Soldier's Application for Pension

I, John G. Dearing

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Georgetown in the County of Scott R.F.D. #2

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Virginia, in the war between the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Company "G" #34th Virginia Regiment

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Bedford Co. Va. April 19th 1838.

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer Spring of 1862, Gen Lee's Command, Col Good's
Capt Wm B Jordan, Henry A. Wise's Brigade.

Answer I was made to take the oath, in 1865, Stewartsville Va.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.



He served with us from 1862 until he was wounded just before the close of the war, and was a brave and faithful soldier.

1. Service in army.
2. Present Disability.
3. Indigency.
4. How you got out of the Army.
5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

1. May be proven by officers or comrades.

2. May be proven by physician's certificate.

3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.

4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.

5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.
