

Soldier's Application for Pension

I, Robert Aaron Waller

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Morganfield in the County of Union

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of 18th Kentucky Cavalry Company "G"

as private

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the

benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,

and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family.

I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

Camp Chase prison then to prison Cincinnati Ohio and then to
Rock Island prison where I was paroled as stated above.

To Applicants for Pension

The material facts to be proven in the pension claim, under the laws of the State of Kentucky, are as follows:

1. Service in army.
2. Present Disability.
3. Indigency.
4. How you got out of the Army.
5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

The records show that one Waller, private, Captain J. S. Chapman's Company, subsequently Old Company H, and finally New Company F, 10th (Johnson's) Kentucky Cavalry, Confederate States Army, joined for duty and was enrolled September 6, 1862, in Union County, Kentucky, and was mustered in to date August 25, 1862; that, as Robert A. Waller, he was captured July 20, 1863, at Cheshire, Ohio, and paroled at Rock Island Barracks. He was transferred March 6, 1865, for exchange, and was received March 10-12, 1865, at Boulware and Cox's Wharf, Virginia.

The records also show that transportation was furnished him from Washington, D. C., to Uniontown, Kentucky, July 12, 1865.

I, J. E. Lilly Judge of the Union Circuit Court state that on the 1st day of June 1912 there was filed in the office of the Clerk of the Union County Court the application of Robert Aaron Waller of Morganfield, Kentucky for pension under the act of the legislature of 1912 allowing pensions to confederate soldiers. This application was docketed at the June term of this Union County Court and continued until the July term in obedience to the law and at the July term of the Union County Court, evidence was given by the applicant who appeared in court and gave testimony as to his citizenship and his inability to earn a living by manual labor and to his now owning any property, all of which facts are known to the court to be true and no property is assessed to him in this county and he is entitled to a pension as this court believes, meeting all of the requirements of the law.
