

Soldier's Application for Pension

I, B. Waggener ^(GMR)

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Near Dixon in the County of Webster

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Company A. 13th Ky. Partisan Rangers

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Union (now Webster County) State of Ky. Feb-18-1849.

1. Service in army.
2. Present Disability.
3. Indigency.
4. How you got out of the Army.
5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.



Waggener, says that on the 20th, day of June, 1864 he was with a recruiting officer by the name of Vandiver and was with him two or three days just prior to his enlistment under Colonel Hollis who was killed at Slaughtersville, Ky. His company was then under the command of Colonel Cypert for a few weeks until the commands were consolidated and given to Adam R. Johnson.

I, Bob Eddings, state that I was a soldier in the late Civil War and that I served under Gen. Morgan and was captured in the raid through Ohio and was sent to Camp Douglas Prison and in the early part of the winter of 1864 B. Waggener was brought in a prisoner and we remained there in prison until about the first days of March 1865, my command was exchanged and B. Waggener went on the exchange with us. During the remainder of the war B. Waggener and myself were under the command of Gen. Duke. We remained together until after the surrender of Generals Lee and Johnson.

At Big Springs Va. we were together where Federal soldiers scattered our Company, this being after the surrender of Gen. Lee. B. Waggener and myself being cut off from our command started to join the army of Gen Johnson but when we were in about thirty miles of Danville Va. we met portions of Gen. Johnson's army on its way home, they being parolled. We both then knowing the war was over went to work on the farm and B. Waggener stayed on the farm until in June, 1865, when he went to the Federal Post at Henry Courthouse and took the Oath in order to make his way home.
