that I was a member of Fifth Kentucky Infantry

Company G

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. Liberty Kentucky, states that  
he is well acquainted with  
Fielden Cox of Wolfe County Ky.  
and has known him since about  
Sept 1862. when he with the  
company to which he belonged  
went camped on the farm  
of my father near West Liberty.  
That said Cox was then a member  
of Capt John T Williams company  
A. of the 2nd Ky Bat. mounted  
rifles commanded by Col Thos  
Johnson <sup>of Mass</sup>. O S Terry now of  
Lexington Ky was the Major  
of said Bat.

I served with Fielding Cox  
too during the spring and summer  
of 1863. in Va. On the 23rd day  
of August 1863. our command  
(I being a member of Co. F. of  
said Bat.) left Camp Smith  
in Tazewell Co. Va. and went  
to Dalton Georgia on horseback.  
we were there assigned to the  
division of Genl N B Forrest.  
fought through the battle

of Chieamanga, Sain Fielder  
Boy was with us and in his  
command all this time (played  
many games of cards with  
him during this time)  
we then went on the raice  
made by Geil Joe Wheeler in  
the near of Rosecrans army,  
and crossed the Tennessee  
river going in at the mouth  
of Hiwassee river and crossed  
the Tennessee river going  
out of Sain raice at Russell  
shoals Alabama, Sain Boy  
was with us on that raice.  
His father James Boy who was  
a member of Sain company  
and Co. was wounded  
through the thigh standing  
in ten feet of water  
of battle <sup>in</sup> between Shelbyville  
and Farmington Tenn.  
Fielder Boy was in that battle  
with us, this was in October 1863.  
Sain Boy was with us all the  
time and returned to us  
in the early spring of 1864.  
was with the command in

castles woods, and the hay flats  
up to the last days of March 1864  
when genl. Morgan sent  
fifty of us under Capt John  
H Bradshaw of Co. E. 8th Bat  
into Kentucky on a scout, to  
ascertain the Yankee forces  
at Mt Sterling and Lexington.  
Capt Bradshaw sent six of  
us to meet Liberty. Fielding Cox  
John Colvin, Ureah Elam  
Elias Davis, Green Sexton and  
myself. while en route Liberty  
about the 15<sup>th</sup> day of April  
1864, a heavy force of Yankees  
made into town, and cap-  
tured Fielding Cox and  
John Colvin. The others of us  
escaped and in due time  
returned to our command  
in Va. I was within a few  
feet of said Cox when he  
surrendered to the Yankees.  
He tried to escape but could  
not. The Yankees took him  
and Colvin away with them.  
I never saw him any more  
until the war ended.

In the matter of application for pension of Fielden Cox a soldier in the Confederate States Army, the affiant Fielden Cox says that about the first of October 1861 he volunteered in the Confederate States Army, he was attached to Co. I. Fifth Ky. Infantry, commanded by Col. Jno. S. Williams, that about the middle of May 1862 he only being a boy had a severe spell of sickness and his father James Cox brought him home and the affiant thought procured his discharge and that as soon as he regained his health and some time in the early Spring of 1862, he his father and three other brothers enlisted in Co. A. Second Ky. Cavalry, commanded by Col. Thomas Johnson, the Major was O. S. Tenny, now of Lexington, Ky. My Captain was J. T. Williams and My Lieutenant was my brother A. J. Cox. I served in said Co. and Regiment until the Spring of 1864, when I was captured, near West Liberty, Morgan County Kentucky. I had been detached from the command and was sent to Kentucky under Captain Jno. H. Bradshaw of the Second Ky. Battalion, C. S. A. and ~~was~~ with several of my fellow soldiers was captured at West Liberty as aforesaid and I was sent to Camp Morton, Indiana, until about the last of March 1865 when my health from exposure gave way and we were nearly dead from starvation and the Federal Authorities proposed to turn me loose on parole which I accepted and I took such oath as they required and before I could reach my command the end came and have never yet been exchanged, or surrendered. I never deserted in my life but gave t the better and more active part of my life to the Confederate States Service. I served under Forest and Wheeler, was engaged in the battle Chicamauga, was with Wheler in his Mc Minville raid. We entered Tennessee at the mouth, or near the mouth of Hiawasa River Tenn. and left the state at Mussell Shoal Alabama. My father was badly wounded on this raid and I helped him from the field. My Comrades, Nelson Wills of Mt. Sterling, Ky. and W. H. Tutt, now dead, ~~was~~ also captured. Jno. Powell was killed. I escaped. We returned to Virginia and I was detailed for the raid, or scout to Kentucky and was captured as aforesaid. ~~xxxxxx~~ At the time I was captured, I was under the immediate command of Jno. H. Bradshaw. He sent several of us to the town of West Liberty, Ky. My self and John Colvin were captured. Elias Davis was wounded and left, but afterwards escaped. I never missed a days service when able. I was standing near my Captain, Chap Swango, when he was killed and help carry my father, when wounded in Tenn. from the field. I never deserted and was never absent, except when I thought that I had leave, or was a prisoner of war.

4 The affiant M. F. Day says that Fielden  
5 Cox is his first Cousin in 1861 we  
6 lived in two miles of each other and  
7 were only boys the affiant being fifteen  
8 years old and Fielden Cox being sixteen  
9 years old, in the fall of 1861 we volunt-  
10 eered - but the affiant's father followed  
11 him and took him back home and  
12 he did not finally get away until  
13 in the Spring of 1862 - but Fielden  
14 Cox was mustered into Capt Chap  
15 Swango's Co 5<sup>th</sup> Ky Infantry, <sup>in the fall of 1861</sup> and was  
16 away from home until early in the  
17 Summer of 1862 when his father my  
18 uncle James Cox brought him home  
19 a very sick boy, he got about well  
20 and when Marshall came into Ky  
21 in the fall of 1862 he returned to  
22 his command and was with his  
23 Captain Chap Swango in a skirmish  
24 near Campton Ky in which Capt Swan-  
25 go was killed and it was always  
26 claimed in rebel circles that said  
27 Fielden Cox killed the man who  
28 killed Swango, in this skirmish ~~was~~  
29 M<sup>r</sup> Fall was badly wounded he was with  
30 Capt Swango. The first year's enlistment  
31 expired in the fall of 1862 then the  
32 10<sup>th</sup> Ky Cavalry under A. J. May and the  
2<sup>nd</sup> Ky Mounted Infantry under Thomas  
Johnson was organized, and Fielden

cox joined the Company of J. Williams  
being Co. A. 2<sup>nd</sup> Ky Mounted Infantry and  
I frequently saw him with his regiment  
and Company until the Spring of 1864  
at that time and just before and in  
fact as a part of Morgan's last raid  
into the Fielden Co. Elias & Davis  
<sup>John Campbell & Perry</sup>  
Frank Markwell John Calvin Jonathan  
E. Quicksall J. S. Ingram myself and  
others of whom I do not now remember  
was detached & sent to Tipton as a  
scout under Capt. J. N. Bradshaw  
I was a member of Co. B. 10<sup>th</sup> Ky Cavalry, <sup>Major's</sup> <sup>regiment</sup>  
on the edge of the town of West Liberty  
Morgan Co. by Fielden Co. and John  
Calvin was captured and Elias Davis  
wounded, I saw nothing more of him  
until a day or two before the surren-  
der of my regiment and Col. Johnson's  
regiment at Mt. Sterling Ky he was  
then at home sick greatly reduced  
in flesh and was barely able to walk  
he had a parole or some kind of  
paper showing he had been discharged  
from Camp Morton a Military Prison  
at Indianapolis Ind, we discussed  
what was best for him to do, his  
captain Williams, his Lieut. Cox had  
each refused to surrender, and my rec-  
ollection is that either Col. Johnson or  
Major A. S. Terry advised him that he  
was on the safe side and to go  
to bed and stay at home,  
I carried dispatches to Gen. Wheeler from  
Col. Giltner at the time Wheeler made

1 The Mc Minnville raid I overtook Wheeler  
2 the night after he had crossed the Tennessee  
3 river, I could not return Gen Wheeler as-  
4 signed me <sup>temporarily</sup> to Capt William Cox of 2<sup>d</sup> Reg  
5 Mounted Infantry at my suggestion, Fielden  
6 Cox was then with his Co, together with  
7 his father James Cox, his Lieut A J Cox and  
8 his brother John Cox (his other brother who  
9 was also a soldier in 5<sup>th</sup> Reg Joshua Cox had  
10 been killed in the service) in this raid  
11 much as Cox was wounded and Fielden  
12 Cox myself and John Cox helped him  
13 off the field, of Capt William Cox John  
14 Powell was killed, we crossed <sup>back over</sup> the Ten-  
15-nesson River at Mussell Shoals, and near  
16 Selma Ala, I was given transportation and  
17 receipt for my horse and sent to my  
18 regiment which I found in East  
19 Tennessee

20 Fielden Cox served faithfully, he was  
21 a good horseman, finest pistol shot in  
22 the command, fearless, a wide awake  
23 active scout, he was rather enjoyed  
24 scout duty and is now a quiet good  
25 christian gentleman - but like many  
26 of our boys quite poor.

I am in receipt of yours of the 23rd. In April last I wrote Fielden Cox telling him what proof he had on file and what that proof shows, and that the war records show that he deserted in 1862. Since that he sent me two affidavits besides his own proving his service till the fall of 1864, but there is no proof of further service and none as to when and how he got out of the army. Proof is absolutely necessary on these points, but if he has furnished all the proof he can, or all he desires to I will submit his application to the pension board with the proof now on file.

The proof in your own application is complete and I have recommended the allowance of your claim, and it will be allowed when reached by the Pension Board for consideration.

In the matter of application for pension of Fielden Cox a Soldier in the Confederate States Army Nelson Will says, that he enlisted as a Soldier in Co I 5<sup>th</sup> Ky Infantry about the 1<sup>st</sup> of October 1861, he volunteered for a year in said Company and Regiment in the Confederate States Army the Regiment was Commanded by Col John S Williams, I served my year in said Company and Regiment the Regiment and Company was disbanded at Hazel Green Wolfe Co Ky sometime in October 1862, I was present, and as I now recollect no formal discharges were issued

When I volunteered in said Company and Regiment Fielden Cox was a Member of said Regiment and Company he was only a boy but served with said Company until about the 10<sup>th</sup> of May 1862, he was then quite <sup>sick</sup> and his father James Cox by leave of the officers took him home, I have no recollection of seeing him again until the fall of 1862 he was then with his Regiment & Company near Hazel Green Ky. when the Regiment was discharged, or disbanded

In the early fall of 1862 and just after the Regiment was disbanded at Hazel Green said Fielden Cox, his father James Cox, his <sup>brother</sup> A J Cox, his brother Joshua Cox and

his brother John Cox and myself together  
with many others enlisted again in  
the Confederate army and formed  
Co A 2<sup>nd</sup> Reg Cavalry the officers of Company  
were Capt J J Williams - 1<sup>st</sup> Lieut, was R P  
Jones, 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieut was A J Cox + 3<sup>rd</sup> Lieut was  
W F Robins, The Regimental officers  
Col Thos Johnson and Major O J Jemy  
Said Fielden Cox and myself were  
neighbors at home and served continuously  
after we volunteered in said last named  
Company and regiment together until  
some time in the fall of 1863, when  
on the Wheeler raid across Tennessee  
I was captured, I was sent to Camp-  
Morton at Indianapolis Ind, and I  
saw nor heard anything of said Fielden  
Cox until about the 1<sup>st</sup> day of May 1864  
when he was brought into Camp Morton  
a prisoner of war wearing a Confeder-  
ate uniform, we remained together in  
Camp Morton until a very short time  
before the surrender of Gen Lee, we were  
treated bad had but little clothing but  
little food many of us were sick many  
died and said Fielden Cox was no ex-  
ception and was sick, he was then  
discharged or paroled, and turned out  
and I never saw him again until  
after the close of the war when  
he returned home and has since

made a good citizen, the Regimental  
and Company officers are all dead  
except Maj O S Tenney he lives at  
Lexington Ky and is a very old man

Dear Sir:-

Since the receipt of your request of yesterday for information relative to the application of Fielden Cox, I have carefully re-examined his application in connection with all the proof filed, and I find that in this additional proof his service is proven till the fall of 1864. One witness testifies to his having been in prison with Cox from the fall of 1864 till sometime in the early part of 1865 when he says Cox was released from prison. Mr. Cox states himself in his application that he was released February 1, 1865, but there is no proof showing the conditions of circumstances under which he was released. The proof on file does not bring him within the provisions of the law.
