

Questions for Applicant

STATE OF KENTUCKY,

Franklin County.

Mrs. Sue Johnson of said State and County, desiring to avail herself of the pension allowed to Indigent Widows of Soldiers, General Assembly, approved March 11, 1912, hereby submits her proofs, and after being duly sworn true answers to make to the following questions, deposes and answers as follows:

1. What is your full name and where do you reside? (Give State, County and Postoffice.) Mrs. Sue Johnson, Frankfort, Franklin County, Ky.
2. How long and since when have you been a resident of this State? All my life.
3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name? In Woodford County Ky. Sue V. they. Born in 1849. Feb. 13.
4. When and where was your husband born—state his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony. (If possible, attach certified copy marriage license in every case.) In Woodford County, Ky. In October 1, 1862. John W. Johnson. Rev. Henderson
5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States? 1862. Camels Co. "A" 5th Ky. Cavalry.
6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? Until end of war.
7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender? Paroled in Washington, Georgia. Company was captured and disbanded.
8. Was your husband present at the time and place when his Company and Regiment surrendered? No.
9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority? Captured & imprisoned at Buffington Island Ohio. about 1865.
10. When and where did your husband die? In Frankfort, Ky. July 9, 1909.
11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? Yes.
12. Have you married since the death of your soldier husband? No.
13. What property, real or personal, or income do you have or possess, and its gross value? own one third of property valued at \$18,000.00.
14. Have you a family? If so, who compose such family? Mrs. Pearl Casinberg, Mr. Williams B. Cantor, Johnson (married).
15. Name some friend, giving his name and postoffice address, who will be willing to have us write to him about your case if necessary. Mr. Wiley Marshall.

1. What is your name and what is your postoffice address? M. B. Lucas Frankfort Ky.

2. Are you acquainted with the applicant, Mrs. Sue Johnson yes

If so, how long have you known her? Thirty years

3. Where does she reside, and how long and since when has she been a resident of this State? Frankfort Ky.

4. Were you ever acquainted with her husband? yes

5. Were either or both of you present at the marriage? no

6. How long did you know him? Since 1857

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
- 2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
- 3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
- 4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
- 5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
- 6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.

Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.

Mrs. Sue Johnson has been adjudged by the Franklin County Court lunatic and is now confined in the Eastern State Hospital at Lexington, Kentucky.


By an order of the Franklin County Court the Capital Trust Company has been appointed and qualified as committee, as will appear by a certified copy of the said court filed herewith.



Replying to your inquiry of the 5th. Mrs. Sue Johnson was admitted here March 3, 1919 and nothing has been paid this Hospital for her board.

Gentlemen:-

I find that you have been appointed Committee for Mrs. Sue Johnson who is now an inmate of the Eastern State Hospital at Lexington, Ky.

On inquiry I find that Mrs. Johnson entered the Asylum on the 3rd day of March, 1919, and that she is there as a pauper patient, that is, a patient who is being maintained at the expense of the State, and therefore a pension cannot be paid her under the law so long as she remains there wholly maintained at the expense of the State.

Therefore, I am enclosing you a voucher for \$13.20, amount of accrued pension from February 1st to March 3rd, 1919.

If she should be restored to her right mind and discharged from the Hospital, her name will be placed on the roll again on the date on which she leaves the Hospital.
