I, Andrew Jackson Snader

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Company "E" 1<sup>st</sup> Kentucky Regiment

Arphous' Brigade

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the

benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,

and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family.



Dear Sir:-

I am in receipt of yours of the 28th inst. in which you say that your papers were completed three months ago, and that you have written me prior to this inquiring about them.

Your application was received at this office on the 22nd day of August, which is just thirty-six days ago, and if you have ever written me before your letter has never reached this office. Your application has not been reached for examination, but I have made inquiry at the War Department for any record of your service that might be on file there and find that the war records bring you within the provisions of the law as to your military record, but I find upon examination of your papers that the County Judge of your County has not sent to this office with your application a "Finding of Fact" as required by law. There are some affidavits filed with the application but the Judge's "Findings" are not with it, and it will be necessary for you to have him make his "Findings" and forward to this office.



I James Strother Judge of the Trimble County Court for Trimble County, Ky., hereby report my findings in the above application.

The records in this case show that Andrew Jackson Shrader enlisted in the Confederate army on August 1862 and served with Co. "E" ~~Kaukik~~ F 1st regiment and was released at Fort Delaware after the close of the war, the proof taken before me in open Court on the 28th day of July 1919 shows that applicant has no estate in Trimble County or in Kentucky but he owns a small estate consisting of a small house and lot worth about \$1000.00 and the income is about \$200.00. he has no other property and his income is not sufficient to maintain himself and he is old and feeble in health and is unable to earn a living for himself and wife and I therefore from the record and proof before me recommend the granting of the pension asked for.
