Before any questions are answered the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God." 2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient. 3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal. 4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled. 5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims. 6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

C. T. Com, of Staunton, Ky., being sworn
testified that he knows the applicant, Mrs.
Mary C. Crim, that she has been a resident
of Staunton for at least fifteen years that
she is the widow of Charles W. Crim and
was living with him at the time of his death,
that she has no property other than a little
household property, no income, nor is she
able to labor for a livelihood, that she is
a good citizen and worthy of a pension.

J. Bond, of Staunton, Ky., being sworn,
states that he has known Mrs. Mary C. Crim
for at least fifteen years, or since she has
been a resident of Staunton, that she is
the widow of Chas. W. Crim and was living with
him as his lawful wife at the time of his death,
that she has no property other than a little
household goods, no income, nor is she able
to work for her support, that she is a good
citizen and is in all respects worthy of pension.

The above is a memorandum of the testimony
of C. T. Com and J. Bond both of Staunton
Ky. taken upon behalf of Mrs. Mary C. Crim.
I recommend that pension be allowed.
