I, Jesse F. McGuire
am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Farmers P.O. in the County of Rowan
in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between
the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of
Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear
that I was a member of Company "C" 5th Kentucky

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the
benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,
and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-
ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:







SUBSTANCE OF THE EVIDENCE IN THE CASE OF JESSE F. MCGUIRE, ~~apx~~ on application for Pension befor J.W.Riley, Judge of the Rowan County Court. D.B.Caudill, Atty for Applicant. E. Hodge, present, County Attorney.

First Witness, was the applicant, Jesse F. McGuire: who stated as follows:

I will be 69 years old Sept. 30, 1912. I served in the Civil War in the Confederate Army from October 8th, 1862 to the Close of the War, or May 5th, 1865. I enlisted under Captain David Lykins, and later went under Captain T.J.Henry, Co. "C" Fifth Kentucky, Our colonel was H. Hawkins.

I live in K ntucky, and have made this my home all my life, I came to Rowan County in 1901, and have lived here ever since, I moved here from Clarke County, I have lived ~~ix~~ in tow or three different County in the State.

I draw no pension from any other goverment or from any other source, I have a little small farm in Rowan County, near Farmers, worth not to exceed \$200., and this all the real estate that I own, or have an interest in, I own personal property not to exceed in value \$150.00., and this all the personal property that I have. There is no provision made for my support by any person or in any way, and the only means of support that I have, is by my own efforts. My net income for a year is nothing, and we can hardly manage to get along.

I file a certified copy of my parole herewith and make it apart of my evidence.

SECOND Witness for Jesse F. McGuire, was Dr. F.M. Carter, He states as follows:

I am 74 years old, and have known the applicant, Jesse F. McGuire for more than 50 years. I saw him in the Confederate Army as a Soldier, and I treated him while in service. He has lived here in our County) (Rowan) for the past 10 or 12 years continuously, He has a little small farm near Farmers, worth about \$200. and I think he has a horse, and ~~mxh~~ maybe a cow,

both of which would not be worth exceeding \$100. He has a few house-hold goods, and if he has any other property I do not know about, and I have lived within a mile and one-half of him continuously for the past 10 years. He is old and not really able to work, He gets no pension from any source whatever that I ever heard of, and I feel certain that he does not get any. He is considered a good man, a good citizen, and was a good soldier during the war. He has no one to support him, and no means of support only as above stated.

THIRD Witness for Jesse F. McGuire, was his nephew, Willie McGuire.

I am 32 years old, My Uncle Jesse F. McGuire, the applicant in this case, has live here in Rowan County for the past 10 or 12 years, He lives in about a mile and one-half of Farmers. He has a small farm ~~xxxx~~ worth \$200., he has a horse, and Cow, I do not think all his personal property worth more \$150.00, and if all the property he has in the world was cashed I do not think he would have as much as \$400. He has no means of support known to me, except by his own work and efforts, and he should now quit work as he is really unable to work.


ROWAN COUNTY COURT.

SPECIAL TERM, APRIL 8th. 1933.

This day a petition was filed in the Rowan County Court stating that Jesse F. McGuire was a person old and infirm and not capable of transacting his own business and affairs; upon said petition an inquest was held; two physicians, A.W. Adkins and T.A.E. Evans were called, and the following jury was duly empanelled and sworn, Matta Kissinger, Everett Caskey, Jake Crisp, Edd Hall, J.G. Pratt and L.C. Tackett, and after hearing all the evidence and instruction of the Court, returned in open court the following verdict: We, the jury find that Jesse F. McGuire is not capable of transacting his own business" E.E. Caskey. Whereof it is adjudged by the court that Jesse F. McGuire is an incompetent person and should be committed to the custody of a Committee.

Thereupon the Court appointed Dr. Thos. A. E. Evans Committee for said Jesse F. McGuire who being in court accepted said appointment and executed bond in the penal sum of \$800.00 with Claude Evans as surety, which bond was approved by the court, and said Evans took the oath required by law.


