Mrs Lucy Jackson of said State and County, desiring to avail herself of the pension allowed to Indigent Widows of Soldiers, General Assembly, approved March 11, 1912, hereby submits her proofs, and after being duly sworn true answers to the following questions, deposes and answers as follows:

1. What is your full name and where do you reside? (Give State, County and Postoffice.) Mrs. Lucy Jackson Stanton Kentucky
2. How long and since when have you been a resident of this State? All my life
3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name? 12th day of August 1844 Bath County Kentucky, Lucy Donaldson
4. When and where was your husband born—state his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony. (If possible, attach certified copy marriage license in every case.) 4th day of July 1846, Bath County Ky, William David Jackson, Bath County Ky, John L. Maxey (certified copy of which is attached)
5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States? 1861 Nov. at Bowling Green Bath Co. Ky. Company "F" 2nd Ky. Mounted Rifles
6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? until May 13th 1865
7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender? May 13th 1865 at Mount Sterling Kentucky
8. Was your husband present at the time and place when his Company and Regiment surrendered? yes
9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority?
10. When and where did your husband die? 11th day of November 1904
11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? yes
12. Have you married since the death of your soldier husband? no
13. What property, real or personal, or income do you have or possess, and its gross value? House & lot in Stanton Ky. worth \$500⁰⁰ Interest in house & lot in Louisville Ky worth \$1500⁰⁰ No income from rents, income \$1.50 per year
14. Have you a family? If so, who compose such family? myself & girl I raised

1. What is your name and what is your postoffice address? Romulus Jackson,
Stanton Roswell County Kentucky
2. Are you acquainted with the applicant, Mrs. Lucy Jackson
If so, how long have you known her? yes, all her life
3. Where does she reside, and how long and since when has she been a resident of this State? Stanton Ky.
all her life
4. Were you ever acquainted with her husband? yes, he was my younger brother
5. Were either or both of you present at the marriage? yes
6. How long did you know him? All his life
7. When and where did you, 1861, at Orangeville North Co. Ky. enlist in the war between the States, and in what Company and Regiment did he enlist, and how do you know this? Company "F" 2 Ky. Battalion Mounted Riflemen, by personal knowledge
8. Were you a member of the same Company and Regiment at the close of the war? No, I was never a soldier
9. How long did he perform regular military duty? until May 1865
10. When and where was his Company and Regiment surrendered? at Mt Sterling Kentucky

17. Do you know of your own knowledge that applicant is the lawful widow of Wm D Jackson

18. Has she remained unmarried since her soldier husband's death, and is she now his widow? *She has never married since death of her husband, and is now his widow*

19. What property, effects or income has the applicant, if any, and how do you know this of your own knowledge?
She owns a small house and lot in Stanton and an interest in one in Louisville her income is perhaps \$150 per year from rents I know this because I assist her in her business and have been closely associated with her for years
Has applicant conveyed any property, in the last two years or given away, if so, what was it, and to whom?
Conveyed none given away nothing

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
- 2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
- 3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
- 4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
- 5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
- 6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.
Widow must have married prior to 1890.
To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.
Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.
Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.

The prisoner of war records show, however, that one W. D. Jackson, pvt., Co. F, 2d Ky. Cav., C. S. A., enlisted June, 1862; was captured in Morgan County, Ky., March 13, 1864; paroled at Camp Chase, Ohio, Feb. 12, 1865, exchanged at Boulware and Cox's Wharf, James River, Feby., 21, 1865, and was reported present at Camp Lee, Va., Feb 23, 1865, a paroled prisoner. No later record of him has been found.

The affiant J W Perry states that he is a citizen and resident of West Liberty Morgan County Kentucky. That he resides in said county at the beginning of the war between the states in 1861. That he enlisted on the 15th day of Sept 1861 in the Confederate Army. Serving in different companies and regiments until the spring of 1863. at which time he enlisted in both of the 2nd Kentucky Battalion of Mounted Riflemen said company was commanded by W P Barnes of Bath County Ky. The Bat. was commanded by Col Thomas Johnson and Major O S Terry of Hartgornery County Ky. That he served in said company and Bat. until the war closed. (except that a short time before the close of the war he was elected 2nd Lieutenant in a new company called company G. but thinks said new company was never mustered into the service. Says he was seriously wounded a short time after joining the new company, and soon as he was able to return to the command-

he returned to and served with
company, F, until we were ordered
to surrender near Christiansburg
Virginia soon after the surrender
of Gettysburg at Appomattox,
we came to Mt Sterling Ky and this
affiant surrendered to the Yanks
on the 13th day of May 1865, at that
place, when affiant joined that
company, F, in the Spring of 1863.
W. D. Jackson was a member of it,
and as I understood, had belonged
to said company for several
months. His home was in Bath
county, Ky. He and I were near
the same age and soon got to be
chums and great friends.
Affiant knew him well. He was
called "Davie Jackson, in camp.
He was a nice boy and a brave
good soldier. I cannot just now
remember whether he was captured
at Mt Sterling or Cynthiana Ky in
June 1864. But as I remember he
was with the company at the
close of the war, I am quite
sure he was with us in the
battle of Chickamauga in Sept 1863.

and as I remember served
with said company continuously
as in pursuance of my first
acquaintance with him in the
Spring of 1863, until the close of
the war. He made most of the time
a dark boy or known name with
a blaze face.

I am informed that said W. Daniel
Jackson is now dead. The last
time I saw him was several
years ago in Winchester or
Lexington Kentucky.

In the matter of the application for pension of Mrs. Lucy Jackson this day heard, the applicant introduced as witnesses G. M. Derickson and Thomas Conlee who testified in substance, that they had known the applicant for a number of years and that she was a citizen and resident of Kentucky and the United States that the only property she owned to their knowledge was a house and lot in Stanton Ky. worth about seven or eight hundred dollars that she had no income from any other source known to them.

From the application it appears that the applicant owns an interest in a house in Louisville Ky. but that the income she receives is not more than about \$150. the court is of the opinion that the claim should be allowed.
