now on file in this office again, and the only record of E. B. Heady's service in the Confederate army, is, that he enlisted in Company "D" 1st regiment of Kentucky cavalry, September 2nd, 1862- at Lexington, Kentucky. and he is reported as missing, there is no date as to when he left his Company and regiment. He said here, that he continued in the service in another Company and regiment, but, there is no proof that he ever performed any further service in the Confederate army. He said in his application that he was captured in March, 1865- and that he could not recall whether he took the Oath of Allegiance to the Federal Government . The affidavits of A. M. Head and J. T. Garr given in his behalf know nothing whatever about how or when said E. B. Heady got out of the army, and there is no proof here or at the War Department showing any further service he ever performed after he was reported as missing,

INSTRUCTIONS TO OFFICER BEFORE WHOM THIS VOUCHER IS EXECUTED.

1. This voucher may be executed before any officer authorized to administer an oath and having a seal.
2. In every case the pension certificate must be carefully compared with the voucher by the officer who executes it.
3. The officer will also see that post-office addresses are correctly inserted in the proper spaces in the voucher, particularly the address to which the check is to be mailed. He will also give his own postoffice address after his official title on the face of voucher.
4. The officer will be held strictly responsible for the correctness of his certificate of identity in every particular.
5. Vouchers must be returned to the pension Department, by February 1st, May 1st, August 1st, or November 1st, following the execution of the vouchers in order that checks may be paid promptly each quarter.

All acts involved in the execution or correction of vouchers must be performed in the presence of the officiating officer who must certify to the corrections over his own signature on the face of the voucher in the space indicated.

	2. Street and number, P. O. box number, R. F. D. route, or "General Delivery" must appear in P. O. Address in case of residence within carrier delivery. "General Delivery" addresses will be accepted in such case only if no other address as above is available.
