

Soldier's Application for Pension

I, George N. Webb

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Williams town in the County of Graub

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of the 5th Kentucky Cavalry Regiment, Company "G"
3rd Lieutenant of said Company

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the

benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,

and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-

ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Stokes County North Carolina in the year 1830

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer June, in the year 1862, in the 5th Kentucky Cavalry
in Gen. G. Buford's Command
Regiment, Col. R. Howard Smith, Lieut. Col.
Majors G. Y. Brent, Capt. J. M. Coombs

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer was wounded at battle of Snow Hill Tenn. April 1863, Thigh bone was
shattered and was disabled for life

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer yes, about Sept-1863 at Cincinnati Ohio, where I took the oath

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

I have known him for several years he will be 87 years old on the 28th day of June 1912, and is suffering from weakness and disabilities incident to old age in addition to such infirmities he has been more or less disabled from performing manual labor because of a broken thigh bone he received in the service of the Confederate States by a gun shot, which wound disabled him more or less with injuries received in whole or part by manual labor.

- 6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

- 1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
- 2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
- 3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
- 4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
- 5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

September --, 1863, with remarks,
"Lieut. G. W. Webb was permanently
crippled by wound and took oath at
instance of friends." No later rec-
ord of him has been found.



Application of Geo. N. Webb for pension
under Confederate Pensions Act

Geo. N. Webb, Williamstown Ky, being
duly sworn testified as follows:

I know the applicant; he has resi-
ded in the State of Ky and County of
Grant for the 40 years last past.
He has no property and no income
from any source and is very feeble
and unable to earn anything what-
ever by manual labor or otherwise

Geo. M. Gouge, Williamstown Ky, being
sworn testified as follows:

Have known Geo. N. Webb many years
he is a citizen of Ky. and Grant County
and has not lived out of the state
of Ky at all since he came to the state
more than 35 years ago. He is not
able to earn anything whatever by man-
ual labor or otherwise and has no
property or income. He is not able to
attend the hearing of this proof

From the sworn ^{in open Court} testimony of Geo. N.
Webb and Geo. M. Gouge, who are personally
known to me to be worthy of belief, and
from my personal knowledge of the ap-
plicant, I find that he is a citizen of
the County of Grant and State of Kentucky

and has resided in said County and
State continuously since the close of
the war; that he is wholly unable to la-
bor for his support; that he has no prop-
erty of any kind and no one upon
whom he can depend for support and
recommend that he be granted a pension
