- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent. Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.

Susan B. Parrott, for a pension ^{J.P. Seay} was introduced and sworn as a
witness upon her behalf and testified, "That she was an actual bona fide
resident of Hickman County, Kentucky, with P.O. Address at, Clinton R. & W. 1
That she is not able to earn a support by manual labor; nor able to earn a sup-
port by reason of her knowledge, art or skill in any profession, trade or craft;
that she does not receive a pension from the United States or any State or
foreign government; that she has not removed from this State or been absent
therefrom for as long a period as one year within the last past 35 years; that
she does not possess a net income to the amount of \$300.00 per year; that she
does not own property of the value of \$2500.00; that her support is not provid-
ed for by any kind or character of a contract or agreement; that she is not,
by reason of her combined partial ability to earn a support and income or
property, or any or all of these combined, able to obtain an income of \$300.00
per year; that she is the owner of land ^{life estate} of the value of \$500⁰⁰ and
personal property of the value of \$300⁰⁰, and the income from both will
not exceed \$50⁰⁰ per year and she has no money or other property or an
income from any other source. ~~That her wife has no property of value or income.~~

Jas. Wiley Kinkadee, being duly sworn on behalf of the appli-
cant, testified "That he ^{is} was a resident of Hickman County, Kentucky, with P.O.
address at Clinton R. & W. 1, and has known applicant, Susan B. Parrott
for at least 40 years and she now resides in Hickman County, Ky., and has been
a continuous, bona fide resident of this State for the last past 44 years at
least; that she ^{owns in land} owns land of the value of \$500⁰⁰ and personal property of
the value of \$300⁰⁰, and the income from both would not exceed \$50⁰⁰ per
year and this is all the income, known to him, that she has; and she is not
able to earn a support by manual labor; that he does not believe she receives
a pension from any source, and to the best of his knowledge and belief this is
all the property or income she has or means from which to obtain a support.

Via, being present and representing the Commonwealth: the judge after hearing the testimony in open court finds therefrom the following facts, to wit:—That said applicant, Susan B. Parrott, is a citizen of the United States and now resides and has been an actual, bona fide, continuous resident of Kentucky, since the 5 day of July 1872, and has not been absent therefrom since said date for as long a period as one year; that she is not able to earn a support by manual labor; receives no pension at all from any source; is the owner of property of the value of \$ 800⁰⁰; that her support is not provided for by any contract or agreement in any way or manner whatsoever; that her means of support is limited to an income of not exceeding \$ 50⁰⁰ per annum from any and all sources ~~and his wife has no property or income.~~

I, hereby, certify that the witnesses, Jos. A. Bugg & J. M. Seay, whose signatures are attached to this application for a pension are each and all reputable and entitled to credit. A brief memorandum of the substance of the testimony of each of the witnesses heard on this trial together with their names and P.O. Address, accompany the finding of these facts and each of said witnesses are reputable and entitled to credit. Believing this application to be just and meritorious, it is recommended that this pension be granted.
