1. What is your name and what is your postoffice address? J. W. Travis and E. N. Huffines of Franklin, Ky.
2. Are you acquainted with the applicant, Mrs. Jennett - Yes
If so, how long have you known her? 20 years or more
3. Where does she reside, and how long and since when has she been a resident of this State? Simpson Co., Ky. ever since I have known her.
4. Were you ever acquainted with her husband? Yes
5. Were either or both of you present at the marriage? Neither
6. How long did you know him? Since 1860 - Huffines states for about 12 years before the death
7. When and where did J. D. Jennett enlist in the war between the States, and in what Company and Regiment did he enlist, and how do you know this? Can not state when - Co. 9 - 6th Ky. Infantry - I served with him.
8. Were you a member of the same Company and Regiment at the close of the war? Yes but was absent on sick leave.

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.
Widow must have married prior to 1890.
To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.
Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.
Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.





The certificate of marriage of Dave Jennett and Luraney Jennett was burned with the records of this county at the burning of the Court house about 1882. I know them to have been husband and wife and know that she was living with him at the time of his death. I know that they were married before Jan. 1, 1890. n Mrs. Luraney Jennett, applicant herein for Confederate pension, is now unable to earn her support by manual labor either in whole or in part and is wholly dependent upon friends and relatives.

2 I, E. S. Bradshaw, Judge of the Simpson County Court, do certify
3 that the application of Mrs. Luraney Jennett for a widows pension
4 was filed July, 15, 1912 and that at the July term of the County
5 Court the same was laid over to the regular August term at which
6 term it came on for trial when Charley Halcomb appeared as a witness
7 and being duly sworn stated:

8 That he is about 40 years old and is a resident of Simpson County
9 and that he has known Mrs. Jennett and her husband, Dave Jennett,
10 for about 20 years during which time they were residents of Simpson
11 County. That Mrs. Jennett is the widow of Dave Jennett who died
12 about 5 or 6 years ago in this County; That Mrs. Jennett owns no
13 property of consequence and has no income and is unable to make
14 a living in whole or part either by mental or physical labor. That
15 she has no contract for her support, gets no pension from any source.
16 That she and Dave Jennett have been living together as husband and
17 wife ever since he knew them and were so living at the time of his

23 applicant and Dave Jennett. That Mrs. Jennett is about 63 years old
24 that she is the widow of Dave Jennett; that she is and has been con-
25 tinuously a resident of this state for many years and that he late
26 husband was also; That Dave Jennett died in this county about 8 years
27 ago; That Mrs. Jennett has some land worth about \$100. but that she
28 has no income and is unable to earn a living by her manual labor and
29 nor by reason of her knowledge or skill in any profession, art or ~~ex~~
30 craft, and is moreover mentally deficient; that she has no contract
