3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name? Lincoln county Ky. Mar. 3-1846. Mary Jane Armstrong.
4. When and where was your husband born—state his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony. (If possible, attach certified copy marriage license in every case.) George Wilson Jelf—Woodford county, Ky. August 24<sup>th</sup> 1837. Married Perryville, Ky—18<sup>th</sup> Oct 1866—T. H. Clelland, Minister.
5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States? September 1861—1<sup>st</sup> Reg. H. 2<sup>nd</sup> Ky. Cav. in Tennessee.
6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? To close of war.

This matter having been heard before the undersigned Judge of the Jessamine County Court the Court finds that the name of the applicant is Mary Jane Jelf; that she is the widow of George W. Jelf, who was a Confederate soldier, and that she resides in ay Nicholasville, Jessamine County, Ky., and is a citizen of the United States and of the State of Kentucky. That the said Mary Jane Jelf is unable to earn a support by manuel labor, and that she is unable to earn a support by reason of her knowledge, art or skill in any profession trade or craft. That she does not receive a pension from the United States or from any other State of Foreign government. That she has resided in the State of kentucky continuously ~~for~~ since the 1st. day of January, 1907 and has not within that time been absent from the State of kentucky for a period of as much as one year; That the said Mary Jane Jelf does not possess an income amounting to Three Hundred Dollars a year and that she does not own property of the value of Twenty Five Hundred Dollars. That her support is not provided for by any contract with any other person and that she is not able by the combined efforts of her partial ability to earn a support together with any income she may have to earn an income equal to Three Hundred Dollars a year. That the application of Mary Jane Jelf was filed in the Jessamine County Court on the 17th day of June 1912 and and proof taken thereon on the 15th day of July, 1912, but by oversight the papers relative to her applica-

tion along with several others were not forwarded to the Pension Office at the time of their completion.

Q. 4 You are a citizen of the State of Kentucky and of the United States?

Ans. Yes, sir.

Q. 5 Are you able to earn your support by manual labor?

Ans. No, sir. I am not.

Q. 6 Are you able by reason of your knowledge art or skill in any profession trade or craft to earn your support?

Ans. No, sir.

Q. 7 Do you receive any pension from the United States government or from any other State of government?

Ans. No, sir.

Q. 8 Have you resided in this State continuously since the 1st. day of January, 1907.

Ans. Yes, sir.

Q. 9 You have not lived out of the State within that time for as much as a year?

Ans. No, sir.

Q. 10 Have you a net income amounting to \$300.00 a year?

Ans. No, sir. I have not.

Q. 11 Have you property of the value of \$2500.00?

Ans. No, sir.

Ans. Yes, sir.

Ans. I suppose 40 years. A long time.

Q. 3 She is a resident of Nicholasville, Jessamine County, Ky?

Ans. Yes, sir.

Q. 4 And a citizen of the State of Kentucky and of the United States?

Ans. Yes, sir.

Q. 5 Is she able to earn a support by manual labor?

Ans. I think not.

Q. 6 Is she able to earn her support by reason of her knowledge, art or skill in any profession trade or craft?

Ans. I think not.

Q. 7 Do you know whether she receives a pension from the United States or from any other State or foreign government?

Ans. So far as my information goes she does not.

Q. 8 Has she lived continuously in this State since the 1st day of January, 1907?

Ans. Yes, sir.

Q. 9 Has she lived out of the State within that time for as much as a year?

Ans. No, sir.

Q. 10 Does she possess an income amounting to as much as \$300.00 a year?

Ans. No, sir.

Q. 11 Does she ~~possess~~ own property valued at as much as \$2500.00?

Ans. I am advised that she has a life interest in a home.

Q. 12 And no other property?

Ans. No other property.

W. M. Watts being present declines to Cross examine the witness.

Q. 1 Mr. Corrington, do you know the applicant, Mrs. Mary Jane Jelf

Ans. Yes, sir.

Q. 2 She is the widow of George W. Jelf?

Ans. 35 or 40 years. Every since I have been here.

Q. 4 Is she a resident of the City of Nicholasville, Jessamine County, Kentucky?

Ans. Yes, sir.

Q. 5 And a citizen of the State of Kentucky and of the United States?

Ans. Yes, sir.

Q. 6 Is she able to earn her support by manual labor?

Ans. I should think not, no, sir.

Q. 7 Is she able to earn her support by reason of her knowledge, art or skill in any profession trade or craft?

Ans. I don't think so.

Q. 8 Does she so far as you know draw any pension from the United States or from any other State or foreign government?

Ans. Not that I know of.

Q. 9 Has she resided in the State of Kentucky continuously since the 1st. day of January, 1907?

Ans. Yes, sir.

Cardwell, age 68 years, before me K.H. Cardwell, a Notary Public within and for the County and State aforesaid, and who being duly sworn, deposes and declares and says; That he was well acquainted with the aforesaid George Jelf; that the said Jelf and this affiant belonged to the said Company H, in the 2nd Regiment, Kentucky Volunteer Cavalry, commanded by Captain Gabe Alexander; that this affiant was enrolled, mustered and sworn into the service of the Confederate States, on the 9th day of October 1862, and at said time the soldier George Jelf was a member of said Company H; that a short while thereafter this affiant, with others, was transferred to Company E of same Regiment, but was frequently a visitor to Company H, and when in Camp or on a raid, that members of Company H also visited Company E, the said soldier George Jelf, being among the number. This affiant feels quite sure that George Jelf joined Company H in the month of August prior to the enlistment of this affiant, who enlisted in October 1862. That this affiant was honorably discharged from the Confederate military service on or about the 30th day of May 1863, from a hospital located at Fayetteville, Tenn, and therefore cannot give any account of the Company and regiment acts after said time, nor does he know when said soldier left the army if he left at all; that he had heard of several occasions while with the regiment, and the said Jelf being absent, that he was on detail duty in the secret service department of the army, but does not know personally whether that is true or not.

Affiant further declares that he is not pecuniarily interested directly or indirectly in this claim nor concerned in its prosecution. That his Post Office address is Harrodsburg, Ky.

Affiant further declares that she has no pecuniary interest directly or indirectly in this claim nor concerned in its prosecution.



Herewith I return unexecuted voucher which was mailed by your office to my mother, Nancy K. Lyon, who departed this life at the place of her residence at 323 24th Street in Ashland, Kentucky, on December 16, 1930, and who at the time of her death was the holder of Confederate Pension Certificate # , issued by Confederate Pension Department of the State of Kentucky to her as surviving widow of deceased Confederate veteran.
