

Soldier's Application for Pension

I, B. F. Warland

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Brandenburg in the County of Meade

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of First Kentucky Cavalry

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer In Meade County, Kentucky, in the year 1829

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer In September or October 1861 in First Kentucky Cavalry Company D.

Col. B. Hardin Helm, Captain Hawes, First Lieutenant Brown

Second Lieutenant G. D. Richardson. Served with General John H. Morgan in Col. Duke's Regiment. After General Morgan surrendered, I joined Major Taylor's Meade Co. Ky.
How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer By the Surrender of Major Taylor's command at Louisville Ky to General Palmer.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer No

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?




To Applicants for Pension

The material facts to be proven in the pension claim, under the laws of the State of Kentucky, are as follows:

1. Service in army.
2. Present Disability.
3. Indigency.
4. How you got out of the Army.
5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.



Worland served as comrades in the Confederate Army under Major Walker Taylor, that in the Spring of 1865, in the month of April to the best of his recollection, said Major Taylors entire Command was Surrendered to General Palmer at Louisville, Kentucky, that he and said B.T. Worland were both surrendered with said Major Taylors command to said General Palmer, at Louisville, Ky., and were required to take and did take the oath of allegiance before General Palmer, and that ended the service of said B.T. Worland, in the Confederate Army so far as he knows.

Dear Sir:-

Upon examining the proof filed with your application I find that the record shows your enlistment and service from November 3rd, 1861, to October 31, 1862. Two witnesses testify to your service till July, 1863, during General Morgan's raid in Ohio. There is no proof of further service and none as to when or how he got out of the army. Proof on these points necessary.

Get all the proof you can and forward to this office to be filed with your application before it is submitted to the Pension Board for its action.
