Mrs. Elizabeth Taylor of said State and County, desiring to avail herself of the pension allowed to Indigent Widows of Soldiers, General Assembly, approved March 11, 1912, hereby submits her proofs, and after being duly sworn true answers to make to the following questions, deposes and answers as follows:

This application was filed this 16th day of May 1912, for John A. Brown & Co.

1. What is your full name and where do you reside? (Give State, County and Postoffice.) Elizabeth Taylor, resides at Piqua, in Robertson County, Kentucky.

2. How long and since when have you been a resident of this State? Have been a resident of this State all my life.

3. When and where were you born and what was your maiden name? Was born May 29, 1849, in Robertson County, Kentucky, and maiden name was Elizabeth Corbey.

4. When and where was your husband born—state his full name, and where were you and he married, and who performed the marriage ceremony. (If possible, attach certified copy marriage license in every case.) Husband was born in Robertson County, Ky., Feb. 18, 1835—Name Newton Taylor—married at Piqua, Robertson County, Ky., and Thomas S. Rigg performed the ceremony.

5. When and where and in what Company and Regiment did your husband enlist or serve during the war between the States? Enlisted in Summer of 1861, at Kenton, Robertson County, Kentucky, Company A, 4th Ky. vol. mounted Riflemen.

6. How long did your husband serve in said Company and Regiment? One year, and was then mustered out, and enlisted then in 2nd vol. Ky. Inf.

7. When and where did your husband's Company and Regiment surrender?

8. Was your husband present at the time and place when his Company and Regiment surrendered? Yes.

9. If not with his command at surrender, state clearly and specifically where he was, when he left command, for what cause and by what authority?

10. When and where did your husband die? He died Feb. 17, 1897.

11. At the time of your husband's death, were you living with him as his lawful wife? Yes.

12. Have you married since the death of your soldier husband? No.

13. What property, real or personal, or income do you have or possess, and its gross value? Have 3.5 acres of land, one house, one cow, and some household and kitchen furniture—only income have is what I raise and produce on the 3.5 acres of land, amount of income about \$150.00; and value of land and about cow about \$1250.00.

14. Have you a family? If so, who compose such family? Have only one daughter who is single and living with me at home, and we are the only members of the family now.

15. Name some friend, giving his name and postoffice address, who will be willing to have us write to him about your case if necessary. J. P. Corbey, Piqua, Robertson County, Ky.

1. What is your name and what is your postoffice address? *Oscar P. Overby, Piquette, Robertson County, Ky.*

2. Are you acquainted with the applicant, Mrs. *Elizabeth Taylor*
If so, how long have you known her? *Yes - Have known her all of her life.*

3. Where does she reside, and how long and since when has she been a resident of this State? *Resides at Piquette, Ky., and has been a resident of this State all her life.*

4. Were you ever acquainted with her husband? *Yes.*

5. Were either or both of you present at the marriage? *Yes.*

6. How long did you know him? *50 years - Went to school with him.*

7. When and where did *Norton Taylor* enlist in the war between the States, and in what Company and Regiment did he enlist, and how do you know this? *Enlisted during the Summer of 1861 at Robertson, Ky. in Co. A, 4th Ky. vol. Mounted Riflemen - Was present when he enlisted.*

8. Were you a member of the same Company and Regiment at the close of the war? *No - He was mustered out Sept. 1, 1865, and re-enlisted in the 2nd Ky. vol. Inf.*

9. How long did he perform regular military duty? *4 years.*

10. When and where was his Company and Regiment surrendered? *In the Spring of 1865 with General Johnson's Command.*

11. Were you with the command when it surrendered? *No.*

12. Was, the husband of applicant, present?

13. If not present, where was he?

14. When and where did he leave his command?

For what cause?

By whose authority did he leave?

How do you know all this? (State fully and clearly.) *I enlisted in the same Company and was with him until he was mustered out, and re-enlisted in another Command.*

15. When and where did *Norton Taylor* die? *Feb. 17, 1897, at his home at Piquette, Robertson County, Ky.*

16. Where did he reside at his death, and how long had he been a resident of Kentucky at his death? *At Piquette, Robertson County, Ky. - Had been a resident of Ky. all his life.*

17. Do you know of your own knowledge that applicant is the lawful widow of *Norton Taylor* - *Yes.*

18. Has she remained unmarried since her soldier husband's death, and is she now his widow? *yes - she is now his widow.*

19. What property, effects or income has the applicant, if any, and how do you know this of your own knowledge? *She has 3.5 acres of land, 1 horse and 1 cow. I know it because I am her neighbor and am acquainted with her property holdings.*

Has applicant conveyed any property, in the last two years or given any away, if so, what was it, and to whom? *None.*

- Note—1. Before any questions are answered, the Clerk or Notary shall swear applicant and the witnesses in the following words: "You do solemnly swear that you will true answers make to each of the questions asked of you, and the evidence you shall give will be the whole truth; so help you God."
- 2. Additional affidavits may be attached, if blank spaces are insufficient.
- 3. All affidavits must be made before an officer using a seal.
- 4. Only widows who were the wives of soldiers need apply—and are now widows. Those married since Jan. 1st, 1890, not entitled.
- 5. Two witnesses are necessary to make out claims.
- 6. Attach certified copy marriage license in every case, or certificate of County Court Clerk, under seal, that license is filed in his office duly certified by officiating minister, or the affidavit of the officiating minister, or the affidavit of a witness of the ceremony, or the affidavit of two witnesses who knew them as man and wife, prior to January 1, 1890, and knew that they were living together on the date of his death.

NOTICE TO APPLICANTS.

The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of *soldiers only*, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent.

Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.

Dear Madam:-

I am in receipt of yours of the 26th.

When you filed your application for pension you had one witness testify as to your husband's military service, and he testified to one year's service.

On inquiry to the War Department for any record that might be on file there of your husband's enlistment or service in the Confederate army I was informed that there was no record of his enlistment or service in the Confederate army as a member of Company A, 4th Kentucky Cavalry. This proof did not bring you within the provisions of the pension law as to the service.

The report of the County Judge shows that you own property worth \$2,000.00, but later a statement was filed here unsigned which said that you own 100 acres of land worth \$50 an acre. Information as to the lack of proof of your husband's military record was mailed to you as soon as the application had been examined.

The proof in every case must show when the soldier enlisted, how long he served, and that he got out of the army honorably, that is, served till the close of the war or until he was honorably discharged, and in cases like yours, where there is no record of the soldier's service, the proof must be made by two or more persons who served with him and know the facts and themselves made honorable records.

Dear Sir:-

Using the information which you gave me in your letter relative to the application of Mrs. Elizabeth Taylor, I made an inquiry of the War Department with a request for a further search of the records relative to the military service of Newton Taylor, and the Department was able with that information to find a record of him that will bring the applicant within the provisions of the pension law, as to his military record.

As I wrote Mrs. Taylor on the 29th day of April last, the report made by the County Judge when her application was before him showed that she owned \$2,000.00 worth of property, but later a statement was filed with these papers which said that she owned 100 acres of land worth \$50 an acre which, if true, would render it impossible for her to be granted a pension under the law, and before favorably action can be taken on this application it will be necessary for conclusive proof to be produced that this information as to her being worth \$5,000.00 in property is not correct.

The affiant, Elizabeth Tayler, states that she is the widow of Newton Tayler, deceased, late a member of Company "F," 2nd Ky. Infantry, C.S.A., now pending before the Honorable Commissioner of Pensions in the Confederate Pension Department of the State of Kentucky.

That at the time of the death of her said husband she was the owner of a small farm situated in Robertson County, Kentucky, consisting of 30 (Thirty) acres of land, upon which were a good residence and necessary outbuildings, all of which she had inherited from her father. Said decedent left some cattle, horses, farming implements, crops and household furnishings, all of which was set apart to her as his widow under the Kentucky statute of descent and distribution. He owned no other property.

That a short time after the death of her said husband, being too old and infirm to successfully undertake the management of said farm, she sold the same together with all her crops (at that time in the barn) cattle, horses, farm implements and all her household furniture excepting such as she needed for her own individual use, at private sale, for the sum of \$2,300.00 (Two Thousand Three Hundred Dollars).


That out of said sum she paid off all the indebtedness of her deceased husband consisting of some three or four years back taxes, store bills, doctor's bills &c., and his burial expenses, amounting in the aggregate to about \$500.00 (Five Hundred Dollars). With the residue of said purchase money she bought and now owns a small cottage in the city of Paris, Ky paying \$1,100.00 (Eleven Hundred Dollars) therefor; also she built and now owns a little cottage in Brooksville, Ky., for which she paid about \$700. (Seven Hundred Dollars) and which she now occupies as a residence. She says that the cottage in Paris is now rented at Ten Dollars per month, and that after the payment of taxes, insurance and repairs, the residue of said rent is all the income she has to maintain herself with. She says that she has or owns no other property or income other than that hereinbefore set out, nor did she, at any time, own any other property.

The affiant, Estill Curtis, states that he is 44 years of age, and is a merchant residing in Brooksville, Bracken County, Kentucky; that he is well acquainted with the applicant, Elizabeth Tayler, and has known her all his life; that previous to moving to Brooksville he lived in Robertson County, Kentucky, not over a mile from where said applicant lived, and had lived there all his life.

He says that he was well acquainted with the farm owned and occupied by Mrs. Tayler in Robertson County at the time of the death of her husband Newton Tayler, and that the same consisted of about thirty acres of land; that he knows from having been told by both parties to the transaction that she sold said farm and all her personal property, except, perhaps, some household furnishings which she retained for her own personal use, for the sum of \$2300.00 (Twenty-three Hundred Dollars); that she invested that money in a house in Paris, Ky., and one in Brooksville, Ky., that he has seen both houses, and that in his judgment the one in Paris is worth about \$1000.00 (One Thousand Dollars), and the one in Brooksville is worth about \$500.00 (Five Hundred Dollars). That the applicant, Elizabeth Tayler, owns no other property than these two houses, and never since he has known her owned any greater number of acres of land than the thirty acres above mentioned.



The affiant, Marion Pfanstiel, states that he is 47 years of age, a Minister of the Church of Christ, and a resident of Brooksville, Bracken County, Kentucky. That he is well acquainted with Mrs. Elizabeth Taylor, the applicant herein, and has known her for the eight years last past. That he has for all that time been the pastor of the Church to which Mrs. Taylor belongs, and has frequently visited her old home in Robertson County before she moved to Brooksville. That he knows the farm owned by her at the time of the death of her husband, Newton Taylor, and knows its boundaries and its value. That said farm contained about thirty acres and was worth about Two Thousand Dollars. That he knows the house she built in Brooksville, and that in his judgment it is worth about Five Hundred Dollars. That he is well acquainted with the value of real property in Brooksville, and is confident that she could not sell said house for more than that amount.
