

Soldier's Application for Pension

I, J. W. Martinie

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Arlington in the County of Carlisle

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Co "E" 12th Ky Mounted Inf.

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

The material facts to be proven in the pension claim, under the laws of the State of Kentucky, are as follows:

- 1. Service in army.
- 2. Present Disability.
- 3. Indigency.
- 4. How you got out of the Army.
- 5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
- 6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

- 1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
- 2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
- 3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
- 4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
- 5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

The court finds that he has resided continuously in this county for 45 or 50 years, owns 19 acres of land worth \$400; has no income, agreement or contract for his support, is a widower and unable to earn a support, having been shot through the chest with minnie ball in the battle of Bellmont.

J. Willingham, of Bardwell, Ky., being sworn, have known him 40 or 50 years, has resided in this county all the time; has 19 acres of land worth \$400, has no income, no agreement or contract for his support and is wholly unable to earn a living.

W. C. Ray, of Bardwell, Ky., being sworn, says that he has known him 25 or 30 years as a resident of this County all the time; he owns about 20 acres of land worth about \$400; he has no income or ability to earn a support.

Witnesses are known to us and are credible. Recommended.
