# Soldier's Application for Pension

I, Wm. H. Talbott

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Winchester in the County of Clark  
in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between  
the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of  
Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear  
that I was a member of Company D 3rd. Battalion, Kentucky Cavalry

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the  
benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,  
and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family.

I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

In what County, State and year were you born?

Answer In Bourbon County, Kentucky, 1848, August, 14th.

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom you  
served.

Answer In September, 1862, I enlisted in Capt. Fowle's Company from Bourbon  
County and in December 1862 or January 1863, a reorganization of the 12 months  
soldiers and new recruits was had and the 3rd Ky. Battalion was formed and  
I was elected 1st. Lieutenant of Co. D - Col. E. F. Gray - Major John B. Holliday - Capt. J. D. Bedford -  
How did you get out of the army, when and where?

Answer Paroled - April 30th. 1865 at Mt. Sterling, Ky.

Were you ever in prison? If so, state what prison and when released.

Answer Never was in prison

Were you paroled? If so, when and where?

Answer Yes April 30 - 1865 at Mt. Sterling, Ky.

Did you take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government?

Answer Yes, as stated in said parole.

If so, when and under what circumstances?

In what business are you now engaged, if any, and what do you earn?

Answer I am not in any business and earn nothing.

What estate have you in your own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer I own 2 small houses and one vacant lot, the cash value of the same is \$1900.00 to 2000.00. No personal property above exempted.

What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its actual cash value?

Answer My wife owns the home in which we live, valued at from \$2740.00 to \$3000.00. Sometimes she rents rooms and receives about \$40.00 per year income.

State the net income of yourself and your wife from all sources for the past year. This must include all money received either from wages, rents or interest on loaned money, if any.

Answer \$242.00, taxes have to be paid out of this.

Do you use intoxicants to any extent?

Answer No.

How long and since when have you been an actual resident of the State of Kentucky?

Answer Since my birth.

Have you an attorney to look after this application?

Answer Yes.

WILLIAM H. TALBOTT

Enlisted Sept. 4, 1862, in Co. D, 3rd Bat. Ky. Mtd. Rifles, and there is record proof of service to December 31, 1862. Comrades testify that he served till the close of the war and was surrendered and paroled at Mt. Sterling, Ky. about May 1, 1865, and by copy of parole filed with application.

His application was filed October 24, 1916, but could not be allowed, for the reason that the proof showed that he owned too much property to come within the provisions of the law. Since that date his wife has died and he has been compelled to dispose of the greater part of the property and affidavits dated June 14th, 1919, and received here June 16th, 1919, shows that he owns less than \$2500.00 worth of property, and a pension is allowed from the date of the reception of the affidavits.

Application for Pension.

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The application for a pension herein, having been filed before the August Term of the Clark County Court and laid over until the September Term of said Court, was on this the twenty-fifth day of September, 1916, it being the first day of the regular September Term of said Court, heard by the Judge thereof, and said Judge having heard the testimony of the following witnesses in open Court, as to applicant's citizenship, residence and means of support, said witnesses testifying, as follows, in substance, to-wit:

Capt. George W. Strother- Testified that applicant was not physically able to earn a support, that applicant's property was worth about \$1900.00 and that his income from the same was about \$150.00, net. That the home owned by Mrs. Pattie D. Talbott, was worth about \$2640.00.

Mr. T.G. Bradley testified in substance the same as the above witness.

Dr. I.H. Browne, testified that applicant was not able to earn his support from manual labor.

The Post Office address of these witnesses is Winchester, Kentucky.

From the evidence so introduced the Court is of the opinion, and so orders and adjudges, that applicant is not entitled to a pension under the act of the Legislature approved March, 11th, 1912, for the sole reason that it appears from the testimony of the witnesses that Mrs. Pattie D. Talbott wife of the applicant has property of greater value than \$2500.00, in all other respects the Court approves the application and deems the proof sufficient

to entitle applicant to a pension under said act. The Court further adjudges that the residence owned by Mrs. Pattie D. Talbott is occupied by applicant and his said wife as a homestead.

The County Attorney was present at the examination of the witnesses.

I am in receipt of yours of the 16th inst., and note carefully what you say.

Your application has not been reached in regular fax order for examination, but since the receipt of your letter I have gone carefully through it and the proof filed with it, and find that you furnish no proof of any kind of your service in the army, except two witnesses say that to the best of their knowledge and belief the statements made by you are true.

I find further that the proof shows that you own \$4,540 (that is, you and your wife together), which renders it impossible for you to be pensioned under the law.


Your letter of Novemcbr, 17th, addressed to W.H. Talbott, Winchester, Ky., has been referred to me for answer.

As to the proof of service in the army, Mr. Talbott can furnish satisfactory proof and will do so if you will indicate, in your next letter the character of proof you desire. I might add that he collected for a horse, side arms and baggage from the Federal Government for a horse &c., taken from him, after and in violation of the terms of surrender at Appamattox.

The question as to the amount of property owned by Mr. Talbott and the income from the same, is under the proof, not too much to bring him without the provisions of the act. The property owned by Mrs. Talbott is used by them as a homestead and brings in very little revenue when rented to roomers, and as a rule is a drain on the resources of Mr. Talbott to keep up repairs and pay taxes.

I have understood that there has been a finding of this department that where the hoestead was owned by the wife, and so used and that the husband did not have enough property or income to take him without the provisions of the act and when it was apparent that applicant was needy and otherwise entitled to a pension that the same would be granted. That is the theory upon which I am proceeding in this case. Let me hear from you further as to the above suggestion and advise me what proof you think necessary as to service.

Dear Sir:-

I am in receipt of yours of the 20th, and note carefully what you say.

As I wrote Mr. Talbott, the proof shows that he and his wife together own \$4,540.00 worth of property, and under the law a pension could not be allowed him without a violation of the law, as the law provides specially that a person who owns \$2500.00 worth of property cannot be allowed a pension, or if he is living with his wife who possesses property, in fee simple, or life-interest of the sum of \$2500.00, he cannot be allowed a pension. And Mr. Talbott states himself that he owns property of the value of \$2,000.00, and his wife owns property to the value of \$3,800.00, which makes \$5,800.00. And the County Judge certifies that they are assessed with \$3805.00 worth of property, and the County Judge in his "Findings" says that he finds that they own more than \$2500.00 worth of property, but in all other respects he would recommend the allowance of a pension, a most peculiar sort of "Finding" for a Court to make. No such ruling as you refer to in the last paragraph of your letter has ever been made in connection with the Confederate pension law, and could not be made because it



Dear Sir:-

I am in receipt of yours of the 21st enclosing affidavits to be filed with the application of W. H. Talbott.

I note that these affidavits state that Mr. Talbott has a net income of \$160.00, when the law provides that a person who has an income of \$300.00 shall not be allowed a pension. Note that the law does not say "net" income, but "income".

I deem it necessary, as the case of W. H. Talbott was disallowed because ~~his~~ of the amount of property which he owned, that now his property is valued at less than \$2500.00, that the proof should show what his income is, and it also should show the value of his life estate in the property left by his wife when she died, which must be added to the \$2,000.00 which these affidavits state that he owns in fee simple.





Dear Sir:-

I am in receipt of yours of the 16th relative to the application of W. H. Talbott. When he filed his application for pension the proof filed with it showed that he and his wife together owned property worth \$5,800.00, and ofcourse a pension could not be allowed. Proof filed later shows that his wife has died and that he owns \$2,000.00 himself and a life estate in \$3800.00 worth of property that belonged to his wife during her lifetime, which would still leave him in the position of owning in fee simple \$2,000.00 worth of property and occupying and having the use of \$3800.00 worth of property besides, which would still make it impossible for him to be granted a pension under the law.

I note that you say in your letter that he has a net income of about \$16 0.00. You will note that the law does not say "net income", but says "income".

When Mr. Talbott filed his application for pension he filed no proof as to his military record, and on inquiry to the War Department for any record of him that might be on file there I was informed that the record shows that he enlisted Sept. 4, 1862, in Company D, 3rd Bat. Ky. Mtd. Rifles, and that the record showed his service to December 31, 1862, and that no later record of him had been found, and ofcourse if he did not have too much property proof to complete his military record would have to be produced.

Dear Sir:-

I am in receipt of yours of the 20th, and note carefully what you say, and you say that Mr. Talbott says that the proof he made to the Quartermasters' Department at Washington on which he obtained pay for his horse which he surrendered had been filed with his application at this office. He is mistaken on that point, for that proof has never been received here. The affidavits recently filed show that he owns two houses which he rents that are worth \$2,000.00, and that he occupies as a home the property which his wife owned that was valued when he made his application at \$3800.00, but these affidavits state that it is now worth \$1700.00, which makes \$3700.00. While he could not sell this property, except as a life interest in it, and what that would be would only be a surmise, yet he has control and exclusive use of it- the whole property- for the balance of his life.




