Soldier's Application for Pension

I, Charles Jefferson Lovell

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Burr in the County of Rockcastle

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Virginia, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Marshall's Brigade, 64th Reg. Va. Vol. Inf. Co. 6

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer Scott County Virginia, Dec. 16th 1844.

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you served?

Answer March 1863, Gen. Marshall's Command, 10th Camp, Slump.

Capt. William F. Allen.

How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer Captured at Cumberland Gap, 1863, taken to Camp Douglas prison, was released at close of the war, in June 1865.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer Yes, Camp Douglas, Ill., released June 1865.

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer Yes, when released from prison.

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer Yes.

If so, when and under what circumstances?

Answer June 1865, when released from prison at Camp Douglas.

In what business are you now engaged, if any, and what do you earn?

Answer *Manual labor when able about five dollars per month*

What estate have you in your own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer *None*

What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer *A life estate in about 27 acres of land worth about \$200.00, and no personalty except household effects worth \$75.00*

State the net income of yourself and your wife from all sources for the past year. This must include all money received either from wages, rents or interest on loaned money, if any.

Answer *None*

Do you use intoxicants to any extent?

Answer *I do not*

How long and since when have you been an actual resident of the State of Kentucky?

Answer *Fifteen years since Oct. 1896*

Have you an attorney to look after this application?

Answer *Yes*

If so, give his name and address?

Answer *J. W. Brown Mt Vernon, Ky.*

Chronic indigestion, and malnutrition; blind in right eye, with cataract on left eye; right wrist broken; and Paralytic Nephritis, with infirmities incident to old age.

And they further make oath to the following facts touching the applicant's service in the Confederate army.

State here what witnesses know of their own knowledge.

State that each of them were privates in Co. B. 64th Reg. Va. Vol. Inf. and that Charles Jefferson Lovell was a private in the same company and Reg. that they were all captured at Cumberland Gap in 1863 and taken to Camp Douglas, Ill. where they were kept with the said Lovell as prisoners of war till 1865, that said Lovell was not released from prison till some months after they were released. That they are well acquainted with him and know he is the identical person he refers to himself to be that he is now and has been for more than 40 years a resident of this county.

The material facts to be proven in the pension claim, under the laws of the State of Kentucky, are as follows:

1. Service in army.
2. Present Disability.
3. Indigency.
4. How you got out of the Army.
5. Character as a Soldier and Citizen.
6. Applications will not be filed unless certificates of Doctor and County Judge are filled out.

1. May be proven by officers or comrades.
2. May be proven by physician's certificate.
3. May be proven by neighbors and by certificate of County Judge.
4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.






