# Soldier's Application for Pension

I, John Staugh  
 am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Humeville in the County of Greenup  
 in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between  
 the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of  
 Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear  
 that I was a member of Company D 5th Ky Inf Reg  
 in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the  
 benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,  
 and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-  
 ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Carter County Ky in year of 1849.

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer In Aug. 1861, I thurs in command of John Williams, My officers

2nd Lieut John Horton, 3rd Lieut not remembered, Hyman Africa, 1st Lieut

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer Disbanded at Hazel Green, about Dec 1862, the time for  
which we enlisted being up.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer In Fall of 1864 at Christiansburg, before US Marshal John

What estate have you in your own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer *No Real Estate. Personal property net worth \$200<sup>00</sup>*

What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer *None at all.*

State the net income of yourself and your wife from all sources for the past year. This must include all money received either from wages, rents or interest on loaned money, if any.

Answer *Not so exceed \$100<sup>00</sup>*

Do you use intoxicants to any extent?

How long and since when have you been an actual resident of the State of Kentucky?

The material facts to be proven in the pension claim, under the laws of the State of Kentucky, are as follows:

1. Service in army.
2. Present Disability.
3. Indigency.
4. How you got out of the Army.
5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

Replying to yours of recent date relative to the case of John C. Webb, the vouchers which were mailed to his address for the May and August payments have been returned to this office unclaimed, and even if you had received them it would have been impossible for you or anyone else, except Mr. Webb, to fill out and return those vouchers.

You informed me that Mr. Webb has been absent from the State since the 1st day of March last, which is now more than five months. The law provides that when a pensioner is absent from the State for as much as three months his name shall be dropped from the pension roll. Consequently Mr. Webb's name will be dropped from the roll.


In-re application for Pension of John Waugh.
