Soldier's Application for Pension

I, James P. Lee,
am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Lawrenceburg in the County of Anderson
in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between
the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of
Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear
that I was a member of Co. F "5th" Kentucky Cavalry
in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the
benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,
and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-
ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

The above rheumatism was contracted during his service
in the war of the rebellion of 1861.

- 1. Service in army.
- 2. Present Disability.
- 3. Indigency.
- 4. How you got out of the Army.
- 5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
- 6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

- 1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
- 2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
- 3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
- 4. May be proven by fitting parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
- 5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

On this 18th day of April, 1913, personally appeared before me a Clerk of the Circuit Court in and for said county and state, W. G. Stucker, to me personally known, and who being first sworn by he states that he is seventy years of age, and resides in Anderson county, Kentucky, and that his post office address is Waddy, Kentucky, R. F. D. 2;- that he is personally acquainted with the applicant James P. Gee, who was a soldier in the Confederate Army in the Civil War:

He further states that in the early part of September, 1862 he, together with the said James P. Gee enlisted in Captain Jim Jordan's Company, Co. "F", 5th Ky. Cavalry, C. S. A, and that in October 1862, prior to the Battle of Perryville, Kentucky, which was fought on October 8th, 1862, that he and the said Gee were detailed in the Artillery, commanded by Captain Marshall, that they remained with the artillery until the 30th day of July, 1863, when the said James Gee, was captured; the affiant further states that the service of the said Gee as herein stated is known by his own personal knowledge, having served with him as herein stated.

The following is a report of facts made by Wilkes H. Motgan
County Judge of Anderson County at the regular May Term of the
Anderson County Court, held at the Court House in Lawrenceburg,
Ky. on May the 20th, 1912, in the matter of application for
Pension of James P. Gee :

The said applicant James P. Gee whose Post Office is Lawrenceburg,
Ky. being duly sworn testifies as follows :

That he is 67 years of age, and has resided in Anderson County,
continuously all his life, and that he is not able to earn a
support by manual labor: that he is not able to earn a support by
reason of his knowledge, art or skill in any profession, trade or
craft : that his only means of support is by assisting his wife in
running a boarding house : that he and his wife own jointly a
house and lot worth \$1700.00 and owe on it \$300.00 that his
and his wifes' income from the boarding house whcih is all the
income they have amounts to about \$150.00 a year.

that they ~~###~~ no other property except a few household goods,
amounting to \$50.00 or \$60.00

That he was formerly a Blacksmith but is now not able to follow
that business.

Merritt Robinson, whose Post Office is Lesthers Store, Ky.
testifies that he has known James P. Gee for many years, and
that he is now not able to supportn himself by manual labor ;
that what little income, if any, he and his wife have, is from
keeping the boarding house wich amounts to about \$125.00 or \$150.
per year, and he believes that a Pension should be granted said
James P. Gee.

In view of the foregoing statement, I recomend that a Pension be
granted the said James P. Gee.

Dear Sir:-

Upon examination of the proof filed with your application for pension I find that one witness testifies that you served in the same company with him from the time you enlisted till the close of the war. I find that the record shows that you enlisted September 2nd, 1862, and that on October 15, 1862, you were 'absent without leave' and no further record of your service is found in the War Dept. Proof to reconcile the statement in the record with the testimony of the witness, and to show more certainly the length of your service, and when and how you got out of the army, is necessary.

Get all the proof you can and forward to this office to be filed with your application before it is submitted to the Pension Board for its action.
