# Questions for Applicant

Caroline Jackson of said State and County, desiring to avail herself of the pension allowed to Indigent Widows of Soldiers, General Assembly, approved March 18, 1914, hereby submits her proofs, and after being duly sworn true answers to make to the following questions, deposes and answers as follows:

1. What is your full name and where do you reside? (Give State, County and Postoffice) Carolin Jackson, East Main Street, Georgetown, Ky.
2. How long and since when have you been a resident of this State? Since February, 22, 1848, date of my birth
3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name? February 22, 1848, in Grant County, Ky. Carolin Brumback
4. When and where was your husband born—state his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony. (A copy of the marriage license or affidavits of two or more persons who know when the applicant was married to her husband, must accompany the application) March 18, 1847 in Galitin Co. Ky. His full name George Washington Jackson— Married in Owen Co. John Foster, performed ceremony
5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States? Jan. 1864 Company A, First Batallion, Fifth Kentucky Remimnet Under Gen. Basil Duke
6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? From Jan. 1864 until April 13, 1865
7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender? Christiansburg, Va. when Gen Lee surrendered and at that place and time he was transfered by Gen Basil Duke to Colonel Giltner and was parolled at Mt. Sterling, ~~Kent~~ Ky. about May 2, 1865
8. Was your husband present at the time and place when his Company and Regiment surrendered? Yes
9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority? XX
10. When and where did your husband die? June 2, 1930 at Georgetown, Ky.
11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? I was

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."  
2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.  
3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.  
4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.  
5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.  
6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister or the affidavit of a witness at the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

**NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.**

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.

Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.

I, G.W. Jackson being first duly sworn do hereby state that I enlisted in the army of the Southern Confederacy in the month of January 1864 in Company A - First Battalion, Fifth Kentucky Regiment under General Basil Duke and served under him continuously until the 13th day of April 1865. My regiment was at Christiansburg Va., when General Lee surrendered and at that place I was transferred by Gen'l. Basil Duke to Colonel Giltner so that I might come to Kentucky to be paroled. I was paroled at Mt. Sterling Ky., about the 2nd day of May 1865. I was married to Caroline Brumback in Owen County Ky., on the 17th day of October 1867 and we are still living together as husband and wife.
