

Soldier's Application for Pension

Peter Dozier

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Versailles in the County of Woodford

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Co. B 7th Ky. Cavalry C.S.A.

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Madison County Ky. Sept 11. 1843

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer In the fall of 1862, in Co. B. 7th Ky. Cavalry, C.S.A. Col. Waller Chevauret. Regimental officer, Jas. Chevauret first Captain of Co. Alice Tribble second Captain.

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer at the close of the war, I walked to Mt. Sterling, from, near Old Richmond Va.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer yes: Camp Douglas, for about twenty months.

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer yes. Camp Douglas, in 1865, and sent back to Old Richmond Va. for exchange.

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer yes.

If so, when and under what circumstances?

Answer in 1865, after the war, at Lexington, Va. under Compulsion.

In what business are you now engaged, if any, and what do you earn?

Answer *None - nothing*

What estate have you in your own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer *None*

What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer *None*

- 4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.

He enlisted September 10, 1862; was captured July 19, 1863, at Buffington, Ohio; paroled at Camp Douglas, Illinois, and was transferred February 24, 1865, to Point Lookout, Maryland, for exchange. No later record of him has been found.

The affiant Thos. S. Fowler says he is a citizen of Woodford County, Ky. and 83 years of age; that he is well acquainted with Peter Dozier, who lives in Versailles, Ky. and has known him well ever since his boyhood; that affiant enlisted in the Confederate army in Company B., commanded first by Capt. Joe Chenault, and afterwards by Capt. Alex. Tribble, in the 7th Regiment of Kentucky Cavalry, of which David Walter Chenault was 1st Colonel, and Jos. T. Tucker Lieutenant Colonel, and Jas. B. McCreary, Major, in Madison County, Ky. about the 1st of September, 1862, and that said Peter Dozier enlisted, both of us as Privates, in said Company and Regiment, at the same time and place with affiant, and that affiant and said Dozier served together in said Company and Regiment, which belonged to the command of Gen. John H. Morgan, until the fight at Buffington Island in Ohio, on Morgan's raid into Ohio, when both affiant and said Dozier were captured, and both sent to Federal prison at Camp Douglas, at Chicago, Ill., where they remained prisoners of war until some time in the early spring of 1865, when both were sent around to Richmond, Va. for exchange; that when they reached Richmond, an exchange of prisoners had been made only a few days before, and exchanges were only made once in about three months, and affiant and said Dozier had to wait until the next day for exchange before being exchanged. Affiant says that after reaching Richmond, he was assigned to a Confederate camp for paroled prisoners awaiting exchange, and before the next period for exchange arrived, the war had closed. Affiant then walked home to Kentucky, being paroled by the Federals at Cumberland Gap, and permitted to come home. Affiant does not recall seeing said Dozier after affiant's assignment to the parole camp, until after they both had reached home in Madison County, Ky. shortly after the close of the war, but affiant knows personally that from the time of their enlistment in September 1862, said Dozier served

as a good soldier until imprisoned in Camp Douglas; that he remained a prisoner of war as a Confederate soldier, after the Buffington Island fight, for nearly two years, and was sent around for exchange back into active service as herein-before stated.
