in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the

benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,

and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-

Have been resident of Crittenden County, Kentucky, since 1859, except four years I was in the army during the war. I own 143 acre farm worth about \$800. Mare and colt-\$80.- 2 cows \$50.-sow and 4 pigs \$20. Widowed daughter and four children dependent upon me. wife dead, left no estate. Weak physically, not able to labor at all. Kidney trouble. Vertigo can hardly walk.

G. J. Hamilton, Tolu, Kentucky.

Have known Mr. Wooten all my life. He has been a resident of Crittenden County since I have known him. He has no property except a farm worth not more than \$800. No other property except little stock mentioned. Not physically able to labor for support.

D. E. Gilliland, Marion, Kentucky.

Am Deputy Sheriff. Have known J. T. Wooten 30 years. He owns small farm not worth more than \$1000. He is not physically able to earn a support, and he owns no other estate.

The above named witnesses are personally known to me to be worthy of credit, and I find from evidence that J. T. Wooten applicant, owns real estate of the value of \$ 800<sup>00</sup>, and personal property of the value of \$ 150<sup>00</sup>.
