In Mississippi at close of war.

1. What is your name and what is your postoffice address? Ben F. Perkins, Sturgis, Kentucky.
2. Are you acquainted with the applicant, Mrs. Emeline Funk Dyer  
If so, how long have you known her? Forty Years or more
3. Where does she reside, and how long and since when has she been a resident of this State? She resides at Sturgis, Ky. and has been a resident of the state all her life
4. Were you ever acquainted with her husband? yes
5. Were either or both of you present at the marriage? yes both
6. How long did you know him? Fifty years or more
7. When and where did James H. Dyer enlist in the war between the States, and in what Company and Regiment did he enlist, and how do you know this? In spring of 1864 I knew because I swore him into the service
8. Were you a member of the same Company and Regiment at the close of the war? Yes
9. How long did he perform regular military duty? About twelve months
10. When and where was his Company and Regiment surrendered? Am not sure, I was out post duty at time at Paris, Tenn.
11. Were you with the command when it surrendered? No.
12. Was James H. Dyer, the husband of applicant, present? Am not sure as I was not there
13. If not present, where was he?
14. When and where did he leave his command? Not sure  
For what cause? I would suppose because the regiment to which he belonged surrendered  
By whose authority did he leave?
- How do you know all this? (State fully and clearly.) I know because I swore him into service, and was with him most of the twelve months of his service, was 1st Lieut., 11th of his Company
15. When and where did James H. Dyer die? at Sturgis, Kentucky, April 30th 1906
16. Where did he reside at his death, and how long had he been a resident of Kentucky at his death? Sturgis, Ky. Born and lived in Kentucky all his life
17. Do you know of your own knowledge that applicant is the lawful widow of James H. Dyer, yes

18. Has she remained unmarried since her soldier husband's death, and is she now his widow?

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

**NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.**

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.

Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.

Dear Sir:-

The application for pension of Mrs. James H. Dyer was received at this office July 12th, 1920, and has just been reached for examination, and I find that your name is given as the person to whom to write concerning it.

When the application reached here I at once applied to the War Department for a copy of any record of the soldier's service that might be on file there, and was informed that the name of James H. Dyer did not appear upon the rolls of the organization to which it is claimed he belonged.

I find that one witness testified to his enlistment as of the spring of 1864, but did not know whether he served till the close of the war or not.

The pension law provides that a soldier shall have served from the date of his enlistment till the close of the war or until he was honorably discharged.

The proof necessary to complete this case is to show when and how James H. Dyer got out of the army, and that proof would have to be made by men who served with him and know the facts and themselves made honorable record.

Dear Madam:-

I have yours of the 29th of June, and am sorry to say that the proof furnished does not bring you within the provisions of the Confederate pension law, for the reason that the law requires that the soldier shall have served from the date of his enlistment till the close of the war unless sooner honorably discharged, and the proof needed to complete your case would be to show when, where, and how your husband got out of the army. From what Ben F. Perkins says in his letter which you sent me he could make an affidavit testifying to your husband's service up till the time he was ordered to report to Gen. Duke in Virginia in the fall of 1864. Then it would require proof to show any further service rendered by your husband and when, where, and how he got out of the army.

I notice that Mr. Perkins says that your husband enlisted in the 15th Kentucky Cavalry, in Company D, of that regiment, which was commanded by George Sellars. I am sure Mr. Perkins is right as to that statement, but am of the opinion that your husband had been in the service before that, because I find in the records, and also in Gen'l. Johnston's book entitled "Partisan Rangers", the name of James Dyer, who enlisted August 15th, 1862, in Company D, of the 10th Kentucky - Johnson's Cavalary- which Company was commanded by Capt. T. M. Hammock, and I have thought it possible that you might be able to find some member of that company in Union County still living and who could give you definite information relative to your husband's service in addition to what Mr. Perkins has stated in his letter.

You requested me in your letter to return your application and all the papers with it to you in the event what you had already furnished did not bring you within the law. After making the best possible investigation in my power it occurred to me that it might be an advantage to you to give you what information I had obtained and make any suggestions I could. There is no roll of Captain George Sellar's Company, either in the war records or in Johnson's "Partisan Rangers". The name of Ben F. Perkins is shown as a Lieutenant in Captain Sellar's Company, but there is no list of the private soldiers of that Company. Consequently you would have to depend entirely on the evidence of men who served with your husband and know the facts

in the case as to his service and themselves made honorable records. The war records show nothing of him except as stated above, which is that he enlisted August 15th, 1862, in Company D/ 10th Kentucky Cavalry. If you can find no other evidence, it would be better to leave your application on file here, as a copy of it is on file in the County Court in Union County, but all the letters and other papers that have been filed could be returned to you.

Your favor of the 24th received. and I have been looking over the application of Mrs. J. H. Dyer for pension, the greater part of the day. A great deal depends upon the evidence of B. F. Perkins, in my letter of March 24, 1924. that a statement from the War Department which said, that there was no record of service performed by B. F. Perkins after Sept. 10. 1863. but, I notice in affidavit of said Perkins that he was ordered to report to Col Sipert about this time, which was probably the cause of the War Department not keeping up with his record. and, I have no right nor inclinations to doubt his statements in regard to James H. Dyers' record as a soldier in the Confederate Army.

You will please let me know whether or not said B. F. Perkins is still living, if so have him write me.

and at that time and on account of his physical condition caused by the wounds so recieved he was allowed to stay in private homes. At the time I left him I feel that he was unable on account of wounds recieved that he was unable to perform further military service.

I returned to Union County in May, 1865 and shortly after my return I saw J.H.Dyer whose physical condition had improved but very little.

I know that he did military service in the confederate army from the time he entered the service until very close to the end of the war.

I further state that I am not related to the said J.H.Dyer nor the applicant nor am interested neither directly nor indirectly.

Dear Sir:-

About the 24th. of November, 1923, I wrote you with reference to the application filed with you of Mrs. J.H.Dyer, widow of J.H.Dyer, and on the 26th of November, 1923 you very courteously answered my letter on this subject, and then some time in January I called in at your office and took this up personally with you and you stated that you would write to the War Department at Frankfort to see what you could find out about J.H.Dyer as a soldier, and shortly after this you sent me a reply.

I now inclose you the affidavit of B.F.Perkins who was a soldier with J.H. Dyer during the war and it will show to you conclusively that he was a soldier.

This affidavit clearly indicates that J.H.Dyer served as a soldier from the date of his enlistment until very near the close of the war.

Now I call your attention to the fact that if he did not serve until the close of the war that he was prevented from serving to the close of the war on account of wounds received.

I call your attention to the Act of the General Assembly to that part whereit says provided:-

"That any officer or private soldier who was prevented from so serving until the close of the war, or until he was honorably discharged by reason of wounds or disease contracted in line of duty, which rendered him unable to perform further military ~~duty~~ service shall be entitled to the benefacts as though he had served until the close of the war or until honorably discharged".

It does seem to me that this affidavit establishes beyond a doubt that J.H.Dyer was a soldier and that he served as such from the time of his enlistment up to or close to the end of the war and that on account of the wound received he was unable to perform further military service.

I trust that you will give this matter your earnest consideration and let me hear from you at your earliest convenience.

My dear Sir:-

Your favor of the 10th, received. The cause of delay in answering your letter is that I was awaiting a reply from the War Dept., Washington D. C. in regard if the record of B. F. Perkins, the witness in the application of Mrs. J. H. Dyer. I am sorry to say, his affidavit does not strengthen her application for pension, as I have the record of B.F. Perkins from the War Dept., which states there is no record shown of any service every performed by B. F. Perkins after Sept., 10th, 1863 and no record of his capture or parole, or as to when or how he got out of the army. I have before me the record from the War Dept., which states that the name of J.H. Dyer is not found on any rolls of the 13th, Ky. organization C.S.A. or no record of capture parole of said J.H.Dyer. The proof necessary in this case is to show when and how J.H.Dyer also B.F.Perkins, the chief witness in the case got out of the Confederate Army.


The Pension Law provides that a soldier shall have served from the date of his enlistment to the close of the War, unless he was sooner honorable discharged. The Statutes creating this Dept.,

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prescribes the conditions upon which pensions shall be granted as well as rejected. In Mrs. Dyer's case the proof is not sufficient to bring her within the provisions of the Pension law, therefore I am compelled to reject this claim, regardless of any personal feeling I might have in the matter.
