# Questions for Applicant

STATE OF KENTUCKY,

Woodford County.

Mrs Margaret Ann Dozier of said State and County, desiring to avail herself of the pension allowed to Indigent Widows of Soldiers, General Assembly, approved March 18, 1914, hereby submits her proofs, and after being duly sworn true answers to make to the following questions, deposes and answers as follow:

*is made a part of this application and is affirmed to be true by me as affiant in this application*

1. What is your full name and where do you reside? (Give State, County and Postoffice.)

Mrs. Margaret Ann Dozier, Versailles, Woodford County, Ky.

2. How long and since when have you been a resident of this State? all of my life, 64 years

3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name? April 4, 1857, in Mercer County, Ky. Margaret Ann Cunningham

County, Ky. Margaret Ann Cunningham

4. When and where was your husband born—state his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony. (A copy of the marriage license or affidavits of two or more persons who know when the applicant was married to her husband, must accompany the application) Sept 11, 1843, Madison County, Ky., Peter Dozier Married at Oregon, Mercer County, Ky., Don't remember who performed the Ceremony

5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States?

In the Fall of 1862, in Co. B, 7<sup>th</sup> Ky. Cav. CSA Col. Walter Chewant

6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? until the close of the war

7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender? For answer to this question I refer to his own statements in application as stated above.

8. Was your husband present at the time and place when his Company and Regiment surrendered? For answer to this question and also to the following (no. 9) I refer to his application for pension as stated above.

9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority? I have no personal information on the matters asked by these two questions (8 and 9).

10. When and where did your husband die? December 15, 1921, at Versailles, Ky.

11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? Yes.

12. Have you married since the death of your soldier husband? No.

13. What property, real or personal, or income do you have or possess, and its gross value? None

14. Have you a family? If so, who compose such family? yes, have a family, I live with my only daughter, who is childless, and her husband at Versailles, Ky. and have three sons, Will, Lee and Edd, all living to themselves.

15. Name some friend, giving his name and postoffice address, who will be willing to have us write to him about your case if necessary

# Questions for Witnesses

STATE OF KENTUCKY,

Woodford County.

Henry S Hill and S.C. Cunningham, of said State and County, having been presented as a witness in support of the application of Mrs. Margaret Ann Dozier for a pension under Confederate Pension Law, approved March 18, 1914, after being duly sworn, true answers to make to the following questions, deposes and answers as follows:

1. What is your name and what is your postoffice address? Henry S Hill and S.C. Cunningham Versailles, Ky.
2. Are you acquainted with the applicant, Mrs. Margaret Ann Dozier, yes  
If so, how long have you known her? about 42 yrs. by said Hill, and at least 45 yrs. by said Cunningham.
3. Where does she reside, and how long and since when has she been a resident of this State? Versailles, Woodford County, Ky. and has been a resident of the State of Ky. all her life.
4. Were you ever acquainted with her husband? answer by both, yes.
5. Were either or both of you present at the marriage? S.C. Cunningham says No, he was not; said Hill says he was.
6. How long did you know him? about 42 yrs by said Hill; by said Cunningham ever since he was married to the applicant.
7. When and where did Peter Dozier enlist in the war between the States, and in what Company and Regiment did he enlist, and how do you know this? both answer that he does not know where said Dozier enlisted, nor the Company or Regiment in which he enlisted, except by hearsay.
8. Were you a member of the same Company and Regiment at the close of the war? No.
9. How long did he perform regular military duty? do not know
10. When and where was his Company and Regiment surrendered? do not know
11. Were you with the command when it surrendered? no.
12. Was Peter Dozier, the husband of applicant, present? do not know.
13. If not present, where was he? do not know.
14. When and where did he leave his command? do not know.  
For what cause? do not know.  
By whose authority did he leave? do not know.  
How do you know all this? (State fully and clearly.) I do not know all this. Have no personal knowledge of Peter Dozier's war record or his connection with the military service with the Confederate Army.
15. When and where did Peter Dozier die? Versailles, Ky. Dec. 15, 1921.
16. Where did he reside at his death, and how long had he been a resident of Kentucky at his death? Versailles, Woodford County, Ky. and had resided there ever since his marriage, and had resided in the State of Ky. all his life.
17. Do you know of your own knowledge that applicant is the lawful widow of Peter Dozier? yes.

18. Has she remained unmarried since her soldier husband's death, and is she now his widow? Yes

both say that Peter Dozier and the applicant lived together as husband and wife until the date of his death Dec. 15, 1921.

19. What property, effects or income has the applicant, if any, and how do you know this of your own knowledge? None.

We have been intimately acquainted with her and her affairs even since her marriage. Neither Peter Dozier nor the applicant had any property at the death of said Dozier, and the applicant has none now.

Has applicant conveyed any property, in the last two years or given any away, if so, what was it, and to whom?

None. \* Said witness Henry S. Hill, says that he married applicant's sister, before the applicant & said Dozier married, and was present when they married, that they were married at Oregon, Mercer Co. Ky. by a Baptist

NOTE.—Let the witness who can answer the greatest number of questions do so; then let the other witness state in the space below how much of the testimony of the first witness he concurs in, and whether or not he can answer any of the questions not answered by the first witness.

Preacher, named Harvey, on a license issued by the Clerk of the Woodford County Court, dated Sept. 15, 1881, which said license said witness saw there; It was given to the Preacher, possibly by the witness but he does not know what the Preacher did with it. Said Dozier and applicant came over to Woodford County after they married, and lived there together as husband and wife until the death of said Dozier on Dec. 15, 1921.

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
- 2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
- 3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
- 4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
- 5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
- 6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

**NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.**

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.

Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.


Finding of facts by Robert S. Hawkins,

I, Robert S. Hawkins, Judge of the Woodford County Court certify that the following testimony was introduced in the Woodford County Court relative to granting of pension to Mrs. Margaret Ann Dezier. The witnesses introduced were Henry L. Hill and Ames Dezier, both of whom having been first duly sworn testified that the said Mrs. Dezier was a resident of Woodford County, Ky., that she was the widow of Peter Dezier, deceased, and that in so far as they knew applicant had no property or estate of any kind either in Woodford County, or elsewhere. The witness Hill testifying that he had known the applicant for about forty-two years, and the witness Dezier testifying that he had known applicant for about forty years.

After hearing said testimony it is the opinion of the Judge of the Woodford County Court, that the pension asked for by said applicant should be granted. The County Attorney, Will D. Jesse, was present, representing the Commonwealth. Given under my hand in duplicate, this March 15, 1922.
