

Soldier's Application for Pension

I, James Harvey Phillips
am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Gales in the County of Lyon
in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between
the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of
Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear
that I was a member of Companies "I" & "K" 3rd Kentucky Inf-
antry and Company " " "
in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the
benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,
and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-
ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Crittendon County, Kentucky, 1841.

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer June 18th 20th 1861 Company "I," 3rd Kentucky Inf. Col. Pillman
Col. Johnson, Col. Ben Anderson, Col. G. P. Thomas, Col. G. C. H. H. H. H.
Col. H. H. H.; Captains Bill Sheppard, Tom Barnett & Webster.

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer Capt. Webster and fourteen of my company were out on scout duty when Gen.
Lyons surrendered my command, and when he learned he had surrendered we disbanded and went home.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

If so, when and under what circumstances?

Answer I served in the 3rd regiment Kentucky Infantry from the time I enlisted until December
1864. At this time three others and myself were placed on out post picket duty below Johnsonville,
Penn., and Gen. Forrest and the command moved away leaving us behind without notifying us
and without giving us any orders. We did not know they had gone until 12 hours or more later. We
fell in with the command of Gen. Lyon who came along the next day and I served under him
during the rest of the war.



To Applicants for Pension

The material facts to be proven in the pension claim, under the laws of the State of Kentucky, are as follows:

- 1. Service in army.
- 2. Present Disability.
- 3. Indigency.
- 4. How you got out of the Army.
- 5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
- 6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

- 1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
- 2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
- 3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
- 4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
- 5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.
