Soldier's Application for Pension

I, John M. Green

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Emmence in the County of Henry

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Tennessee, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Company D. (Capt. Edward Gammon) 1st Tennessee

Cavalry (Col. Carter), Vaughan's Brigade

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the

benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,

and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-

ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer State of Tennessee, City of Jonesboro, Washington County
in the year 1834

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you

served?

Answer Sept. 3d 1863, Col. Carter, 1st Tennessee Cavalry, Capt. Gam-
mon, Company D.

How did you get out of the army, when and where? After being wounded at Morristown I
could not do full duty, my service was irregular, was with Capt. Blackburn

Answer of Co. D, same regiment (1st Tenn. Cavl), & he surrendered
me at Atlanta in 1865.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer I cannot recollect. If so it was at Atlanta, Ga. Spring of 1865.

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Green enlisted September 3, 1863, as 1st sergeant, Captain Edward Gammon's Company, subsequently known as Company M, 1st (Carter's) Tennessee Cavalry, Confederate States Army. On the roll of the company dated March 24, 1864, only roll on file, he was reported present. His name appears on a return for October, 1864, which shows him "absent sick." No later record of him has been found.

I became acquainted with
John Green at or near the close of the war,
Capt R. F. Fulkerson of Co. F, 1st Tenn Cav
Capt W. A. Blackburn of the same Regiment
John Green, myself, and others, surrendered
at Charlotte N. C. when Gen Joseph E. Johnson
surrendered, but did not take time to get
our payrolls, but went to Atlanta Ga
at that point Capt Fulkerson & Blackburn
obtained payrolls for each of us, and
then Blackburn Fulkerson & myself
started west, and I never saw Green
afterwards, nor did I know him till
a short time before the close of the war
Capt Fulkerson was my brother and
Capt Blackburn married a cousin
and I know that both are dead and
all of the crowd that crowd who got payrolls
at Atlanta are dead except Green, J. H. Bussell
and myself

J. H. Bussells was living at Lovelady Texas
a few years ago.

I can readily see why Green thinks
he surrendered at Atlanta, and he may
be right so far as the records show.

Having served the most of my time in
the infantry is perhaps the reason that I
did not know Mr Green.


Referring to your letter of yesterday, received today, with which you inclose one from Hon. W. P. Thorne, of Eminence, Kentucky, requesting the military record of one John Greene who is said to have enlisted in the Confederate States Army at Knoxville, Tennessee, and to have served in Captain Blackburn's Company, Colonel Carter's Regiment, Vaughan's Brigade, Tennessee, and referring also to your request that the information be furnished to you, I have the honor to inform you as follows:

The records show that one John W. Green, first sergeant, Company M (Captain Edward Gammon) 1st (Carter's) Tennessee Cavalry, Confederate States Army, enlisted September 3, 1863, at Jonesboro, Tennessee. The company muster roll dated March 24, 1864, (only roll on file) shows him present, and a return for October, 1864, shows him absent sick November 10, ----. No later record of him has been found.

It is proper to add that the only Captain Blackburn in Carter's (1st) Tennessee Cavalry, Confederate States Army, was captain of Company L, and the name John Greene does not appear on the records of that company.
