5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States? .. In Appomattox county, Va., in 1861, in Company "H" Second Virginia Cavalry. Do not know this personally--only what he told me.
6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? .. Four years he said.
7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender? .. Appomattox Court House April 9, 1865, is what he told me.
8. Was your husband present at the time and place when his Company and Regiment surrendered? .. Yes.
9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority? ..
10. When and where did your husband die? .. At Elkton, Todd county, Ky. February 11, 1895.
11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? .. Yes.
12. Have you married since the death of your soldier husband? .. No.
13. What property, real or personal, or income do you have or possess, and its gross value? .. Do not own any real estate; only a little household and kitchen furniture worth about \$100.

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.

Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.

Be it remembered that upon the hearing of the above matter in the Todd County Court, at its June Term, on the 10th. day of June, 1912, the following evidence was heard:

The applicant, Mrs. Mary Elizabeth McCormack, was called and testified as follows:

Q. Your name is Mrs. Mary Elizabeth McCormack?

A. Yes sir.

Q. You are the widow of J. D. McCormack, deceased, and are an application for widow's pension under the recent act of the Legislature?

A. Yes sir.

Q. Mrs. McCormack when were you and Mr. McCormack married?

A. in 1867.

Q. Did you reside in this state at that time?

A. Yes sir.

Q. And you were married in this state?

A. Yes sir, in a mile of Elkton.

Q. You reside in this County now, do you?

A. Yes sir.

Q. Did you and Mr. McCormack reside in this County prior to his death?

A. Yes sir.

Q. How long had you resided in this County prior to his death?

A. All of my married life.

Q. Since '67?

A. Yes sir.

Q. When did Mr. McCormack die?

A. In 1894 or 1895.

Q. How ~~was~~ old are you now, Mrs. McCormack?

A. I was born in 1844.

Q. Are you able to earn a support by manual labor?

A. I don't think I am.

Q. Have you any special knowledge, or art or skill, or profession, by which you could earn a support?

A. Nothing on earth but keeping boarders.

Q. Have you any income, Mrs. McCormack?

A. Not a dollar.

Q. Or any property?

A. No sir.

Q. You have no contract or agreement with any one you could enforce, by which they are to support?

A. None.

Q. Do you receive any pension of any kind from the U. S. government or from any state or foreign government?

A. Not a thing, no sir.

J. F. Bell, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

Q. You name Mr. J. F. Bell?

A. Yes sir.

Q. Where do you live?

A. In Elkton, Todd County.

Q. How long have you lived in Todd County?

A. All of my life.

Q. Do you know Mrs. McCormack, the applicant for pension?

A. Yes sir.

Q. How long have you known her?

A. Ever since I was a boy

Q. Since you first knew her, where has she resided?

A. Here in the County.

Q. At all times?

A. At all times according to my knowledge.

Q. Did you know her husband, J. D. McCormack?

A. Yes sir.

Q. Was he said to have been a confederate soldier?

A. Yes, said to be; of course I don't know about that; he passed as such all the time.

Q. Was he residing in this County at the time of his death?

A. Yes sir, he died here in Elkton.

Q. How long since his death?

A. I think it 1894 or 1895.

Q. Mr. and Mrs. McCormack were living here as man and wife at the time of his death?

A. Yes sir.

Q. Is Mrs. McCormack at her present age and condition of health able to earn a support by manual labor?

A. I hardly think she can; she is a good worker, good hustler, but she is getting to the age where she can't.

Q. Has she any special art, or skill or profession by which she could earn an income?

A. None that I know of.

Q. Does she receive a pension from any source now?

A. None that I know of.

Q. Has she ever lived out of this County recently for as much as a year at a time?

A. No, sir.

Q. Has he any income?

A. No, sir.

Q. Or any property?

A. No, sir.

Q. Has she any contract with anyone by which she could force or require them to support her?

A. None in the world.

Q. In your judgment is she able by reason of her ability to labor or from any other source, to receive an income of as much as \$300.00 a year net?

A. No, I think not.

R. B. Kendall, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

Q. Your name is R. B. Kendall?

A. Yes sir.

Q. You reside in Elkton, Todd County, Ky.?

A. Yes sir.

Q. And have so resided for 25 years or more?

A. Yes sir.

Q. Do you know the applicant, Mrs. Mary Elizabeth McCormack, the widow of J. D. McCormack, deceased?

A. Yes sir.

Q. Was he reported to have been a soldier in the confederate army?

A. Yes sir; he told me on several occasions about being in the army.

Q. Do you know about how long they had been married?

A. No, I don't know when they were married.

Q. Were they married prior to 1890?

A. Yes sir, I think they married directly after the war.

Q. Were they living together as man and wife at the time of his death?

A. Yes sir.

Q. How long has Mr. McCormack been dead?

A. Ten or twelve years at least.

Q. Was he living in this County at the time of his death?

A. Yes sir.

Q. How long had he been living in this County prior to his death?

A. I think he had been living here for forty or fifty years, ever since the war.

Q. Is Mrs. McCormack able to earn a living by manual labor?

A. No.

Q. Has she any special education, or skill or profession by which she can earn a living?

A. No.

Q. Has she any property?

A. None that I know of.

Q. Has she any income whatever?

A. None I know of.

Q. Does she receive a pension from any source?

A. Not that I know of.

Q. Has she a contract with any person able to furnish her with a support, for a support?

Dear Sir:-

I am in receipt of yours of the 11th inst. enclosing a letter from Mrs. Mary E. McCormick addressed to you, from which I see that she says she has never received a Voucher to be filled out and returned to this office by authority of which a pension could be paid.

Our records show that a Voucher was mailed to her, at Elkton, Ky., the address given in her application, on the 17th of October last, with the request to the post-master at Elkton that it be returned to this office at the end of 5 days if not delivered. That Voucher has never been returned to this office; it may have been lost in the mail, and may be still in the office at Elkton, or may have been taken out of the office and not forwarded to the present address of Mrs. McCormick, which address is not given either in her letter or yours.

If you will give me Mrs. McCormick's present address I will mail her a duplicate Voucher, and you must in the meantime re-mail to her her Certificate, because she must fill out the Voucher herself and she must have the Certificate and exhibit it

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to the officer who swears her to the statements she shall make in the Voucher. You cannot fill out the Voucher for her in her absence, and there is nothing in the law authorizing me to mail the Voucher to you or to anyone except herself, and you could not fill it out anyhow because the law requires that the pensioner shall exhibit the Certificate at the time of filling out the Voucher as stated above.

A voucher for the amount due her to November 1st, 1913, was mailed to the address given in her application. Mr. Brewer later wrote me that that Voucher had been received at the Elkton post-office and asked authority from me to fill it out himself. I informed him that he could not do that, that the voucher and Certificate must be forward to Mrs. McCormick for her to fill out and return to this office. That Voucher has never reached this office. A voucher was mailed to her present address as given in your letter on the 17th day of this month. Your letter of Jan. 21st in regard to Mrs. Mary E. McCormick's pension received. The voucher for November, December and January--\$30.00 was received also her certificate has been received, but the voucher from June, 1912 to November, 1913 has never been received.

I note what you say that Mr. C. P. Brewer of Elkton requested permission to fill out this voucher. Now, it may be possible, Mr. Stone, that he somehow got that voucher out of the Post Office at Elkton or requested them to hold it there, for they have Mrs. McCormick's forwarding address at Elkton. Mr. Brewer looked up the data for Mrs. McCormick to show her husband's company and regiment, etc., and he has been writing to her right along telling her how much money other people were giving him for getting pensions and sort of playing on her sympathies so as to get a big commission. Now, the woman needs all the money she can get and no one should get a commission any more than the law allows and I am informed that the law allows \$5.00 or \$10.00.

She would like very much to receive this voucher from June 1912 to November 1913. She has never received it. Could you not send her a duplicate voucher, and she could have it filled out here? You can enter her address as Mrs. Mary E.
