

Soldier's Application for Pension

I, Charles W. Crim

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Hannotsburg in the County of Morgan

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Bufford's Command (later transferred to Morgan) Company

T.B. 5th Kentucky Cavalry

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Clark County, Ky. July 10th 1842

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer Enlisted May or June 1862 at Stamping Ground, Scott Co., Ky. Bufford's Command (later transferred to Morgan) Col. D. H. Smith - Major - Brent - Capt. Geo. Tilford, 1st Lieut. Geo. Holiness - 2nd Lieut. John T. Sinclair (St. Clair?) 3rd Lieut. James Ferguson

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer Captured on Morgan's through Ohio, July - 1863 and sent to Camp Douglas, Ill.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer Yes Camp Douglas, Ill from July - 1863 till released May 8th 1865

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer No

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer Yes

If so, when and under what circumstances?

Answer When I was released from Camp Douglas, Ill. May 8th 1865

In what business are you now engaged, if any, and what do you earn?

Answer I do odd jobs when I am able - I earn about 100⁰⁰ a year

What estate have you in your own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer I own no real estate - my household goods are worth about \$30⁰⁰

What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer None

Testimony of Witnesses introduced in behalf of Chas Crimm, on his application for Confederate Pension.

Witness, N.B. Royalty, of Cornishville, Mercer County, Ky.

I have known Mr. Chas Crimm for 25 or 30 years and know that he has lived in this State during the whole of said time; that he now lives in Mercer County, Ky and has so resided for the past 10 years or more; that prior to that time he lived in Washington County, Ky; that he has not estate of any kind or income from any ~~one~~ place or person; that his wife has no property or income; that Mr. Crimm has a weak back and therefore unable to do but little work and could not under any circumstances earn as much as \$300.00 per annum or anything like this amount. I will say that he can not make over \$100.00 per year. He is worthy in every way and certainly needs the pension as he has nothing whatever in the way of property.

I have know Mr. Crimm for the past 10 years; during the time I have known him he has resided in Harrodsburg, Mercer County, Ky. He is honest and industrious, but on account of his feeble condition he is unable to earn a living for himself. He does not and can't earn over \$100.00 per annum. He has no estate of any kind and his wife has no estate or income.

I hereby certify that applicant, Charles Crimm, is a good citizen, that he comes within the terms of the pension law in all respects, that his witnesses, N. B. Royalty & J. M. Moberley are worthy of belief.

I recommend that pension be granted.
