1. What is your full name and where do you reside? (Give State, County and Postoffice.) *Catharine Campbell Stacy Perry County Ky.*
2. How long and since when have you been a resident of this State? *Born and raised in Ky.*
3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name? *Born in Perry County Apr. 5th 1847. My name was Catharine Smith*
4. When and where was your husband born—state his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony. (If possible, attach certified copy marriage license in every case.) *In the County of Perry Sept. 27th 1867. his name Caleb Campbell, married in Perry Co. Sam Combs Performed Ceremony.*
5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States? *Enlisted near the beginning of war under command of Gen. Caudle and Captain Hays*
6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? *over 1 year & were captured.*
7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender? *don't know but think they were at Gladesville*
8. Was your husband present at the time and place when his Company and Regiment surrendered? *no he was in prison*
9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority? *took sick while in service started home on furlow... and were captured on this way*
10. When and where did your husband die? *at his home in Perry Co. July 29th 1905*
11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? *Yes*
12. Have you married since the death of your soldier husband? *No*
13. What property, real or personal, or income do you have or possess, and its gross value? *1 Cow and 1 mule. Value \$125.00*
14. Have you a family? If so, who compose such family? *None*

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
- 2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
- 3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
- 4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
- 5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
- 6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.



NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.

Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.



The Confederate records show that Caleb Campbell, private, Company C (Captain Anderson Hays), Colonel Benj. E. Caudill's Regiment, Kentucky Infantry, Confederate States Army, enlisted October 1, 1862.

The records of prisoners of war show that he was captured in Brethitt County, Kentucky, March 5, 1864, paroled at Camp Chase, Ohio, May 2, 1865, and received at Vicksburg, Mississippi, May 12, 1865, by H.T. Fisher, captain, 53d United States Colored Infantry; that he was admitted to United States Army General Hospital No. 2, Vicksburg, Mississippi, May 21, 1865, and returned to duty May 23, 1865.






Perry Circuit Court .

Be it known, that on the 8th day of June, 1912, the within application of Catherine Campbell for Pension, was filed in this Court, and after having lain over for one term of Court as required by law, -at the ensuing August Term, the County Attorney being present, appeared the witnesses Tom Hughes, Zack Campbell, and John Smith, who were duly sworn by me and who testified in substance as follows :

The witness John Smith, states that he was present at the marriage of the claimant to the deceased soldier, Caleb Campbell ; that this marriage occurred in Perry County, in the year 1866, or about that time, and that Rev Samuel Combs performed the ceremony .

The witnesses Tom Hughes and Zack Campbell, stated that they are close neighbors and acquaintances of the claimant ; that they were acquainted with her soldier husband before his death ; that they have lived near neighbors to the claimant since his death, and by this means they know that she is his lawful widow ; that she has not re-married since his death ; they further state that she has no means of support, and is not residing with anyone who is legally bound to support her under any contract ; that she has no property nor income, and that she receives no pension from the United States or any foreign Government .

UNITED STATES STANDARD CERTIFICATE OF DEATH

Statement of occupation.—Precise statement of occupation is very important, so that the relative healthfulness of various pursuits can be known. Make some entry in this section for every person aged 10 years or over. If the occupation had been given up or changed on account of the disease causing death, report the occupation prior to illness. If the deceased had retired from business, report the occupation prior to retirement. Children not gainfully employed may be returned as *at school* or *at home*. For a woman whose only occupation was that of home housework, write *housework* in answer to Question 8 and *own home* in answer to Question 9. For a person engaged in domestic service for wages, however, designate the occupation by the appropriate terms, as *housekeeper—private family*, *cook—hotel*, etc. For a person who had no occupation whatever write *none*.

To be complete, an occupation return must state:

- 8.—The trade, profession, or particular kind of work done.
- 9.—The industry or business in which the work was done.
- 10.—The month and year the deceased last worked at the occupation.
- 11.—The number of years the deceased followed the occupation.

In stating the occupation, avoid the use of such indefinite terms as "employee," "worker," "operative," etc. Find out the particular kind of work done and return that, as *spinner*, *weaver*, etc.

In stating the industry or business, avoid the use of such general terms as "store," "factory," "mill," etc. State the particular kind of store, factory, mill, etc., as *grocery store*, *soap factory*, *cotton mill*, etc.

Distinguish carefully the different kinds of engineers by stating the full descriptive titles, as *civil engineer*, *mechanical engineer*, *mining engineer*, *stationary engineer*, etc. Avoid the term "laborer" when a more precise statement of the occupation can be secured. Do not use the word "mechanic," but give the exact occupation, as *carpenter*, *painter*, *machinist*, etc. Distinguish carefully between *retail* and *wholesale merchants*. A person who sells goods should be called a *salesman* and not a *clerk*.

Statement of cause of death.—Cause of death means the disease, injury, or complication which causes death, *not* the mode of dying, e. g., heart failure, asphyxia, asthenia, etc. As principal cause name the disease or injury causing death. As related causes, name earlier morbid conditions, if any, related to the principal cause and any important complication of the principal cause. Under contributory causes of importance not related to principal cause, name other important diseases or injuries. Examples:

EXAMPLE I

The principal cause of death and related causes of importance in order of onset were as follows:	Date of onset
<i>Arteriosclerosis</i>	<i>1915</i>
<i>Chronic interstitial nephritis</i>	<i>1921</i>
<i>Cerebral hemorrhage</i>	<i>July 5, 1927</i>
Contributory causes of importance not related to principal cause:	
<i>Fracture of arm</i>	
<i>Automobile accident</i>	<i>May 3, 1927</i>

EXAMPLE II

The principal cause of death and related causes of importance in order of onset were as follows:	Date of onset
<i>Attack of epilepsy</i>	<i>1 week ago</i>
<i>Run over by street car</i>	<i>1 week ago</i>
<i>Peritonitis</i>	<i>3 days ago</i>
Contributory causes of importance not related to principal cause:	
<i>Influenza</i>	<i>6 weeks ago</i>

In a group of causes containing the principal cause and related causes, the causes should be given in the order of onset, so that in a group of three causes the principal cause may appear in either first, second, or third position. The principal cause in each of the above examples happens to be the second cause given.
