1. What is your full name and where do you reside? (Give State, County and Postoffice.)  
Sarah Ann Hutton near Junesville Grant County Ky
2. How long and since when have you been a resident of this State? All my life
3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name? March 10-1843- near Stanford Ky Sarah Ann Parent
4. When and where was your husband born—state his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony. (If possible, attach certified copy marriage license in every case.)  
John James Hutton Grant County February 7-1843- married at residence of Samuel Hutton Grant Co Ky May 1867 By Rev John Cole
5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States? Sept 17-1862 Williamstown Ky Company "G" 1st Regt Ky Cavalry
6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? From September 17-1862 to May 1865
7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender? May 1st 1865 at Mt Sterling Kentucky
8. Was your husband present at the time and place when his Company and Regiment surrendered? Yes
9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority? was present when Company surrendered
10. When and where did your husband die? September 11-1903 Newmarket Ky
11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? Yes
12. Have you married since the death of your soldier husband? No
13. What property real or personal, or income do you have or possess, and its gross value? No property real or personal No income what ever
14. Have you a family? If so, who compose such family? Yes - 9 children all married and son furnishes except one. He is single works out by month

1. What is your name and what is your postoffice address? William J. Hutton  
Jensville, R. #1 Ky
2. Are you acquainted with the applicant Mrs. Sarah Ann Hutton  
If so, how long have you known her? Yes - known her 40 years
3. Where does she reside, and how long and since when has she been a resident of this State? Resides  
Near Jensville Grant County Ky. Resides here all her life
4. Were you ever acquainted with her husband? Yes
5. Were either or both of you present at the marriage? I was present when they  
married
6. How long did you know him? All his life
7. When and where did John Samuel Hutton enlist in the war between the  
States, and in what Company and Regiment did he enlist, and how do you know this? Williamsport Ky.  
September 17 - 1862 Company "G" 1st Regiment Ky Cavalry I was present at his  
enlistment
8. Were you a member of the same Company and Regiment at the close of the war? Yes
9. How long did he perform regular military duty? From September 17 - 1862 to May 1st  
1865 except 7 months in prison Camp Chase Ohio was exchanged and  
served his time out
10. When and where was his Company and Regiment surrendered? May 1st - 1865 at  
Mt Sterling Kentucky
11. Were you with the command when it surrendered? Yes
12. Was John Samuel Hutton, the husband of applicant, present?

13. If not present, where was he? He was present
14. When and where did he leave his command? May 1st 1865 at Mt Sterling Ky  
For what cause? Paroled  
By whose authority did he leave? Federal Authority

May 1st - 1865
15. When and where did John Samuel Hutton die?  
Died September 11 - 1903 at Downingville Grant County Ky
16. Where did he reside at his death, and how long had he been a resident of Kentucky at his death?  
Downingville Grant County Ky. Been a resident of Ky all his life
17. Do you know of your own knowledge that applicant is the lawful widow of John Samuel Hutton?

18. Has she remained unmarried since her soldier husband's death, and is she now his widow? *Yes*

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
- 2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
- 3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
- 4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
- 5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
- 6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.



**NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.**

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent. Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.


