# Soldier's Application for Pension

I, S. J. Huffman

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Peunet in the County of Greenup  
in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of  
Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Company 65<sup>th</sup> Regiment Kentucky  
Volunteer Infantry

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the  
benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,  
and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-  
ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer I was born in Greenup County Kentucky in 1837

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you  
served?

Answer I enlisted November 19<sup>th</sup> 1861 in Co 65<sup>th</sup> Regiment  
Kentucky Volunteer Infantry. Col John S. Williams. Captains  
Harry Hawkins

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer I got out of the Army November 19<sup>th</sup> 1862 having served out  
my term of enlistment at Hagli Green Ky

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer No

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer Yes

If so, when and under what circumstances?

Answer I was taken to Portsmouth Ohio after I came out of  
the army in 1862 and there I took the oath of allegiance

Answer *I had no income the past year from any source and my wife was dead*

Answer *No, but W. Allen Grumphy is my agent*

And they further make oath to the following facts touching the applicant's service in the Confederate army.

Said Griffith makes oath that said applicant was a member of the same Company and Regt. that he was, Co. C. 5th Ky. Inf. Regt. for the term of one year. Said Johnson makes oath that said applicant was a member of Co. B. 5th Ky. Inf. while he, Johnson, was a member of Co. A. same Regt. and that said Huffman served one year in said Co. C. 5th Ky. Regt. Both further swear that said applicant served in Confederate army from Nov 1861 to Nov 1862 the full term for which he enlisted and that his conduct while in army was good and that said 5th Ky. Regt. was honorably disbanded at expiration of term and both further state that they know from their personal knowledge that said applicant is unable to earn a support by manual labor.

The material facts to be proven in the pension claim, under the laws of the State of Kentucky, are as follows:

1. Service in army.
2. Present Disability.
3. Indigency.
4. How you got out of the Army.
5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.


