1. What is your full name and where do you reside? (Give State, County and Postoffice.) My full name is Virginia C Hogg, reside in Booneville Owsley County Kentucky
2. How long and since when have you been a resident of this State? Continuously since the year 1868
3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name? Russell County Virginia, January 12th 1845, my maiden name was Virginia C. Smider
4. When and where was your husband born? State his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony? (If possible, attach certified copy marriage license in every case.) my husband Hiram Hogg was born in what is now Fletcher Co Ky, November 15th 1833, we were married at Rogersville, Tenn, December 29th 1859.
5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States? at Whitesburg Ky, I think
6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? About 3 years
7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender?
8. Was your husband present at the time and place when his Company Regiment surrendered?
9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority?
10. When and where did your husband die? August 29th 1916, at Booneville, Owsley County Kentucky
11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? I was
12. Have you married since the death of your soldier husband? I have not
13. What property, real or personal, or income do you have or possess, and its gross value? only a house and lot in Booneville Ky, worth \$400 and no income
14. Have you a family? If so, who compose such family? I have a family of seven children, as follows Mrs S E Payne, E C Hogg, C W Hogg, J M Hogg, Mrs Ida Sutton, S J Hogg & Mrs W B Smith by my deceased husband Hiram Hogg, two of whom live with me

1. What is your name and what is your postoffice address? S. P. Hogg & John Breeding both of Boonville Ky.
2. Are you acquainted with the applicant, Mrs. Virginia C. Hogg
If so, how long have you known her? more than 60 years
3. Where does she reside, and how long and since when has she been a resident of this State? Boonville Ky. been a continuous resident of this State more than 45 years
4. Were you ever acquainted with her husband? yes
5. Were either or both of you present at the marriage? neither
6. How long did you know him? Sixty years
7. When and where did Hiram Hogg enlist in the war between the States, and in what Company and Regiment did he enlist, and how do you know this? I know that he enlisted in the war between the States and I think at Whitesburg Ky.

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
 3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
 4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
 5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
 6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.

Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.


