Soldier's Application for Pension

I, Joseph B. Jackson

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Tyone in the County of Anderson

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Company A, First Kentucky Infantry

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer In Jefferson County, Virginia in 1838.

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer I enlisted in February 1861 in Harry's Company of First Kentucky Infantry, Colonel Blanton Henson, Captain James B. Harry, George Hunt, First Lieut, Boone Spurr, 2nd Lieutenant, Tom Wallace, 3rd Lieutenant.

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer Was captured in South Carolina, near Columbus, Feb 15, 1864.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer Yes, in Fort Island, N.Y. Was released June 10, 1865.

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer No.

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer Yes, June 10, 1865.

If so, when and under what circumstances?

Answer In order to get out of prison after the war was over.

In what business are you now engaged, if any, and what do you earn?

Answer *No business and earn nothing.*

What estate have you in your own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer *Nothing.*

What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer *She is dead. She left a house and lot worth about \$400.00, which I occupy.*

State the net income of yourself and your wife from all sources for the past year. This must include all money received either from wages, rents or interest on loaned money, if any.

Answer *None.*

Do you use intoxicants to any extent?

Answer *None.*

How long and since when have you been an actual resident of the State of Kentucky?

Answer *Since ~~1855~~ 1855, continuously.*

Have you an attorney to look after this application?

Answer *Yes.*

If so, give his name and address?

Answer *Richard Owen, Lawrenceburg, Ky.*

I find that the record shows that you enlisted Apr. 23, 1861, and was present with your company May 13, 1862. There is no proof of further service and none as to how you got out of the army. Proof on these points necessary.

In the matter of Joseph S. Jackson applicant for pension, being duly sworn testified as follows.

He says that he is 74 years of age, resides in Anderson County, Kentucky, and has resided there nearly all his life, and that he is not able to earn a support by manual labor, and is not able to earn a support by reason of his knowledge or skill in any profession, trade or craft; that he is supported by his children, and the only property he owns is a liferight in a house and lot worth about \$500.00; that he owns no personal property; that he is in bad health, and does not receive any income at all, and does not receive a pension from the United States, or any state, or foreign government. *That his wife is dead, and left no property.*

~~We were sworn~~, sworn on behalf of applicant testified as follows.

He said that he had known the applicant for over forty years, and that the above life estate in the house and lot is all the property he owns, and that the house and lot is worth about \$500.00; that the applicant is and has been in bad health for several years.

I recommend that a pension be granted to above applicant.

The affiant, Gus Jaubert, states that he is a resident of # 628 West Short street, Lexington, Kentucky, and that he is now and has been at all times hereinafter mentioned well acquainted with J. B. Jackson of Tyrone, Anderson county, Kentucky, who has heretofore filed his application for a pension under the laws of Kentucky.

The affiant further states that the said J. B. Jackson was born in Virginia and came to Kentucky some years prior to the Civil War; that on or about April , 1861, he enlisted in Company A, First Kentucky Infantry as a private. Captain James B. Harvey, Colonel Blanton Duncan; that he served in said company and regiment for one year after his enlistment, and was at the end of the year honorably discharged at Winchester, Virginia. The affiant states that he was enlisted on the same day with the said Jackson and served in the same company until said discharge and was at the same time discharged with him, and was present with him at the time of the said enlistment and discharge. He states that immediately after the said discharge the said J. B. Jackson at Harper's Ferry, Virginia, reenlisted in the service of the government of the Confederate States of America in the company then organized, Captain James B. Harvey, Woodard's Cavalry Regiment; that near the end of the war the said Jackson was captured by the Union army and was imprisoned at Hart's Island, New York, from which he was released about June 15, 1865.

Affiant further states that the habits of the said Jackson are good and free from dishonor.
