

Soldier's Application for Pension

I, James H. Humley
am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Westport in the County of De Kalb
in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between
the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of
Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear
that I was a member of Co. G, 9 Ky. Cav.

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the
benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,
and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-
ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Henry County, Kentucky, July 3, 1838.

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you
served?

Answer September, 1862 at Frankfort, Ky. Gen. John Morgan, Col. W.C.

Stones, 1 Lieut. Sam. Lee, 2 Lieut. Storts.

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer Surrendered at Chattanooga, Tenn. in April, 1865.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer Never in prison.

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer No.

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer Yes.

If so, when and under what circumstances?

Answer At Chattanooga, Tenn. in April, 1865. Was required to take it.

Both witnesses state that he is not able by reason of his bad health to earn a support.

- 6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

- 1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
- 2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
- 3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
- 4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
- 5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

This matter having laid over from the last regular term of this Court and coming on for trial, R. L. Latimer whose post-office address is La Grange, Ky. and James S. Button whose post-office address is La Grange, Kentucky, having been first duly sworn testified as follows in open Court:

That James N. Hunley, the applicant herein is a citizen and resident of Westport, Oldham County, Ky., and has been such continuously for 35 ^{lost post} years, and that his post-office address is Westport, Oldham County, Kentucky; that he owns no property of any kind; that his wife is living and owns no property of any kind and has no income; that he has no other income except from his manual labor, and that on account of his age and physical condition he is not capable of earning a support and does not earn as much as \$300.00 per annum; that he has no knowledge of any art, profession or skill that will enable him to earn a support thereby; that his support is not provided for by contract with any person and that he does not receive any pension whatever.

I hereby recommend that a pension be granted to the said James N. Hunley under the Kentucky Confederate Pension Law.
